New Chancellor elected

At a special meeting of the Rhodes University Council on Thursday, June 28, Mr Gavin Relly was elected Chancellor of the University. The Chancellor is elected for a term of seven years and is eligible for a second term of seven years.

Mr Relly replaces Dr Ian Mackenzie, who will have served two terms of office at the end of November this year.

Mr Relly was educated at the Diocesan College for Boys (Bishops) and read for a degree in Politics, Philosophy and Economics at Oxford University before joining the Anglo American Corporation. He served the Corporation in a number of offices until he succeeded Mr Harry Oppenheimer as Chairman in 1983.

He has recently retired from that position, but continues as a roving ambassador for the Corporation. Mr Relly has a particular interest in the International Library of African Music (ILAM), which moved from Johannesburg to Rhodes a decade ago.

Improved Car Scheme

The scheme to assist staff in the purchase of cars has been streamlined. At its recent meeting, Council agreed to modify the rules under which the University would finance the purchase of cars. The new rules will help a wider spread of staff to acquire transport and will be strictly applied. The committee which previously examined credit-worthiness of the applicant and required the car to be checked and insured, will continue its work.

The revised rules are:

- Interest will be charged at "prescribed rates" presently 19% a year.
- Vehicles not older than five years qualify, generally, for participation.
- Vehicles older than five years will be considered on the merits of each application but
 - * Comprehensive insurance must be obtained (for all vehicles)

- * A comprehensive roadworthy report must be obtained prior to the transaction being finalized.
- Maximum finance periods are:
 * Cars up to and including
 - * Cars up to and including five years 84 months
 - * Cars six years old and older 48 months, provided the car is not older than 12 years, when the finance period ends.
- The committee controlling the scheme will consider each case on its merits and any decision not to approve a loan facility will be final.
- All other terms, including the length of qualifying service at Rhodes etc. will continue to apply.

RUSA is trying to set up an office which will be open on a part-time basis. Until then Dr Gruber will answer all queries.

From the potting bench

Well, who would have thought that in the middle of winter we would experience temperatures of 180°C!! Thank you, Editor, for your



apology - I hope no-one has steam-cleaned their plants in attempting to keep the chill off.

Talking of chill, it reminds me that the winter winds have by now blown away all the autumn leaves and left your fruit trees bare and ready for pruning.

Pruning at this time of the year will ensure healthy growth in spring and will encourage better fruiting. As a rule of thumb, prune fruit trees into an open vase shape so as to ensure that the sunlight gets into the minor parts of the tree, thereby improving growth and fruiting. Always remove dead and diseased wood first, and thereafter do your corrective pruning. It is advisable to remove as many inward growing branches as possible so as to encourage good growth. Another rule of thumb: remove branches that are growing vertically to the main frame and leave those which are growing horizontally. If these basic rules confuse you please give us a ring and we can advise you on how to go ahead.

This is a good time to prune your summer flowering shrubs such as hydrangeas. Don't be hesitant to do a heavy pruning especially if you haven't done so before or if the plants are very old and tired. Remove a half to two thirds of the plant. Remember to clear out any dead and diseased wood. If you have planted any young trees during this past season do remember to keep giving them water during the winter months even though there is no sign of topgrowth. The root zone is still active and a strong root zone will ensure healthier growth in spring.
