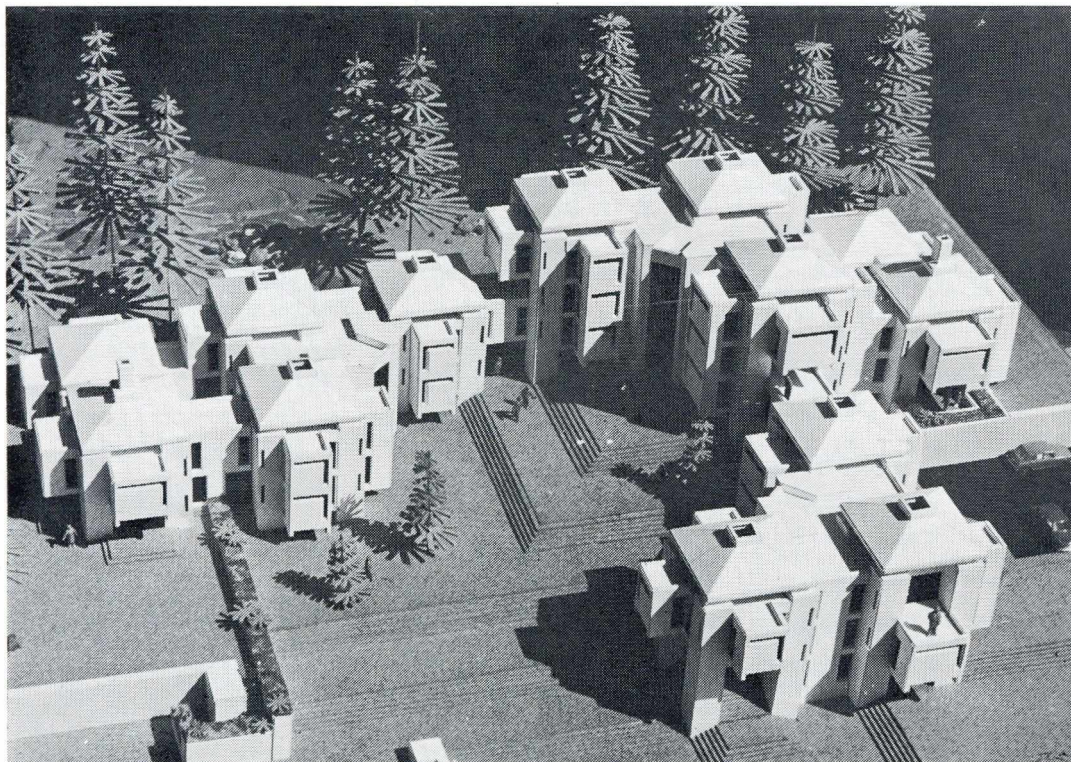

IMPORTANT RESEARCH PROJECT

A radio telescope at present being built in the Physics Department of Rhodes University will be the first in the southern hemisphere to explore very high frequency radio waves from space. The sources of this radiation, which appear to be associated with clouds of gas found in space between the stars, were first observed in 1969. Since then the skies above the northern hemisphere have been extensively explored to map these sources of radiation. Rhodes will now undertake the same task in the southern hemisphere.

A substantial grant has been received for this work. The radio telescope will consist of reflectors to collect the signals, an electronic converter and a 50-channel receiver.

Professor E. E. Baart (Physics) will spend the next twelve months in Britain at the Mullard Radio Astronomical Observatory which is attached to Cambridge University. He has been awarded a grant for this purpose by the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research.

Also associated with this work in the Physics Department is **Dr. G. de Jager** who has studied similar phenomena while in England, using the radio telescope at Jodrell Bank. He will continue with the construction of the telescope while Professor Baart is overseas.

For many years now, the University has maintained a research station at Craig Doone, near Grahamstown, which observes the low frequency radio waves emitted by the planet Jupiter. The Physics Department has also carried out ionospheric investigations through members of the Department stationed in Antarctica.

RHODES TO THE RESCUE

A wattle-based tanning process invented at Rhodes University has saved the day for the tanning industry in the United States and Canada. The operation of these tanneries was in jeopardy because of growing concern over the pollution of long stretches of America's main rivers and waterways by the effluents from tanning processes.

