The Limitless Sky

Rhodes' Astronomy and HAM Radio Society (Astrosoc), one of the largest astronomical societies in Southern Africa, officially opened its observatory on March 20, 1993.

The observatory is situated on top of the Geography Department, houses the recently restored Schwartz Telescope. The 25cm telescope, which was built in 1880, was brought to Rhodes by Professor Schwartz, formerly professor of Geology.

The chairman of Astrosoc, Mr Simon Walsh said, 'The Schwartz Telescope is one of the largest instruments freely available to the general public in southern Africa. It has already shown its worth: the main mirror, which is the heart of the telescope, was made by hand in 1880 and is still in perfect condition. It reveals objects 4 000 times fainter than the unaided eye can see, and shows superb detail on the moon and planets.'

Astrosoc was started late in 1991 to promote astronomy and HAM radio. The society is a member of the Astronomical Society of Southern Africa (ASSA), which is internationally recognized. 'ASSA runs several observing programmes to which we want to contribute. We have also made contact with the Astronomical Society of the Atlantic and other groups in the USA, as well as individuals in Germany, who are keen to start a joint variable star observing programme. Many stars visible from the Southern hemisphere are not well-placed to be observed from Northern countries, and so the demand for observations of these stars is high,' said Mr Walsh.

To aid in these observations, the society spent nearly a year restoring the Schwartz Telescope. The telescope requires a two metre ladder to look into the eyepiece.

Astrosoc has the following types of observations planned for 1993:

- ➤ Variable stars: Measures of the brightness of stars whose brightness varies. The brightness of the variable is compared, using a chart, with the brightness of known stars in the same telescopic field of view.
- ➤ Comets: Measures of the position and physical appearance of comets. The observatory will perform follow-up observations of newly-discovered comets to help determine their orbits.
- ➤ Occultations: Accurate timing of the passage of one body (moon, comet, planet, asteroid) in front of a star.
- ➤ Photography: To make observations of objects which are too faint to be seen through the telescope, and to confirm visual observations.

The society has a number of activities planned for this year. 'This year will mark the start of an outreach programme to the Rhodes community and the Grahamstown public. We will hold public observing sessions to give people an opportunity to look through a telescope and find out for themselves what astronomy is about,' said Mr Walsh.

Mr Walsh explained, 'Astronomy is one of the few remaining sciences where the work of amateur observers makes a substantial contribution to knowledge.'

Obituary: Mr Wilson Kukwana Yona

Mr Wilson Kukwana Yona, who retired at the end of last year, died on March 3 after a long illness. Mr Yona (64) joined the staff of the University in January 1972. When he retired, on medical grounds, he was a General Attendant in the Entomology laboratories in the Department of Zoology and Entomology.

He leaves his wife, Patience and five children, Heather, Ntombizandile, Thamsanqa, Mninimzi and Zoliswa.

Mr Yona began his schooling at the Wesley an Methodist Primary School (now Ntsika) and went on to the Higher Primary School (now Andrew Moyake). Mr Yona was a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and very much a family man. As a schoolboy he was an excellent rugby player and in later life was a member of the Lilywhites Rugby Football Club,

although he didn't play. He was seriously injured in a motor accident, which left him with a limp.

'He was able to fulfill his greatest ambition before he died - to take his son to circumcision school,' said his life-long friend Mr Milton Roxo. 'He was a peaceable man, greatly respected and loved by the community,' he said.

Before joining the Rhodes staff, he worked at Grahamstown Potteries. 'Wilson was a charming man, with a lovely sense of humour,' said Miss Sally Guye, secretary in the Department of Zoology and Entomology.

'He was a hard worker and a kind, wise philosophical fellow. Wilson was a patient, astute and reasonable man. He believed in working for change within the system. He was an unusual man. I shall miss him,' said Professor Randell Hepburn, Head of the Department.

Computer music begins to 'zing'

Mr Richard Foss, a lecturer in the Department of Computer Science at Rhodes recently returned from the 1992 International Computer Music Conference in San Jose, California.

The conference was a meeting place for academics and members of the computer music industry from across the world. San Jose is situated in Silicon Valley, an area known for its computer expertise and innovation.

The conference started with a series of tutorials on computer musicrelated topics. The rest of the conference consisted of a packed schedule of papers, posters, demonstrations and computer music concerts.

Mr Foss presented a videotaped demonstration of the Rhodes networked music system as well as a poster describing future developments. Interest for the concept came particularly from music educators needing to share large single-user facilities. However, there was also interest from a studio owner in Los Angeles who felt that the concept could be used in multiroom commercial studios. Mr Foss was asked to make the code for the system available on the internet network.

He gave a demonstration of the Rhodes audio patcher/mixer. The patcher/mixer, developed by a Rhodes MSc student Anthony Wilks, is an ideal vehicle for providing 'surround sound.'

Mr Foss tried to find an audio products company in the USA willing to manufacture and market the audio patcher/mixer developed as part of the network project. He said, 'I spent one day in Los Angeles where I contacted the company JL Cooper, a MIDI product manufacturer. They expressed interest and have asked me to send them further specifications. I then made a more formal visit to the audio signal processing company White Instruments, in Austin, Texas. I met the president of the company and the chief engineer. Interestingly, they thought of a completely different application for it. As part of their work, they set up sound systems for convention centres, conferences and airports. They are considering the use of the patcher/mixer for sound routing and level control in these

'The Rhodes University Computer Music Unit has initiated research in the field of music recognition, under the guidance of Alfredo Terzoli. The goal of work in this area is to read music scores with a scanning device and then play back this scanned music via one or more synthesizers. Probably the most impressive system is that created at McGill. They are able to scan scores of a variety of musical styles and play them back. The method is fairly time-consuming. The Rhodes approach is markedly different from any I saw at the conference and promises to be more

powerful,' said Mr Foss.

