

# YOUR LIAISON OFFICER LOVES YOU

John Penberthy, the new Societies' Liaison Councillor, was appointed at the beginning of the year to coordinate and improve society functioning.

DAVE FORBES interviewed him to find out what improvements he foresaw on campus.

#### RHODESIAN

The thirty-six year old Rhodesian has a good knowledge of student affairs, having studied at this university some years previously.

Here are his views:
RHODEO: John, what do you see as your role on campus?
JOHN: I see myself as an extension officer or an extension function offered to the SRC to assist them with their affairs, especially where societies are concerned.

RHODEO: What did you do before you accepted this post at Rhodes? JOHN: I was a teacher at St Andrews where I was head of the Physical Education department. RHODEO: What is your approach to society activity?


JOHN: That is difficult to answer. I have no approach at the moment, but I think it will become more apparent as my function opperates. Basically I see myself fulfilling the same function as I do to the SRC - being an instrument of the SRC to be utilised for assisting societies in their work, and offering a continuity function.

RHODEO: Would you like to see relations between Admin and students improved?

JOHN: That is definitely one of my aims.

RHODEO: What do you think can be

JOHN: Can I make an observation? I don't favour the term "Admin" - it is stereotype and actually prejudges the issue. I would like to humanise the relationship as much as possible to make it realistic. Most of my task will be indirect. I hope to assist societies to become more business-like and in this way impress admin, so that they can see that societies are run for the general benefit of students and in this way foster goodwill through liaison. The stress lies not on myself but with the aid and permission of the societies and the SRC.

RHODEO: A lot has been said about student apathy in the past. Do you see this as a problem, and if so, how do you hope to combat it?

JOHN: Well, I do see this as a problem, if it exists. I have not been here long enough to appraise the situation. However, I will try to combat it by as much personal contact with students, over as broad a cross-section as possible. Secondly, apathy seems to exist in a vacuum. I want to fill that vacuum with information, and perhaps encourage societies to have a positive approach.

RHODEO: Some people have said that you and your position are redundant in this university. What is your reaction to this?

JOHN: Twofold - firstly, the full scope of this function can only become known by operating. Secondly, there is a tremendous need for direction of societies towards offering more attractive alternatives to the loneliness that exists at Rhodes in certain quarters. Societies need to be run on a more professional basis and therefore make them more attractive. I want to encourage a training course to be run by students on committee procedure and society administration.

RHODEO: Do you think students will be wary of approaching you because of the newness of your post?

JOHN: I hope not. I can only rely on my own personality. I am a person who loves people. I hope my approach will encourage them. There will probably be odd clashes but I hope I can be very aware all the time, and be humble, friendly and confident, not something special - I am here to serve the students; they are my clients.

RHODEO: On a more general note, do you have anything you would

like to add?
JOHN: I would like to say this:
that our education does not end in
the lecture theatre. Social interaction and involvement with other
people puts the dot on the "i" of
education. I hope that through
societies, that finishing-off
function, the final veneer can be
offered. I want people to become
involved. By giving, you receive
a final part of your education.


### PETITION POOPER

RHODEO: Does that mean you'll be


competing for readership?

RHODEO: Are you a SASPU affiliate? DAVE: Definitely. Last year there were a few problems with them because of Oppidan's image as a

minor paper, but this year we feel our image will improve. I feel that the formation of SASPU was a great idea for student revolt. The student press is one of the only avenues of critisism left open to us. Therefore, Oppidan and Rhodeo fulfill the same aim. We cannot compete in the same way that the national press do.

RHODEO: Finally, are you bitter that you did not get the Rhodeo editorship last year?

DAVE: Not at all. I didn't know Shaun and Craig at the time, but inyone can see that they've done icredible things to Rhodeo.

### No jobs as blacks starve

The new term is upon us, and while in Grahamstown students watch with interest as the beer price war hots up - blacks in Fingo Village face a year of increased unemployment and a drastic drop in the already appalling living conditions. And nothing can be done about it.

