A year has gone by, after the adoption of International Labour Organisation's (ILO) Convention 189 for Domestic Workers. We have worked so hard for nearly four years, to ensure that our work is recognised as decent work! On 16th June 2011 we made history when Convention 189 was adopted.

In this year gone by, only one government has signed the ratification of Convention 189. We set ourselves a goal: We want at least 12 governments to sign, one each month as part of the international **12 to 12 Campaign** with the International Trade Union Congress (ITUC) and International Domestic Workers' Network (IDWN).

South Africa should be the second government to sign and ratify 189, meaning it becomes labour law, as South Africa was the most supportive and vocal government leading the campaign for Convention 189 at the International Labour Conference.

We urge our government to sign, and ratify, Convention 189! South Africa, take the lead and Africa will follow!

JUNE 16TH DECLARED INTERNATIONAL DOMESTIC WORKERS' DAY!

On June 16th 2011, at the 100th International Labour Conference in Geneva Switzerland, the world's governments, workers and employers voted yes to the ILO Convention 189 to guarantee the basic rights of domestic workers. ***June 16 - the day that workers won the historic victory has become International Domestic Workers' Day.***

On June 16th 2012, the first anniversary of our huge victory. We celebrate and fight on! We say strong and loud to governments:

Ratify Convention 189!

Review national laws and practices!

Reform them !

First step for South Africa: Ratify the Convention – Take the lead and Africa will follow ! South Africa is a global leader in the field of labour legislation for domestic workers and worked for the adoption of 189.

Many requirements of 189 are already met by existing laws. Important amendments to the Basic Conditions of Employment Act and the Labour Relations Act are needed to comply fully with the Convention. *All workers should learn what Convention 189 means in the workplace!*

Second step for South Africa:

That the recommendations of Convention 189 become law. Amend labour legislation related to domestic workers' rights. This includes setting of Minimum Wages and Working Conditions.

Next steps: These laws should be implemented, monitored and inspected. South Africa can only do it by employing more labour inspectors. Regular inspections will ensure that employers are abiding by the law, and that domestic workers' rights are implemented in the workplace, every day.

SADSAWU'S FIRST HOME, COMMUNITY HOUSE (CH), DECLARED HERITAGE SITE


As a centre of militant spirit and action, Community House played an important role in South Africa's history in the mid-1980s. In Apartheid South Africa repression was at a high, the worker's movement was reviving with the an intense struggle for liberation. As a site for mass struggles, CH bore witness to the unifying role of labour in the struggle for liberation. For many throughout the country, Community House symbolised organised opposition to inequality, discrimination and oppression. Today, as home to a community of activists engaged in broader struggles for social transformation, Community House retains this symbolism.

It stands thus as an authentic symbol of resilience, of fighting spirit and of hope for the future.

From this site some of the largest strikes and anti-apartheid campaigns were organised during the 1980s and 1990s that mark its historic significance. The labour movement played a critical role in shaping South African history but within national heritage, these stories remained largely untold. In the 1980s a number of labour and community activists were commemorated in the halls and foyers within CH.

Those who demonstrated selfless dedication to the struggle for the liberation of the South African people. All were detained by apartheid's security police. All with the exception of one were murdered by the apartheid state.

Their histories of struggle and sacrifice represent the histories of thousands of others who were detained, tortured and killed by the apartheid regime... Elijah Loza, Storey Luke Mazwembe, Jeanette Curtis, Ashley Kriel, Neil Aggett, Imam Haron and Wilfred Rhodes.



"We domestic workers were running the kitchen here and catering for events. The COSATU Conference in 1987 was our first big one, another highlight was celebrating Mandela's birthday."






In South Africa SADSAWU can report:


- February – meeting held with the Labour Portfolio Committee regarding Convention 189,

- We are now waiting for ratification which needs the signature and approval of the full Cabinet.


