INCREASES THIS MONTH

Dr Michael Smout, Vice-Principal, has advised senior staff that they may expect a salary increase in the order of five percent and, thanks entirely to a selfless attitude on the part of several people in the Personnel and payroll divisions, it is likely that this will be reflected in salary advice slips at the end of this month.

Dr Smout said that Rhodes had been informed by the Committee of University Principals that the Ministry of National Education was likely to support a 5% increase for the tertiary educational sector. "The Executive Committee of Council is aware of the financial pressures on staff members and has, as a result, agreed to grant all members of the staff (with the exception of service staff whose 1993 increases are currently being negotiated) an increase of approximately 5%, with effect from 1 July", he said. The decision is subject to confirmation from National Education that the University's subsidy will be increased accordingly. Each staff member will be informed by letter of the relevant new salary and salary scale.

The Personnel Department was favoured with only some four-and-a-half working days in which to implement the new rates of pay and this during the Festival period when many of its members would have had personal and family plans. However, within that period, the recommendation from the CUP had to be discussed and a proposal forwarded to the Vice-Principal. The Registrar had, meantime, to poll the Council members for their view. New salary scales had to be generated by Mr Dan Darvel on his computer and converted to specifics in respect of individual staff members.

Thereafter the generated information had to be correlated by the willing ladies responsible for the payroll and any discrepancies thoroughly checked. Finally, with extreme urgency in order to have the necessary money banked prior to cheques and orders being presented, the package had to go though the computer centre.

Much overtime was worked by many people and we are all most grateful to them.

Ministerial Appointment

The Director of the JLB Smith Institute of Ichthyology, Prof Mike Bruton, has been appointed to the Council for the Environment by the Minister of Environment Affairs and of Water Affairs.

The Council for the Environment is a senior advisory committee which reports directly to the Minister.

Professor Bruton has also recently been appointed to the leadership group of the Committee for Marine Science, which was appointed by the Foundation for Research and Development and the Department of Environment Affairs.

He is completing his term as chairman of the Animal Sciences Evaluation Committee of the Foundation for Research Development.

Fine art to raise funds for Wildlife

Tree lovers and conservationists alike will delight in the fund-raising scheme launched this month by the Grahamstown Branch of the Wildlife Society.


Fine artist, Jill Reid, was commissioned to produce four watercolour paintings and habitat sketches of well known indigenous trees: Schotia species (Boerbean), the tree of the year; Olea europaea subsp. Africana (Wild Olive); Erythrina caffra (Coast Coral tree); and Pittosporum viridiflorum (Kasuur). A limited edition of numbered prints (244mm x 362mm), each individually signed by the artist are available for purchase.

Anyone donating R 100 will receive a full set of four prints plus a sapling of one of the trees featured. It is hoped that many trees will be planted as a result of the project. The prints are also available alone for R 90 per set.

"Funds raised will be used to produce the revised edition of A Fieldguide to the Eastern Cape Coast," said Prof Roy Lubke, who heads up the project.

FISH ON COMPACT DISK

Fishlit, the comprehensive computerised database on fish and fisheries, developed by the JLB Smith Institute of Ichthyology Library, is not available on compact disk (CD). The database currently has more than 36 000 references and grows by about 500 more each month.

The database covers all aspects of the study of fish – marine, freshwater and estuarine. It includes all branches of Ichthyology, Fisheries

Science and Aquaculture, such as: Taxonomy; behaviour; biology; ecology; physiology; biochemistry; conservation; fishery management; and aquariology.


Fishlit contains references from periodicals, articles, reports, pamphlets and other literature on fish from all over the world. It holds over 1 000 journal titles on fish-related subjects and has the addresses of over 25 000 authors. As the database is extensively keyword-indexed, references can be

retrieved through any combination of search terms. In addition, illustrations, new species descriptions and information can be retrieved by family, species or common name.

The *Fishlit* service, offering retrospective searches and a current awareness service, has been widely used in South Africa since 1985. The CD will open access to this information resource to the rest of the world.