The inventor of the process, **Dr. S. G. Shuttleworth**, Head of the Leather Industries Research Institute at Rhodes University recently made a five week tour of the United States and Canada. He demonstrated to tanneries how the use of wattle reduces the waste liquids which cannot be purified after the leather has been tanned. The American tanneries were delighted with the new process, which also reduces the duration of the tanning process from six months to one week.

PROFESSOR

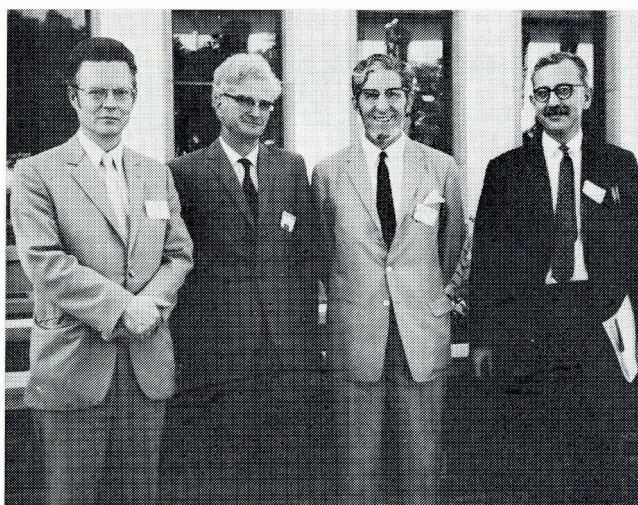


Dr. Johan Smuts has been appointed head of the Department of Afrikaans/Nederlands at Rhodes University in succession to Professor R. K. J. E. Antonissen, who this year became vice-principal of the University.

Dr. Smuts has been on the staff of the University for more than twelve years. He was appointed senior lecturer to the department in 1958 and he became a Reader last year.

Born in the Western Cape, and educated at the University of Cape Town, he gained a Bachelor's degree in 1939 and Master's degree with first class honours the following year.

Four years later he obtained his Doctorate. After six months' lecturing at the University of Cape Town, he turned his attention to translating. Dr. Smuts spent ten years with the public service as translator before becoming assistant chief translator in the House of Assembly for six years. He was then appointed to the editorial board of the *Groot Afrikaans Woordeboek*, a post he held until his appointment at Rhodes.

CONVENTION OF S.A. CHEMICAL INSTITUTE

Rhodes University was the venue this year for the national convention of the South African Chemical Institute. Over two hundred chemists from all parts of South Africa and Rhodesia, as well as chemists from several other countries, gathered at the University in the first week of February. The convention was opened by the Chairman of the University Council, the Hon. Mr. Justice J. D. Cloete.

Among the overseas speakers were Prof. K. W. Bagnall from

Manchester, Prof. K. Kühn of the Max Planck Institute for Protein and Leather Research in Munich, Prof. E. T. Verdier of Montpellier in France, and Dr. J. L. de Vries, a member of an international company in Holland. Prof. Verdier is an Old Rhodian (1935) who also lectured at Rhodes for some time.

During the convention, the Chemistry Department also staged an exhibition on the theme of "Computers in Chemical Instrumentation".

NEW PUBLICATIONS BY RHODES UNIVERSITY

Rhodes University is arranging for the publication of a series of diaries, reminiscences, letters and journals dating from the early period of the 1820 Settlers in South Africa. The project was conceived by the Departments of History and English in 1967, and a number of authors have been asked to edit publications to be published as part of "The Graham's Town Series". The first to appear will be the journal of John Ayliff edited by Dr. P. B. Hinchliff. (A former professor of Ecclesiastical History at Rhodes, he is now Secretary to the Ecumenical Council of the Anglican Church).

The second publication in the series will be the journal of William

Shaw, edited by Prof. W. D. Hammond-Tooke who will be remembered by many Old Rhodians as Professor of Social Anthropology at Rhodes University.

Another contribution to the series which should appear at an early date contains the reminiscences of Thomas Stubbs and deals with the frontier wars of the 19th century. This volume is being edited by Prof. Winifred Maxwell, Professor of History at Rhodes.

Other authors in this series including Dr. E. E. A. Gledhill, the Rev. M. Nuttall, Dr. C. A. Giffard, Mr. J. M. Berning, Dr. J. A. Benyon, and Miss M. McDowall.

VICE-CHAIRMAN OF S.A.B.C.