In a recent survey, Cathsoc Chairman, JOSE DE SOUSA, found that unemployment in Grahamstown is worse than in any other Eastern Cape centre, and nearly half those employed here are paid less than the basic minimum subsistance wage.


The report said that the Divisional Council paid wages which rated among the "worst" in the town, while Rhodes wages are "one of the best". Domestic servants are worst paid of all.

Latest figures show that a Black family of six living in the Grahams-town area needs a minimum monthly income of R145 to cover essential costs. At present the average monthly wage rate for blacks in the area stands at R25.



The majority of workers earn less than R150 a month while as many as 1 400 are paid less than R25.

The neighbouring towns of Seymour and Riebeeck East are in an even worse position. Here the average monthly wages are R12 and R8.



Out of the black Grahamstown population of 35 394 (Dec 1978), only 9 886 are employed in Grahamstown, and a further 189 work in the Uitenhage and Port Elizabeth areas. At present 6 492 people are registered as unemployed. However the real figure is far higher.

Mr David Bush, a spokesman for the Bantu Affairs Administration Department, said that the black population of Grahamstown "is doubling at an increased rate, and job opportunities can not be created any more."

"We cannot tackle the problem by clamping down on the population. If we did this in a place like Port Alfred we would be encouraging the best riot seen in the Eastern Cape for years," said Mr Bush.

He described Grahamstown as a "most unfortunate town" saying one of the main reasons for the terrible conditions was the "absence of any local industries."

Despite these conditions the government is still determined to move the local black population out to Glenmore where the problem can only deteriorate.

# SEGREGATED RES

THE STATE AND ITS INFLEXIBLE WAYS HAS STRUCK YET ANOTHER DEHUMANISING BLOW.

THIS TIME RHODES HAS BEEN FORCED TO OPEN A SEPARATE RES FOR COLOUREDS, INDIANS AND BLACKS.

Approximately 65 'Coloured' and 'Indian' students met the VC, Dr. Henderson, and Mr Best, the Dean of Students, on February 14 to present an open letter demanding clarification about a Dept of Community Development refusal to allow them to live in residence.

Ihron Rensburg, the sub-warden of Adamson, read the letter voicing their protest against State discrimination restricting mixed accommodation on Rhodes campus.

The letter demanded clarification to the whole student body and the public concerning the sudden racial segregation this year. It also called for a stand by the university on behalf of the students and an explanation of the temporary segregation.

#### Bush Colleges

An appeal was made to the University to clarify whether it would defend them if they were forced to leave res under government pressure.

The VC, replying to the letter, recounted the history of black sturdents at Rhodes since 1977. Previously the Minister had allowed blacks to study at white universities only if the courses they

"In 1978 about 50 black students wished to live in res. We adopted the same procedure. There was reason to believe this would continue.

#### Refusal

"Shortly after Christmas, we received a letter in which permission was refused for all students, even those who had been in res for up to two years previously. I received a personal letter of censure from the Dept of National Education," the VC said

In 1979, 54 Indian and Coloured, and 24 Black students applied for admission. The VC wrote to the Dept of Community Developement asking for an explanation. Their response indicated that their decision could be appealed against in terms of the Group Areas Act of 1966.

#### Own Choice

In a verbal communication the previous Monday, the university was informed that returning students may live in a residence of their choice. Five Indian and ten Coloured students fell into this category. As far as the black students were concerned, on all their forms the words "...provided this student does not live on campus..." appeared.

#### Terrible Conditions

Last year in May, the black students sent a delegation to the Vice Principal, Prof Brommert, to complain about the terrible living conditions in the location where they had to study by candlelight and circumstances were generally impossible for study.

At this meeting it was decided to accommodate them in part of the Nurses home at the Prince Alfred Infirmary, which at this stage is not part of the university property but belongs to the Cape Administration.

