The land on which we are gathered together today has been dedicated to the cause of education for nearly one hundred years, since the Community of the Resurrection of our Lord bought a property known as Eden Grove in 1884. Under the guidance and leadership of the Community's first Mother Superior, Mother Cecile, the Community became an important factor in education in the Eastern Cape.

The first school to be opened in these grounds was called St. Peter's, hence the name we use today, St. Peter's campus.

The order also opened an orphanage, a boarding house for the children of railway employees, and finally established the Grahamstown Training College for Teachers in 1894. At the same time, in very different circles, plans were developing for the establishment of a university in the city, and in 1904, Rhodes University was established.

These two educational institutions grew up side by side and were linked together in many ways, for example, three principals in succession were Old Rhodians - Sister Francis Mary, Sister Truda and the first lay principal, Mrs Craig.

Professor Suggit has already mentioned many of the ties that bind us together in the cause of education and I should like to say how very fitting it is that the present Mother Superior of the Community, Mother Mary Eleanor, who is, I believe, the only South African born Mother Superior the Community has ever had, should be with us today to unveil the commemmorative plaque of the National Monuments Committee.
