New Chancellor for Rhodes

AFTER A RIGOROUS selection process lasting six weeks, Professor Jakes Gerwel has been elected as the new chancellor of Rhodes University.

Rhodes' Vice-Chancellor, Dr David Woods, expressed his delight at Professor Gerwel's acceptance of this position. "Professor Gerwel is a very experienced academic who has distinguished himself as Head of President Mandela's office and Secretary to the Cabinet. His appointment will bring great distinction to Rhodes and I, in particular, will value his advice and guidance," he said.

The role of University Chancellor is to preside over all ceremonial and public occasions, especially the graduation ceremonies, as well as to be an objective source of advice and a symbol for the ideals of the university.

Professor Gerwel received his honorary Doctorate of Law from Rhodes University last year. In his speech at the ceremony, Gerwel pointed out that universities were both central agents for change and steady beacons of continuity and tradition.

Gerwel was recently in the news for playing a pivotal role as a broker, on behalf of the United Nations, in the negotiations around the trial of the alleged Lockerbie bombers.

Professor Gerwel succeeds Dr Gavin Relly who sadly passed away in January.

His installation to office as the new Chancellor will take place at The Settler's Monument on Friday 9 April 1999.

THE EXHILARATING buzz of the Rhodes' chip and the clank of the iron cattle turnstiles is back at the Union Club this year along with mixed feelings of glee and frustration.

"The chip is good and you don't have to pay every time you go in there," says fourth year
Nuelia De Abreu. "The queue is a bit annoying but it keeps people who are just hanging out there waiting to go to the Vic, out. This way you have people there that want to be there."
And out they may be with increased membership costs from R65 to R72 and stagnant queues; students may start their trek into town a little earlier in search of a drink.

Second year Botha House students Alan Slade and Steve
Backhouse feel they couldn't be bothered with the queue.

"They didn't have it last year," says Slade. "It took a year to fix. I'm not mad about the price, just the gueue."

But the queue is not going anywhere. "The chip policy is the most efficient way to monitor the Union strictly to club members," says Union Manager Peter Boshoff. "The man who ran the chip system last year died in an accident. It took us a while to get the system up and going again in the Union."
A gentlemen's club back in the 1970s, the goal of the Rhodes
Union Club is to provide entertainment and not a place to just get drunk, says Boshoff.
Membership fees go directly to a fund set aside by the university

fund set aside by the university to improve entertainment facilities for students. Part of the fees paid goes towards general maintenance such as replacing carpets, fixing lights and other small damages.

Dean of Students Dr Motara is on a committee to discuss where these fees should be allocated. "We are now very seriously looking at the possibility of providing a new student centre," says Motara. "The student centre would provide such things as a coffee shop, maybe an ice cream parlour and a small theatre, all set off from the bar area. This way you don't have to just go and get drunk. The shops wouldn't have to pay rent, just make ends meet so that we could keep the prices down." And first year Maswazi Kunene may be the first to take a seat at a new coffee shop.

"Yes, it is a pain to re-register your chip and the queues are ridiculous," says Kunene. "But I'm looking for more variety."

SSC - here to serve you

"WE'RE TRYING to put a cracker up the backside of students," said Dr Motara, Dean of Students, about the Students Services Council (SSC).

The SSC is a council dedicated to ensuring that every student's life is as comfortable as possible, said Motara. However, they cannot act without students making suggestions.

Issues of concern to students include:

- different rules in male and female residences, in violation of the Constitution.
- an archaic rule from 1904 still prohibits any woman under the age of 21 from living in any accommodation with males.
- the quality of residence food.
- the fact that the SRC has a budget of almost R400 000, but are not held accountable for

these funds.

- the quality of the furniture in residence common rooms.
- the removal of supplementary exams.

"Any student can launch a complaint. One student or 30 students can sign the complaint," said Motara. The question to determine whether your complaint is valid or not is, according to Motara, "What conclusion would a reasonable person come to?" If you were paying R11000 for a hotel, would you accept the quality of the furniture in the common rooms?

The current reassessment of O-week is academically based, but as Mark Ranier, Student Adviser and in charge of the Academic aspect of the SSC, said, "The academic can only exist within the context of


a fuller university existence."
Ranier focused on workshops and foundations programmes to help breach the gap between school and university, also looking at how alcohol-based the activities were.

Motara suggests that problem arose partly from the overlap of supplementary exams and "Summer School" with O-week, meaning that there were too many seniors around prepared to teach and initiate the juniors. In the future, stricter control will be excercised over seniors moving into residence early, but Admin can't control the digs situation.