Mrs Margaret Crampton, head of library and information services at the Institute, designed

and developed the database over a period of 10 years. In 1985 the old-fashioned card catalogue was computerised. The



programming for this system was devised by Prof Malcolm Sainsbury of the Department of Business Information Systems and includes many innovative features.

An American firm, National Information Services Corporation (NISC), contacted Mrs Crampton in July last year and enquired about the possibility of publishing the Institute's database on CD. This CD is now published and combines the database of JLB Smith Institute with those of the US Fish and Wildlife Service. the US National Oceanic & Atmospher Administration, and the US National Fishers Research Center. It provides a total of 13500

references. By combining these for major databases, the gaps which major databases eliminate by the other files.

Mrs Crampton, a qualifie ibrarian who also holds a Maste degree in Marine Biology, said he work in the Institute's librar allowed her to combine her two interests of Information Science and Marine Biology. "The JLB Smit Institute of Ichthyology Librar holds the largest collection of the same street in the same stree

literature on fish-related subjects in the southern hemisphere, and is South Africal national fish library. The publication of or database on CD enables us to extend or library's service to all parts of the world. I maximizes the return on our investment, it terms of information and education," she said

S A Universities not in the same league

The super-rich in America are able to donate massive amounts to education in their private capacities.

Don Hendry, of Biochemistry and Microbiology, has sent *Rhodos* a cutting from the *Los Angeles Times*.

From it we learn that Mr Walter H Annenberg has donated an amount of US\$ 365 million to three universities and a preparatory school.

Unusually, says the *LA Times*, he has said that he will pay the pledges he has made, in full, before the end of the year. The grant is thus in cash and not in bonds, stocks or other long-term investment instruments.

Annenberg is listed 80th (with US\$ 2,5 billion) in the current Fortune listing of worldwide billionaires and recently paid

US\$ 57 million for a van Gogh painting which he donated to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York.

The University of Southern California alone will be in receipt of approximately one third of the full amount.

Don Hendry's sentiments: "If only Rhodes had such donors!"

Until now, the highest private donation in America to higher education was US\$ 125 million in 1981 by Mr Claude B. (Doc) Pennington. This was in the form of stock and gas and oil royalties.

New textbook published

Prof David Edwards, Head of the Department of Psychology, has co-edited a new first-year psychology textbook for use in South African universities. It has been published by Lexicon.

Ambitious project

The book represents an ambitious project by Prof Edwards and Prof Dap Louw, of the University of the Orange Free State, especially as it has been published simultaneously in English and Afrikaans. It was designed after consultation with staff at all major universities in the country and those at Rhodes, in particular, have made a large contribution to the book.

Significant Rhodes involvement

Prof Edwards has personally written the chapter on personality and has contributed to those dealing with psychology as a science and profession and with altered states of consciousness. Ann Jordan of the Rhodes Psychology Clinic wrote the chapter on memory and Gary Norton that dealing with stress and coping.

Mark Welman co-authored the chapter on research methods and statistics and Zelda Knight that on language and thought.

Local examples

Prof Edwards says that the aim of the book is to provide a rich background of local South African examples. "In some chapters we have succeeded well. In others there is still quite a lot of work to be done in terms of adequate contextualisation for the South African situation, but I hope that this will be just the first of many editions."

Basic Xhosa Communication Course

Community Outreach will run the Basic Xhosa Communication course again from August 2. It is designed for people who can't speak a word of Xhosa or who know only a few words and phrases

Learners work in small classes with Xhosa mother-tongue tutors, and at the end of the 12-session course should be able to hold simple conversations in Xhosa.

The course was launched in March and has been revised and improved since. It lasts for 12 sessions of 1½ hours each, from 5.15 pm to 6.30 pm. Learners can attend twice weekly for 6 weeks (Mondays and Thursdays, August 2 - September 9) or once a week for 12 weeks (Mondays, August 2 - October 18).

The course fee is R 120 which includes handout notes at every second lesson.