#### Done Best

That arrangement continues, with about 16 black students being accommodated there this year.

"We have tried to do our best in the light of the circumstances," the VC said. "I can give no precise answer to how 'temporary' these measures are." The final position was that returning students could move back into a residence of their choice, while first years could not.

One student said that he heard a rumour that black students were kicked out of res because they were misbehaving. The VC replied that this was untrue, and that it was in fact a result of pressure placed upon them.

#### Exemplary

The Dean of Students, Mr Best, added that black behaviour had been exemplary and that anyone spreading such a rumour was trying to make trouble.

Replying to other questions, the VC said that he and the Chairman of Council were prepared to go and see the Minister personally as a desperate measure.

#### Crucial Question

"Should we find a roof for over your heads, or should we go for 'busts'?" asked the VC. He saw this as the crucial question which needed to be weighed up by students.

wanted to study were not offered at their own 'bush colleges'. Most of these students were postgrads.

In his speech the VC said, "In 1977 there seemed to be a relaxation, and we accepted about 20 black students on the basis of academic merit. Coloureds and Indians had to apply individually to the Dept of Community Developement for permission to live in residence.

"We received no response from them, so pending a response, we agreed that they could live in res.

"All went well in 1977. No reply was ever received, and no action was ever taken. It seemed to be the way the government was going to



The other 15 Coloured and 24 Indian students faced a dilemma, as to move into residence would be to openly defy the Government. This would probably result in adverse action being taken by the State.

As Prince Alfred and Adamson were to be examined by the Architect with an eye to refurbishment or possible demolition, it was decided that the Coloured and Indian students could be temporarily accomodated in these houses as they were no longer official residences.

The VC said that if the Minister took up a very 'kragdadige' stance dormitory accomodation would be offered as a last resort.



The VC then opened the floor to debate. In reply to a question about the risks involved, the VC asked whether the students were trying to "prove an idealogical point" or trying to achieve a roof over their heads. "This whole thing may blow up in our faces," he said.

#### Leaders

Rhodes appears to be leading the field in providing accommodation for black students on white campuses in South Africa.

Both the VC and the Dean of Students stressed that the university had no objection, but that the State was making things difficult.



Both the VC personally, and the University ran the risk of prosecution if they continually ignored state directives. Above that, students ran the risk of being prosecuted individually under the Group Areas Act of 1966.

Referring to the situation as a whole, the VC said, "I am disappointed in this. I can understand your disappointment and anger."

The position is one of deadlock the University has done its utmost to ease the situation, but the creation of racially segregated residences is undeniably abhorrent.


#### HIGHLIGHTS

\* The opening address by Professor Peter Horn of the UCT German Department, in which he warned South African universities that unless they found a way out of the isolation enforced by apartheid, the degrees they conferred would be worthless. He called for the enrolment of black students in relationship to overall population ratios, and "not merely a few token blacks as a salve to their consciences.

\* A row about a comic strip, drawn by Tony Pinchuck, which some delegates claimed took off sections of the Bible. It depicted "Godman" who gave the world "his only begotten fun, Comix." Many people said that God also had a sense of humour, but others were "disgusted at the insensitivity shown by those responsible for the comic.







Rather, in our priveleged position we should use it to broaden our our understanding of the problems facing Africa, and attempt solutions.


The concept of a National Student Union embraces these objectives.





They replied that as they were white, and wearing "Rhodesia" T-shirts, they felt insulted by the question. This did not conclude the incident, when the first years came back past the group, one of them "tripped" into the NUSAS table.

#### Morrell

Rob Morrell SRC Vice President, attempted to intervene, only to be asked "who the bloody hell" he was. On informing them, he took their names, saying that they were generally molesting the group. The Indian student had left just before the Rhodesians' return. The Rhodesians protested vehemently and Rob warned them, reminding them of their academic status.

Such malicious, arrogant behaviour must be condemned. Rhodesian students, whether male or female, with or without army training or anything else, should realise they have no right at all to behave in this way.