A committee has been formed to investigate Oppidan services, and is due to present suggestions to improve the structure on 31 March. Iain L'Ange, ViceDean of students and member of the committee, forecasts an accommodation bureau on campus providing a list of available digs and ratings. The main concern, however, is to address the lack of unity and cohesion amongst the Oppies. He would also like to "revive the very strong Oppie soccer team."

Part of the SSC's function should perhaps be to activate apathetic students, yet Motara feels that this may make the SRC feel encroached upon. According to Ranier, "The student aspect is channelled through the SRC which does result in a breakdown."

One can't help wondering, in that case, if one should bring it to the SSC's attention that SRC is not fulfilling this function?

PEOPLE in Grahamstown are living in ignorance of the high crime rate in this small and slightly backward dorpie.

Sashir Stadden, a third year law student, woke up two weeks ago to discover that her car was no longer parked outside her digs.

She contacted the police, who found the vehicle in Extension 8 soon afterwards.

The skeleton of the car was all that remained. Commenting on the incident, Stadden said "parts of my dashboard had been taken, my radio was gone and my tyres, rims, several engine parts and my mags were all gone. Luckily they (the thieves) couldn't get into the boot, so my CD shuttle wasn't stolen".

A spokesperson for the Grahamstown police said that Stadden had been "lucky" to still have an intact frame, as thieves will often burn stolen cars once they have removed all valuable parts to ensure that their fingerprints are destroyed.

Jan, a second year Arts student, has already been robbed four times in her first term in digs. "The worst was when our clothes were stolen off the line. Not all of them, just items that he (the thief) liked", she said.

The prevalence of crime related incidences in Grahamstown is on the increase and the most vulnerable seem to be unsuspecting digs dwellers.

Apart from urging people to be extra careful as far as security matters go - there is little else one can do.

Be vigilant, be wary, be mean looking.

OYET-OTIM SHOOTS DOWN ALLEGATIONS

SRC INTERNATIONAL
AFFAIRS COUNCILLOR Paul
Oyet-Otim has reacted angrily to
allegations of hate-speech made
against him.

He was accused of remarking that black South Africans were "stupid and incompetent," and that this was why so many of them got academically excluded.

The incident is said to have occurred on Saturday 20 February at Peppers Bar in New Street. During the same incident, Oyet-Otim is also alleged to have referred to Botswanans as being the "AIDS carriers of the continent".

Oyet-Otim takes a different view of these allegations. He

denies having made reference to Black South Africans in the discussion that took place at Peppers that night. However, he does admit that he became involved in an argument concerning the continental AIDS epidemic.

Oyet-Otim says that during the argument a student from Botswana had made remarks to the effect that Uganda, Oyet-Otim's home country, was the biggest carrier of AIDS in Africa. Oyet-Otim responded by saying that Botswana was also one of Africa's worst AIDS victims. He also claims that he did not start the argument.

Investigations to try to resolve the matter were recently

conducted by members of the South African Students Congress (SASCO) executive committee. SRC President Papi Mothbi, carried out an independent investigation.

Both these investigations cleared Oyet-Otim of "hate-speech". However, the SASCO report recommended that he apologize to the Botswanan student for having "hurt his feelings."

Sources indicate that Oyet-Otim's accusers have not fully accepted the SASCO report.

Activate has established that at least one witness to the event confirms Oyet-Otim's version of events.

RMR launches Open- Rhodes

TOWARDS THE END of 1998, the SRC called a general meeting informing students about an administrative proposition to scrap supplementary examinations.

In preparation for a meeting with Admin, the SRC sought student input so as to have a basis for opposing the proposition.

However, very little cooperation was forthcoming from the general student body and little constructive input was given by the handful of students who attended the meeting.

The rationale behind Administration's decision is that they seek to improve academic standards as supplementary exams, because they provide students with a second opportunity to pass, breed apathy and a lack of real effort the first time round.

The dominating ethos at the meeting was that this was a 'moral and political 'issue! It

was even suggested that this was a ploy to distract students ahead of the year-end exams!

What the SRC fails to realize is that political dogma will not always yield results. The fact is that Admin has stated that this is an academic issue and they are likely to pay little attention to arguments outside this framework, be that fair or not.

Thus a more powerful approach would be to directly challenge their supposedly academic reasons for wanting to scrap supplementary exams.

Wanting to improve the University's academic standard naturally presupposes that the current academic standard is not of an acceptable level. However, the barometer used to arrive at this conclusion is the examination system. It is exactly at this point that I wish to disagree.

The examination system is not the best means of gauging a student's understanding or knowledge of a particular subject. There are too many on-theday factors that could determine your results, independent of your actual knowledge or comprehension of the work.

