Music video with Nowotny's composition

Prof N W Nowotny, Head of the Department of Music and Musicology, has just received a copy of a music video which was made to his composition *Dream Fantasy* - The Flying Dutchman for piano solo.

This work has already appeared on CD under the title Wagner für Tasten, (Wagner for Keyboard), together with original piano compositions by Richard Wagner and concert paraphrases of opera themes by F. Liszt. (The CD is available at Grocott and Sherry).

The video was made by the pupils of the last three standards of the Fadinger High School in Linz, Austria, as part of their music and media education classes.

The 15-minute video interprets the main plot of the opera through the eyes of young people in the 20th century, just as the composition re-interprets Wagner's music - as one critic said - "through the filter of the 20th century".

A number of interesting issues are raised by such re-interpretation. On a technical-compositional level, there is the question of the relationship between the original music, already loaded with ideas and associations, and the modern visual realization. To what extent are they in agreement, and should agreement in any case be aimed for? The appearance of an Asian student in the role of the Dutchman suggests a whole new angle on the theme of liberation from hatred of the foreign "Other".

Prof Nowotny is enthusiastic about the video which will be shown for the first time in Linz on 9 February, 1993, as well as at the Austrian Film Days. It will also be entered in various competitions.

New Head of PR

Mrs Annette Clifford-Vaughan has been appointed to the newly-created post of Director of Public Relations and Development at Rhodes University, Grahamstown, from June 1.

The two Divisions of Public Relations and of Development will be merged on the retirement of Mr Richard Buckland, who has been Director of the Public Relations Division since May 1984.

Mrs Clifford-Vaughan completed her schooling in London, followed by an Advanced Diploma in Secretarial Practice.

Much of her career has been spent in the fields of advertising and public relations, both in industry and at universities. At present she is Senior Public Relations Officer at the University of Durban Westville.

She is a full member of the Public Relations Institute of Southern Africa (PRISA) and is Accredited to the Public Relations Council (APR).

RUSA contributes to new lecturers' course

In 1992 the convenor of the New Lecturers' Orientation Committee (NLOC), Mr George Euvrard, invited RUSA to participate in the programme. RUSA provided new staff with an insight into the way Rhodes operates and its facilities. RUSA believed that all staff should be exposed to such an information forum and as a result the invitation to attend this segment of the NLOC programme was extended to all staff new to the university during the year before the start of the academic year.

The positive response to the RUSA contribution, led to its inclusion in the 1993 programme. Contributors included Mr Bruce Smith, Director of Personnel, who provided an overview of the structure of the University. Mr Smith noted that an opportunity annually is given to staff to apply for personal promotion. He said that the criteria for promotion for non-academic staff was under review and it was hoped that the new format would be implemented in 1993. Mr Smith distributed a booklet published by the Personnel Division which includes issues on relocation, leave entitlement and staff benefits. The NLOC has also published an information booklet obtainable from Mr George Euvrard in the Department of Education.

Mr Les Reynolds, Deputy Registrar of Finance, explained the procedure of monthly salaries. Payment is preferably made direct into a bank or building society account. Mr Reynolds said that the housing subsidy had been amended to included all employees based on the "principal breadwinner" concept. The matter of fee remissions for immediate family members was indicated on a sliding scale from 75% rebate downwards depending on certain factors. Advances on salaries may be available to staff members only in special circumstances.

The usual employment benefits such as general insurance, the group life assurance scheme and pension fund were discussed. Where uncertainty exists details may be obtained from Personnel. With the changeover in 1991 to the Meddent medical aid scheme, RUSA has done considerable research into the pros and cons of the Unimed and Economed options. Mr George Wells, a RUSA executive member, provided details on the schemes (see p2). RUSA also administers the Car Purchase Scheme available to RUSA members. The Home Improvement Loan Scheme offered by the University has been contributed to by RUSA and a percentage of the funds are available for preferential allocation to RUSA members.

Ms Maxine Reitzes, a Vice-President of UDUSA, the Union of Democratic University Staff Associations, to which RUSA is affiliated, explained the advantages of membership of UDUSA. Issues such as collective bargaining, affirmative action and other areas pertaining to those working in tertiary institutions were being debated at a national level and that such debate was being encouraged at a local or institutional level.