Prof. Brian Bradshaw, Professor of Fine Art at Rhodes University, has been appointed Vice-Chairman of the South African Broadcasting Corporation. He has been a member of the Corporation's Board of Directors for five years. Born in England, he has been on the staff of Rhodes University for ten years.

Professor Bradshaw, accompanied by Mrs. Bradshaw and their sons, will spend the next few months in Europe where he will spend some time exploring pre-historic caves in France and will also study certain early Celtic monuments in Brittany. He will go to Italy to explore tombs and the acropolis and then to Greece to see the oracular caves and to Denmark and Sweden to study rock engravings. At the same time, he will make an investigation of broadcasting and television systems.

ECONOMIC RESEARCH

Prof. Marcus Arkin, Professor of Economics and Dean of the Faculty of Social Science at Rhodes University will be in London for the next few months to carry out research on a senior bursary awarded to him by the Human Sciences Research Council. He will be accompanied by Mrs. Arkin, who lectures in Economic History and who shares his interest in the early economic history of South Africa. In particular, they will be interested in records of the English East India Company's Agency at the Cape. They will visit several other countries en route to London.

THE CHOIR

Rhodes University Chamber Choir staged a series of performances in Cape Town in the last week of May as part of the Republic Festival programme. The concerts were given in the Hofmeyr Hall which was filled for every performance.

The Choir received high praise from knowledgeable music lovers and also impressed with their striking appearance and deportment.

The University's coelacanth was also taken to Cape Town for the occasion and was on exhibition at the South African Museum for two weeks.

EASTERN CAPE VELD FLOWERS

A most valuable contribution to the available authoritative literature on South African flora is the book *Eastern Cape Veld Flowers* by Dr. Eily Gledhill (nee Archibald, 1936) who is a Research Associate of the Department of Botany at Rhodes. The book has had an excellent reception and clearly fills a long felt need.

Scientific accuracy, which is the hallmark of this work, has not been allowed to turn it into a drab

reference book. With its excellent illustrations and clear text, it is a delightful guide for every nature lover seeking an introduction to the rich flora of the Eastern Cape. It is well indexed and attractively printed and, with all that, very reasonably priced.

Dr. Gledhill has succeeded in producing a valuable reference book which delights both the specialist and the more pedestrian student of nature.

VICE - PRINCIPAL

Prof. R. K. J. E. Antonissen, former Professor of Afrikaans/Nederlands, succeeded Professor J. V. L. Rennie as Vice-Principal of Rhodes University at the beginning of this year. He has been on the staff of the University for the past twenty years.

He attended school in his birth place, Antwerp, and entered the University of Louvain in 1936 to take a Licentiate in Germanic Philology followed by the State Education Diploma and a Doctorate in Philosophy and Literature. After lecturing for several years in

Belgium, he came to Rhodes as lecturer in Afrikaans/Nederlands in 1950, becoming a senior lecturer in 1954 and Professor in 1958. He served for several terms as Dean of the Faculty of Arts and represented the Senate on the University Council.

Professor Antonissen is the author of an imposing list of publications and a leading literary critic. He has the rare distinction of being a member of the South African Academy as well as the Royal Flemish Academy of Language and Literature.

OBITUARY

Dr. John Smeath Thomas, Master of Rhodes University College from 1938 to 1947, died in Dorset, England on 23rd April, 1971. He was in his 85th year.

Born in Hargrave, Chester, he received his education at Chester Country School and the University of Liverpool where he took his Doctorate in Science. He came to South Africa in 1922 as Professor of Chemistry at the University of Cape Town where he also played an important part in the management of the University's residences.

Dr. Smeath Thomas' headship of Rhodes University College was a difficult period in its history from the administrative point of view, marked by fluctuating student numbers caused firstly by the war and then by the inundation of all universities by returning servicemen. He not only handled this problem with outstanding ability and astute judgement, but responded in a bold and courageous manner to the challenge of growth. A vast building programme was undertaken which, years later, made it possible for the University to maintain a steady rate of growth without a crippling financial burden.

In the academic field, many new departments were established during his term of office, including African Studies, Music, Sociology, Physical Education and Divinity. The Leather Industries Research Institute and the Department of Ichthyology also came into being at this time.

He lived in retirement in Grahamstown for more than twenty-three years and died while on holiday in England. During the celebration of its diamond jubilee, in 1964, the University conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Laws, *honoris causa*.