In order to have a more reliable indication of progress, class records (tests, essays and assignments), across all faculties, should count a greater proportion (fifty percent) of students' overall results.

By doing so, the aggregate performance of a student would be taken into account. This considerably lessens the injustice resulting from a once off exam, which counts up to 80% of an overall mark.

Until Administration can deal with the inefficiency of the exam system, they have no basis for scrapping supplementary exams which at least cushion the imperfections of the current system of evaluation.

RHODES UNIVERSITY has the highest alcohol consumption per head of any University in South Africa and comes only second to UCLA worldwide.

Although academically Rhodes has a reputation of being one of the top tertiary institutions in the country, its reputation for high alcohol consumption is said to be an effect of "manipulative advertising" on both old and new students.

New students have been feeling the "peer pressure" since orientation week.

"Old students are teaching young students to drink," said one BSc chemistry student in his first year.

T-shirts that have printed phrases such as "TAKE ME DRUNK, I AM HOME" and "Absolut Rhodes", with the bottle replica are amongst a few revealing the extent of the drinking mania at Rhodes.

Some students are of the opinion that these are examples of "Our freedom of expression" [Our constitutional right]. Others argue that these forms of advertisement are not to be commended and, as quoted by Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Woods, are "wrong" and are detrimental to the image of Rhodes as a respectable and noteworthy institution.

Regarding the extent of alcohol consumption at Rhodes, Dr. Woods had this to say: "Alcohol abuse is a South African problem as a whole."

Grahamstown is a small town with a high concentration of non-working youth with very little in the form of entertainment .Why so many youthful people look to alcoholism for "kicks" is, as one third year Law student said,

"for social acceptance".

Societies get membership that way. Parties make invitations offering low priced beer and all this serves to encourage alcohol consumption.

One such society of rather infamous reputation is Zimsoc. On Friday 6 March, they held one of their popular parties where 240 litres of alcoholic punch was kindly offered to the 390 paid-up members. Altogether, about 600 students attended the gathering.

Responding to the issue of societies advertising free alcohol to lure members, Thabani Mlilo, sub-warden of College House said, "The issue here is what the society stands for. They get students to join them by any means necessary". Mlilo also questioned what these societies stood for and what they were trying to accomplish.

Zimsoc's treasurer, however, denied that the society was promoting alcoholism. She said that their parties were popular not only because of the alcohol, but also because of other reasons such as the double dance floor and good music.

She added that Zimsoc's social events had helped to unite Zimbabwean students, and that a proportion of the profits were donated to charity.

On 26 February, Dr Woods issued a statement condemning the excessive drinking of alcohol, particularly during the first two weeks of the term. He warned that "drunkenness will not be tolerated" and that students involved would be severely disciplined.


CONTRARY to popular belief, alcohol consumption at Rhodes has taken its toll.



CONTRACEPTION

The primary aim of contraception is to prevent unwanted pregnancy.

There are a number of contraceptive methods that can be used, but some may not be 100% effective.

The choice of contraceptive methods depends on one's age, sexual habits, degree of protection required, personality etc.

The contraceptive needs of a teenager differ from those of a woman who has completed her family.


There also are male and female contraception methods.

FEMALE METHODS

- 1) Abstinence
- 2) Conventional methods
- a) Natural methods
- -calender method b) Barrier methods
- -diaphragm
- -female condom
- 3) Hormonal methods
- Oral hormones (the pill)
 Injectable hormones
- 4) Intra uterine devices (IUD)

MALE METHODS

- 1) Abstinence
- 2) coitus interruptus
- 3) The condom



Condoms are a reliable form of contraception if used properly and handled in the correct way. A condom should only be used once and disposed of in the correct manner. Condoms are a good form of emergency contraception - always keep some.

Coitus interruptus is the method whereby the penis is withdrawn prior to ejaculation. It is a method that requires concentration and a high degree of self control. It is not reliable and does not protect against HIV.

The calender method involves the keeping of a record of the menstrual cycle and possible cycle length variations during one year. This method is unreliable and unsafe.

Barrier forms of contraception for women are meant to physically prevent the sperm from coming into contact with the ovule therefore preventing fertilization.

The diaphragm is a circular dome shaped device that is placed over the cervix preventing sperm from passing into the cervical canal.

The correct size of the diaphragm must be determined by a health-care professional and can be used with spermicide to improve effectiveness. If used in the prescribed way, there is a low margin of error.

The IUD is a T-shaped device that is inserted into the uterus via the vagina where it sits for the period that contraception is required. It acts via various complex mechanisms to make the uterus unsuitable for implantation and to avoid fertilization.

It can remain effective for a long time if undisturbed. Regular check-ups are recommended to check the position of the device and correctional measures can be taken if necessary.