At university, all points of view should be expressed, but I detest arrogance displayed by people who know no better.

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#### TO THE COURTS

Dear Ed,

The Van Wyk De Vries Commission of Inquiry into Universities was responsible for a security crackdown on both Nusas and Saso in 1975.

One of the quotes from the second interim report of the Commission had the following to say:

" The Commission was not at all impressed with all sorts of cliches to the effect that the issues - these non-academic student activities were the right of protest, the right to free speech, and the right of association . nor with the argument that it was inherently a struggle for the maintainance and protection of academic freedom. We are concerned here with a political movement, an extra-parliamentary and therefore unconstitutional political opposition that seeks, first to place itself above the law of the land; secondly, to take the law into its own hands; thirdly, to ignore and even violate the rights of third parties; fourthly, to employ universities and students from outside in a sphere beyond their competance, and fifthly, to change and overthrow the whole social order by unconstitutional methods." TO THE POINT VOL 4 NO 9

#### Principles

It is ironic that three years later the regime with such high regard for principles should begin to totter under the weight of the Info Scandal.

I am concerned here with a political movement (the Broederbond) which is both extra-parliamentary and unfair political opposition, and together with other organisations seeks to place itself above the law of the land (eg Van Den Bergh); to ignore and even to violate the rights of third parties (the majority population;) and to employ universities and students from outside in a sphere beyond their competence (ie informers).

I am amazed.

Yet we will not find any culprits banned, detained without trial, or intimidated in any way.

Rhoodie gets away, the State declines to prosecute v.d. Bergh, and Mulder refuses to remain the scapegoat. The Hortors directors destroy records and take off for overseas, R32 million is spent irrecoverably and the Mostert Commission is squashed.

The Erasmus Commission drags on until everyone loses enough interest for it to all be hushed up and quietly forgotten.

#### EGYPTIAN DEATH

Detective films always seem to find a ready audience in this country; none more so than films of Agatha Christie's books. 'Murder on the Orient Express' with Albert Finney as the evergreen Hercule Poirot, being a case in point, was one of the top films of 1976.

Probably as a result of this films' success, another Christie book has now been filmed in the same glossy manner - 'Death on the Nile', with Peter Ustinov as the somewhat rotund, moustached Belgian detective. Once again the renowned, self-opinionated detective is surrounded by a galaxy of stars, each of whom could have committed the murder.

This time the murder is of the daughter of a rich British arist-ocrat, portrayed by Olivia Hussey, a rising young actress who was superbly chilling in 'Black Christmas'.

She and her newly-wed husband - played by George Kennedy - go down the Nile on a steamer for their honeymoon. On the boat, we meet the other characters, all of whom seem to have it in for our beautiful heroine; there is Bette Davis priceless as the old biddy after Hussey's jewels, Maggie Smith who is suitably eccentric as the novelist Hussey is going to sue. To cap it all, there is Mia Farrow, who gives a haunting performance as Hussey's somewnat neurotic sister.

Bearing this in mind, it is not surprising that Olivia Hussey is murdered, but not before she is able to give a convincing performance as the Young Lover. The crime, as in Orient Express', seems unsolvable, but the inimitable Poirot, with a little help from David Niven (as Captain Hastings), uses his famed 'grey cells' and solves the crime... but not before the murderer has struck again.

Flaws? Well, I thought Niven miscast as Hastings - he didn't exude enough British 'upper crustiness' for my liking. Another quibble is that the script demanded a little too much from Poirot to make the character an authentic Christie copy; however Ustinov carries off the humour extremely well, though his Poirot is perhaps not as good as Finney's.

But perhaps this is splitting hairs; the movie is marvellous enough entertainment from start to finish, with the suspense maintained throughout. For crime buffs and movie fans alike, it is a must. A word of warning though - don't let your friends 'in the know' tell you whodunnit - it'll spoil the whole movie.