Rupert Charles White-Cooper (1913) died in England in January this year. He had achieved distinction as an architect and had taken a special interest in the training of architects. He left Rhodes University College for England in 1914 to study architecture but served as an officer in the Manchester Regiment during the first World War. He saw active service in France and Italy and was awarded the Military Cross and the Italian Bronze Medal for Valour. After completing his studies, he set up in practice as an architect until 1931, when he joined the teaching staff of the Bartlett School of Architecture, London. He again served in the armed forces in the second World War, attaining the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in the Royal Engineers. In private practice, after the war, he made a speciality of university buildings.

The Very Rev. Dr. Robert Henry Wishart Shepherd died in East London a few weeks ago. He was a former Principal of Lovedale and Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. He was in his 84th year.

Born in Scotland, he received formal schooling up to the age of 13 only, but his private studies eventually culminated in his degree at Edinburgh University. He served as a missionary in Tembuland from 1919 onwards and became Chaplain at Lovedale College in 1927, also serving as Director of Lovedale Press and Editor of *South African Outlook*.

In 1942 he was appointed Principal of Lovedale, a post he held for thirteen years before retiring to become minister of the Presbyterian congregation of Fort Beaufort and Alice. He was President of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 1959 and a member of the Monckton Commission on the Central African Federation in 1960. The degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on him by Rhodes University in 1965.

Colin Ronald Kreusch (1963) died on 21st April, 1971 as a result of a motor accident near Pietermaritzburg. At the time of his death he was teacher at Treverton School.

After completing his degree studies at Rhodes University he undertook a course of study at the Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville. His interest in religion rivalled his interest in education and he was an untiring worker for his church.

Bernard Bothma (1952) died in November last year. He was crippled during a game of rugby in 1952, just before he was due to write his final law examinations. He triumphed over his injuries to a point where he could accept employment in Uitenhage and undertake a 6 000 mile hike throughout Southern Africa. In 1970, he underwent heart surgery and appeared to be well on the way to recovery when his death occurred.

Sydney Neville Hart (1970) died as a result of a motor accident in April this year. He was returning from a holiday in Cape Town when the accident occurred near Joubertina. At the time of his death, he was on the teaching staff of Muir College, Uitenhage, and was also working on his M.A. degree at Rhodes University.

Dennis Buchanan (1969) and **Vaughan Hayward** (1969) were married in Port Elizabeth in January this year.

June Bensley (1967) married Mr. Douwwe Pereboom of Urk, Netherlands, a few months ago. She met her husband while on a working holiday in Europe. Before her marriage she taught for a year at the Collegiate Girls' School in Port Elizabeth.

Bertram Stanley Ellis (1927), who followed up his B.Sc. with a Ph.D. completed in 1956, is a member of the first Rhodesian Senate.

Senator Ellis is one of twenty-three Senators of whom ten are African Chiefs and one Coloured. The University is justly proud of the part its Old Students are playing in the Government of Rhodesia.

Richard Phillips (1966) is in the Attorney-General's Office in Salisbury where other Old Rhodians are **Charles Waddington** (1952), who is the Solicitor-General, **Tony McMillan** (1957), **John Giles** (1964) and **Stan Herbstein** (1965).

Sister Mary of the Angels (E. Donnellan), 1922) receives our sincere thanks for her donation to the University. After many years of teaching, including twenty as Principal, she has now handed over her pupils to others. While young in comparison with our Old Rhodians of 1904, her 1922 B.Sc. is certainly acquiring vintage quality.

John Davison (1968) is with the Department of Social Welfare in Port Victoria, Rhodesia, where he is the District Social Welfare Officer.

John Bennett (1934) has left the Libanon Gold Mine in Westonaria and has joined the Metallurgical Department of Gold Fields of South Africa in Johannesburg.

Cecil Gordon Wiggett (1913) is living in Durban. Writing to the Newsletter he paid a glowing tribute to the late Mr. Justice Hoexter for his many sterling qualities and his great service to people in so many fields. In particular he mentioned the late Judge's fluency in three languages and his many personal accomplishments.