Medical Insurance

RUSA has been actively pursuing the subject of Medical Insurance as there has been some interest shown by members of the University. We are currently examining the options provided by Meddent (Economed/Unimed), and also products such as the Old Mutual FlexiCare scheme. Members will be kept informed of any developments in this arena. If anyone wishes to provide any input on the subject they are welcome to do so and should contact George Wells (Ext. 296).

Medical Aid

With the latest price increases, members may be interested to see how Economed compares with Unimed. The situation is still very much in the favour of Economed, with large savings to be had by members. The table shows the total annual saving to be made. (Please note that these figures assume that you meet or exceed the Economed threshold levels - if you do not then the savings will be even greater.)

Two other points to bear in mind is that Economed has introduced limits on the number of visits to medical practitioners and on the value of prescribed medicines. In the former case the limits are exactly the same for both Economed and Unimed, but in the latter case the limits for Unimed are slightly higher. If one is taking a lot of medication and is likely to attain these limits then Unimed may be preferable.

Car Scheme

Unfortunately the Car Scheme is very low on funds again. In order to simplify the procedures for obtaining a loan, and to make the system as fair as possible for everyone, the policy for handling applications has been updated.

The new procedure will be that all applications will be processed in the order in which they are received. No advance applications for loans on specific future dates will be entertained as was done in the past. As soon as funds become available the applicant will be in-

formed of the fact, and given a weeks in which to take advanta of the loan. If the loan is not take up within this period the application will fall away and a new application will have to be made. The new a plication will take its place at the bottom of the list of application. The Car Scheme Administration (Mrs Kathy Lilley) will endeavor to provide approximate indication of when money may be available assist applicants in their planning

SNUUPM Email package available

Users and potential users of electronic mail (email) might be interested in a recent development by the Computing Centre. A package called SNUUPM has been put together to allow email and Usenet news to operate on stand-alone PCs.

All that is required to run SNUUPM is a PC of any vintage with about 4 mb of space on a hard disk, and a modem.

Operation is simplicity itself. The mail package that is installed on the Novell fileservers, PMAIL, is used to read and create mail. A package called SNEWS (Simple NEWS) performs a similar function for Usenet news.

Email and News are read and created on the PC in stand-alone mode.

Several different users (eg husband, wife, children) may all have their own private areas for email, and there are individual bookmarks for the newsreader. At some convenient time, like after 9pm at night when the telephone rates are lowest, the PC initiates a telephone call to the email gateway machine at Rhodes (kudu.ru.ac.za), and mail and news are exchanged between the gateway and the PC.

Smoking delays healing of broken bones

Smoking delays the healing of broken bones, according to a study presented at the February meeting of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons in Washington DC. The average healing time of a broken tibia was 2.3 mo/cm for non-smokers, 2.5 mo/cm for ex-smokers, and 3.0 mo/cm for smokers.

There are a number of obvious uses for SNUUPM. For example:-

- Students doing part-time degrees at Rhodes but who are not located in Grahamstown can very easily keep in touch with their supervisors, and can keep up to date with what is happening in their field (by reading the relevant newsgroups).
- Lecturing staff who wish to get their email on a machine on campus but would prefer to browse through the volumes of news on their PCs in the comfort of their home.
- Staff/postgrads who spend a moderate amount of time "on the road" yet don't want to be out of touch with email (typical "laptop" computer application).
- Graduates of Rhodes who wish to stay in touch with the university.

The package is free. It may not be used in a commercial environment. The package is available from the PC support staff in the Computing Centre, who will assist with the installation. It is also stored in the anonymous ftp area of hippo.ru.ac.za:/pub/pc. Email traffic is carried at no charge to the users, the only operational cost is that of the telephone call. Email costs a small fraction of fax.

The package works. It has been used at the University of Eduardo Mondlane in Maputo to exchange email with Rhodes University, and it is in productive use in Grahamstown. Interest has been expressed by people in Argentinia, Kenya, Uganda, Namibia, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Spain and elsewhere.
