"King Kong" was seen by 50,000 During Rand Run

JOHANNESBURG. — When the little penny whistler played his haunting "Little King Kong" tune for the 46th time at the close of the Johannesburg run of "King Kong" 50,000 people had paid more than £30,000 to see the biggest independent show in the history of the South

African theatre.

Only Margot Fonteyn, Britain's prima ballerina, has caused a demand for seats nearly approaching the rush to see "King Kong." But even the demand for Fon-

teyn was limited to a certain section of the people. Kong" has had the widest crosssection of people from millionaire David Rockefeller to the poor Native domestic servant from the suburbs in the con-

stantly crowded audiences. Telephone bookings came from as far as 1,000 miles away and from every part of the country.

Special buses were hired bring audiences from 300 miles away. More than 5,000 bookings came in the post. And telegrams asking for seats came from every-

where. Theatre agents flew to Johannes-

burg from overseas to see the show. Author Harry Bloom reported: "Now 'King Kong' fever has swept Cape Town. People are whistling the tunes in District Six and the remarkably heavy booking for the Cape Town run." ANOTHER RUN