## MILLIGANMANIA

It has been said that Spike Milligan can portray just about anyone, but no-one can portray him. This he demonsrtated in Port Elizabeth with an energy remarkable for a man of thirty, let alone his sixty-one years

Much of his show was taken from his last visit to South Africa, and parts came from Goon shows and sec-

tions of his books. But this man is such a master of his art that the most frequently heard jokes were possibly funnier than before, and he seemed to enjoy them as if they were new.

Milligan's versatile talents include just about everything in humour: witty asides, brilliant improvisation, sustained build-up, lightning gestures, and all delivered with never a pause in the flow. He is one of the very few who can make an ordinary remark and analyse it thoroughly and profoundly Just by the tone of his voice or expression.

#### Genius

The Info scandal has been with us for months, but it took Milligan to produce the remark: "Dr Mulder is suffering from withdrawal symptomsbut I cant remember the name of the bank." He is without doubt a genius; his ability to see unfailingly the absurd side of every situation, to put it into a perfectly appropriate perspective testifies to this, as does his immense influence on British and American humour.

### JAM SESSION

In a year when a plethora of punk bands graduated from stage to vinyl, 'In the City', the Jam's debut album was the best of 1977's spike-haired amphetamine offerings

Natty mohair suits, speed driven Rickenbacker power-chord guitars and a stage dynamic that exhausted as well as thrilled, quickly clued one to the bands muse The Who a la 1965 and 'My Generation'.

#### The Who

The critics were quick to take the Jam to task for over-exploitation of the Who's first and only 'punkrock' elpee. Yeah, well, no-one seemed to mention the rather excellent guitar-playing and the tightness of the rhythm section.

Which leads us to the '3rd-album crisis'. This 'crisis' was too much for the late Television. Not so for the Jam. They produced an album, that while identifiable as the Jam, is startling in the richness of its development.

Weller has developed his songwriting ability into a highly skilled craftsmanship; a great deal of thought has gone into the structure of these songs: no studio hack-jobs here. The guitar playing is considerably varied in texture, and even the vocals, which were once, at times, almost monotonous, have new depth and sensitivity.

The anger at the middle class plasticity of the establishment which Paul Weller revealed on 'Time for Truth' on the first album is clearly evident in 'Mr Clean'


"If you see me in the street look away

Such a stimulating environment, here at Rhodes -






# Fencing Confusion

A South African Universities Fencing team, which included three Rhodes representatives, completed a one month tour of Europe over the Christmas period.

Brian Boshoff, Noelene Fort and Malcolm Knox of Rhodes fenced in most of the Protea's matches, but the fourth Rhodian, Leonie Edwards, pulled a ligament early in the tour and was unable to participate.

New Year was celebrated in Munich where they fenced at the Olympic Stadium. After completing their Munich encounter the side travelled to Sportschule Grunwald for some much needed training.

The Protea's then travelled to London where they were met by strikes and icy weather. In London the team entered the Stevenage Open Foil Competition which resulted in some of the most rewarding fencing of the tour.

The tour began with a fencing-filled week at I.N.S.E.P. in Paris, where the team spent six days playing matches and being coached. The Proteas were soundly beaten in all matches, due to bad organization on behalf of the travel agent (unfortunately a feature throughout the tour) who misjudged the fencing standard of the team. They invariably found themselves fencing against opponents sporting National Colours and Olympic or Commonwealth gold medals.

The team then flew to Frankfurt from where tney were taken to Tahberbeshofheim. The visit to this beautiful Medieval village was for many the highlight of the tour. Christmas was spent in Switzerland where the team relaxed before travelling to Vienna to fence against the Union Fechtclub. Again the ability of the hosts was far superior and some of the South Africans' confidence began to wane.

Heinz Klug, team captain and SASPU President, finished in the fourth position with Lawrence Jacobson right behind him in fifth place. Barbi Schreiner also excelled in the womens section finishing as the best placed South African.