Robert Bing (1968) and **Betty Powell** (1966) were married in the Methodist Church, Mafeking at the end of last year. The **Rev. Neville Wilson** (1968) officiated and the bridesmaids were **Jenny Henderson** (nee **Dugmore**, 1966) and **Meg Dugmore** (1969). Best man was **Henry Mayer** (1966) and the groomsman was **Tim Radloff** (1969), who is now teaching at Rhodes. The bride's mother (nee **Beth Carson**, 1929) is an Old Rhodian as are the following uncles and aunt: **Jack Carson** (1932), **Geoffrey Carson** (1934), **Sheila Carson** (1939). So, of course, were her brothers, **John** (1962) and **Peter** (1962).

OLD RHODIAN NEWS

John Forbes Gaylard (1939) has been appointed Secretary to the Prime Minister and Cabinet of Rhodesia. In 1946, he joined the staff of Umtali High School where he became Deputy Headmaster in 1953 and was later appointed Headmaster of Prince Edward School, Salisbury. In 1964 he became Under-Secretary to the Ministry of Education and subsequently a member of the Public Services Board. During the second World War he served with the Natal Carbineers in North Africa and later became a Brigade Intelligence Officer in Italy and was mentioned in dispatches.

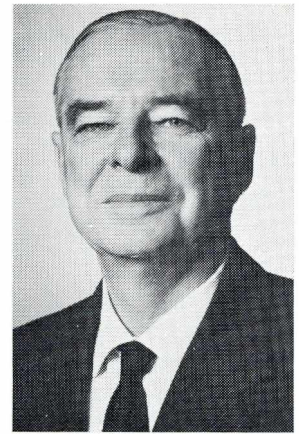

He has always given freely of his services to charity.

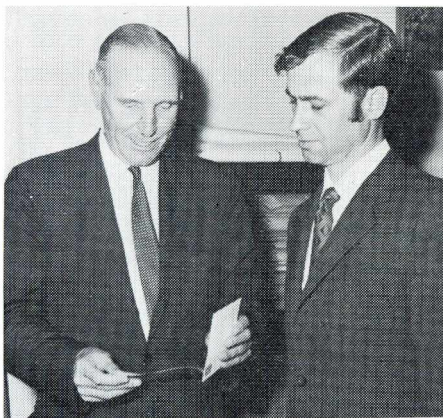
DEVELOPMENT CAMPAIGN IS UNDER WAY

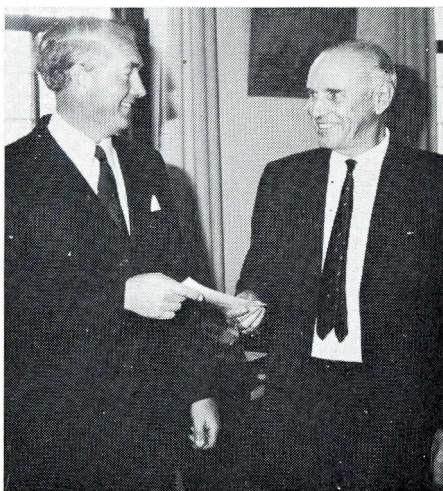

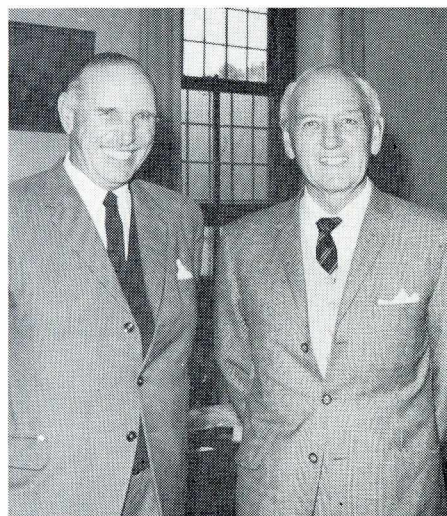

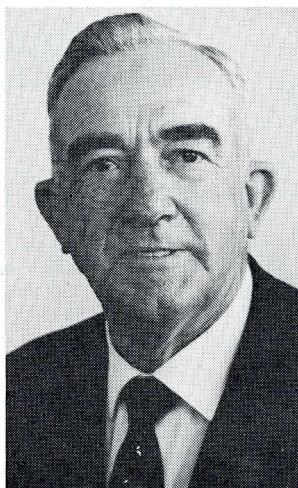
Marie-Ann Hofman (1970) has a lecturing appointment on the staff of the Law Department at Rhodes University.