Hormonal contraceptives are the most widely used form of birth control. This is due to their high degree of effectiveness, convenience and availability.

Oral contraceptives can be classified into oestrogen derivatives, progesterone derivatives or combinations and these act on the menstrual cycle to inhibit ovulation. Combination pills have both progestrogenic and oestrogenic activity thus allowing for lower concentrations of the hormones.

Injectables are generally used for slow release or depot effect. Their protective function will last between two to three months. These are more effective than the pill in terms of compliance as one could easily forget to take the pill.

However, it must be noted that nobody should take hormonal contraception without consulting a health-care professional as this may lead to unforseen complications.

Abstinence is undoubtedly the safest method of contraception. There have been no record of side-effects and nuns and monks live have normal healthy lives. It also protects against HIV and sexually transmitted diseases.

IT'S CLEAR FROM the name chosen by Nikolai Viedge, Duncan Boyd, Matthew Angus, Jacqueline Lund and Daniel Machet for the online publication that they first produced in October last year, that they want to grab some attention.

The disclaimer that precedes their site also ensures that the reader feels slightly apprehensive about the content of the web page created by the group of second year journalism students. But "Rec Subs", as its creator Nikolai Viedge calls it, is not on every addict's Internet shopping list and is far from the ranks of the sick and sleazy.

Articles published on the site have ranged from pieces on tattoos to a hypothesis on the uses of toilet paper. The site averages about 500 hits a week.

Viedge is excited about the upcoming edition. "We have pieces on pedal pushers, waitering and Wicca, so it should be very cool," he said.


And the name? Is there a drug focus on the web page? "Not at all. We just recognize that there is a strong drug culture among the youth and we exploit that awareness."

THE RHODES UNIVERSITY Drama Department Graduation production this year (1999) will be Steven Berkoff's adaptation of Edgar Allan Poe's gothic short story, The Fall of the House of Usher.

"The tale of the impossible A house with its own soul. A death! A resurrection. A moors' pestilential environment. A house that outwardly manifests the crumbling nature of Roderick Usher's inner decay. A febrile fantastical story .." (Steven Berkoff, Notes to the Play)

E.A. Poe wrote the story when he was 30 in the spring of 1839 in Philadelphia. Steven Berkoff's stage adaptation (1974/75) puts enormous challenges before the production team. The performance style lies somewhere between mime, dance and conventional acting styles. The performers are "stretched"



Hansen: My folks asked me if I wanted to go to coaching. At the time I was playing lots of little sports, but I said yes and haven't stopped since.


A: What are some of your earliest personal memories of tennis?

Unathi turned to tackle the Captain, Paris Edward, when her knee clicked out of position. It was an old injury, usually made better by pushing the knee back into place.

But, after half an hour of trying to straighten her leg Unathi knew it was more serious than usual.

She was taken to a clinic, where the oestropedian called in was brutally blunt. If she could not walk now, she was told, she would not be able to play the intensive hockey needed for the next two weeks.

A camera was used to assess the damage inside the knee. Her outside cartilage had split in half, wedging between the tibia and fibula.

An operation was necessary and Australia was out. "At first I was very emotional", says Unathi. "I asked why me, why this?"

However, she no longer feels bitter. She shrugs and says simply, "everything happens for a reason".

Although Unathi will not be able to play until the end of

March or early April she is determined to be fit for the winter season.

She swims and cycles to keep up fitness levels. It is the kind of determination, dedication and drive that must serve her well on the hockey field and what, no doubt, got her into the South

African team in the first place.
Unathi balances out the disappointment of not going to
Australia with the knowledge that she did her family, friends and University proud by getting

Congratulations to Austin Kriel and Warren Potts, the other two Rhodes students who were in Australia. Both South African men and women student hockey teams were placed third, an outstanding achievement.

Campus Sport Renovations

THE RIFLE and Soccer Clubs have benefited from early renovations around campus.

The rifle club will be looking forward to showing off their upgraded rifle range when the British Schools shooting team arrive here in April.

The old system of cable tires and wire to hold up target frames will be replaced by cement and pins, enabling frames holding the targets to be slid in and out.

Instead of frames being fixed into position they can now be taken into the clubhouse, preventing rusting and theft.

Gavin Frayne of the rifle club praised the renovations. "It's the perfect system." he said, "It will save us a whole lot of trouble"

The new target system is staggered, slopping up on the lefthand side to enable shooters on the higher left side to get a better view of the targets.

The club will have a grand opening of the house, with exhibition games, early next term.

The old soccer clubhouse has been given over to a delighted Chess Society who have, up to now, had to share clubhouse facilities with the Aerobics Club.