#### Success

The tour was a success in that much experience was gained by the Protea's against far more capable opposition. However, the accomodation, timing of the tour and the liaison with the travelagent was poor.

The New Year - Christmas period is not the best time for hosts to adequately prepare for a touring team. The travel agent on this tour was not fully satisfactory and team manager Jim Heaton noted this in his report as an important reason for much of the sub-standard accomodation and bad organisation.

It's happened at last. Birmingham City's Trevor Francis has been transferred to Nottingham Forest to become Britain's first million pound footballer. Francis has now joined Europe's football elite and his move has set the precedent for what could lead to an uncont-

lable transfer market and cial frenzy.

#### Wonderboy

Francis became a 'wonder-boy' when he scored four goals in his debut for Birmingham as a precocious 16 year old in 1971. After that he took a long time to fulfill his immense and undeniable promise as City continued to struggle to maintain their first division status. Nevertheless he continued to be his team's most impressive player, creating and scoring goals regularly. On the international front Ramsey and Revie ignored his vast resevoir of talents and it was only under Ron Greenwood that he became an established member of the England

It was in August 1977 that Kevin Keegan became Britain's first \$500 000 footballer as a 25 year old. Is Francis now twice the player Keegan was 2 years ago? After all Keegan is presently European Footballer of the Year and Francis is not a regular international. Quite simply the transfer market has gone insane, and one might ask, "What price Cruyff?"

On a saner note the European Cup is now in the quarter-final stages. Britain's representatives Notts Forest and Glasgow Rangers have drawn F.C. Cologne of W.Germany and Grasshoppers of Zurich respectively. Cologne have a fair contingent of German internationals but if Rangers can reproduce the form that saw them destroy the hopes of Juventus and P.S.V. Eindhoven, they could emulate their archrivals Celtic and become only the second Scottish team to win this prestigious trophy. Forest on paper look certainties to crush the Swiss team and together with Trevor Francis and a slice of luck they could keep the Cup in England for the third successive year.

# FOOTBALL FACELIFT

Rhodes football club has a new force behind it in 27 year-old Louis Arde. His main aim in filling the vacancy created by Graham Watts' departure is to put Rhodes on the football map.

Louis is a sturdy centre-half and was a stalwart of Durban United, the former NFL side. He has represented Natal at Currie Cup level for the last three years, and was selected to captain the Currie Cup X1 last year after being vice-captain in 1977.

He has already involved himself in Grahamstown football by coaching the local Protea side with remarkable success. Although the standard is low, he is impressed with the keenness of the players.

Louis will begin his stint at Rhodes with the added advantage of having played with Rhodians Glyn Morton and Rob Holliday.He has registered for BA Phys Ed 1 this year.

The most important ingredients for success, according to Louis, are - team spirit, fitness and dedication. However, he says nothing can be achieved if discipline does not exist among the players. In this respect Louis cited Dudley Zagnoev, Secretary of S.A.F.A., who said the latent ability of Rhodes teams of the past was never transformed into success because of the lack of discipline.

This lack of discipline was due largely to the fact that Rhodes players of the immediate past were always eager to mix football and liquor. The mixture was unsavoury, at times quite vicious. It affected form and resulted in the loss of key players. In attempting to remedy this, Graham Watts did a good job last year, but there remains much room for improvement.

At the recent AGM of the football club, Syd Penney was appointed as team manager. Syd is undoubtedly Grahamstown's "Mr Football", and his renowned administrative abilities will be invaluable to a coach set for success. Added to this the team welcomes the return of Ali Ridgway and Rob Holliday who were sorely missed last season.

It is also hoped that Butch Nunn, who will not be registering as a student, will be available to represent Rhodes. Butch's poise, control and calming influence might be difficult to replace.

Louis adopts a very pragmatic approach to football formations, believing that a coach must play to his players' strengths. He has bought eight new footballs and is together with Syd organising a new strip.


### **IMPROVED RHODES**
