This evening we feature a panel of three public figures who have been invited to briefly address us and, more especially, engage with us on the recent events.

Prof. Steven Friedman is Director of the joint new Rhodes University/University of Johannesburg Centre for the Study of Democracy. A well-known and respected political commentator and analyst, Prof. Friedman has extensively commented on recent events on radio, television and newspapers.

Dr. Thabisi Hoene, is a lecturer in the Department of Political and International Studies at Rhodes University. He is a regular commentator on contemporary political issues. His special research interest is on South African political parties. His doctoral research undertaken through the University of Witwatersrand was on South African elections.

Advocate Izak Smuts was president of the Rhodes University SRC of 1978, and is a local advocate who specialises in administrative and constitutional law. He participated in the early 1990s *Convention for a Democratic South Africa*, which was part of the negotiations process leading to the first democratic elections in 1994. More specifically, he was a member of Working Group 2 of COODESA, which dealt with constitutional principles. He is the chairperson of the Eastern Cape Society of Advocates and an executive member of the General Council of the Bar of South Africa.

We also sought to have with us this evening Dr. Judith February of the Institute for Democratic Alternatives in South Africa but were unfortunately not able to secure her.

Each speaker will address the Forum for no more than 10 minutes. Thereafter the Forum will be opened to questions, comments and contributions from you the other participants in this Forum.