'In the field of Computer Science education, I found that the concepts taught and equipment present at Rhodes and other South African Universities to be very much on a par with the American Universities I visited. However, in the field of computer music we are sorely lacking, specifically as far as adequate training facilities are concerned. Once again the need for an audiotechnology course was highlighted. It should be a course that could also be attended by non-university candidates and that lays particular stress on post-production techniques. We must start providing an educational base for a sophisticated industry,' he said.

Ethnicity conference a drawcard

There has been a good response from prospective delegates to a major international conference to be hosted by the ISER at Rhodes in

The conference, titled Ethnicity, Identity and Nationalism in South Africa: Comparative Perspectives has aroused so much interest that numbers may have to be limited, said Professor Patrick McAllister, director of the ISER.

African nations to be represented include: Uganda, Kenya, Nigeria, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Malawi, Lesotho, and Madagascar. Delegates from the USA, UK, Canada, France, Germany, Holland, Israel, India, Sri Lanka, Singapore, Hong Kong and Australia are also expected.

Local delegates include: Professor Kader Asmal, professor of law at the University of the Western Cape and a prominent member of the African National Congress (ANC); Dr Tom Lodge from the University of the Witwatersrand, an authority on black politics in South Africa; Professor Irina Filatova, Russian historian and professor of history at the University of Durban-Westville; and Professor H W Van der Merwe, former director of the Centre for Inter-group Studies at the University of Cape Town, who will present a paper on the accommodation of Afrikaner ethnicity in the New South Africa.

Fifteen academic disciplines will be represented at the conference.

HOUSING SUBSIDIES

The University Council has resolved to reduce the amount payable by housing subsidies to participants of the housing subsidy scheme. The decrease is a result of the reduction in interest rates charged by financial institutions on housing loans.

The reduced interest rate charged by financial institutions means that monthly instalments payable by bondholders may be reduced without extending the term of the loan.

Recipients of the housing subsidy should make arrangements with the Housing Officer (Mr Neil Smuts, ext 162) to reduce their monthly instalments.

The reduction in housing subsidy will be approximately R23,00 per month per R10 000 or mort-

gage bond.

The reduction takes effect immediately and will be implemented with the payments included in the March 1993 payroll. The maximum amount of bond which will be subsidized will remain at R50 000.



New Rugby coach impressed by talent and speed of Rhodes players

Rhodes University's new rugby coach, Mr Greg Deoolan said, 'After the recent trials I was very impressed with the athletic ability of the players and I believe we could look for a great improvement on last season's results.'

Mr Deoolan, from New Zealand, arrived in South Africa on Saturday, March 6, to replace Mr Frank Shelford who could not take up the appointment.

Rhodes University's Senior Sports Officer, Mr Steve Olivier, said, 'We consider ourselves very fortunate to have secured the services of Greg Deoolan for the 1993 season. Rhodes Sports Council and the rugby players are very pleased to have him here. Since his arrival he has been playing trials and coaching the first team, and has already made an impact on the game.'

Mr Deoolan has played provincial rugby in New Zealand, and also has extensive coaching experience. He has coached in New Zealand, Canada, Australia, and the USA. He was elected player of the year and coach of the year for

a first division club side in New Zealand, was director of coaching for Alberta in Canada, and was director of Drummoyne rugby club, a first division club in Sydney, Australia. He spent the last six months in America, where he coached the San Diego rugby team, one of the best university sides in the USA.

The talent and speed of Rhodes' rugby players has impressed Mr Deoolan. 'We will use the team's speed, by setting it up with Australian forward strategies,' he said.

Apart from coaching Rhodes' 1st XV, it is hoped that Mr Deoolan will be involved in development coaching in township schools and coaching clinics in Grahamstown for both coaches and players. He will also work closely with the rest of Rhodes' coaching staff.

Mr Deoolan, who comes from Mount Maunganui in the Bay of Plenty on the Northern Island of New Zealand, said that he considered himself very privileged to be in South Africa at a time when so many positive things were happening.

PC SUPPORT - 1.2 mb or 360kb?

Although the University is now only purchasing PCs with 1.2mb (megabyte) floppy drives, most of the computers

on campus have 360kb (ki-

lobyte) floppy drives. This has left many departments in the situation where they have both 1.2mb and 360kb drives. There is a certain amount of confusion about which disks can be used in which machine and how to format them.

1.2mb drives can use both 1.2mb (high density) floppy disks and 360kb (double density) floppy disks but 360kb drives cannot read or write to 1.2mb disks.

Identifying 1.2mb and 360kb floppies

Disks labelled high density are for use by 1.2mb drives and double density disks are used in 360kb drives. In a situation where it is necessary that disks be used in both 360kb and 1.2mb drives, double density disks should be formatted in a 360kb machine as usual and then can be freely used in both types of drive.

Formatting Disks

If you need to format a 360kb (double density) disk in a 1.2mb drive it must be formatted using the command format a:/4

This method of formatting 360kb disks is not recommended as the high density drive will create a much narrower track on the disk and the disk may fail more readily.

Stiffies

In the past a few machines have been equipped with double density stiffy drives (720kb) but more recently only high density (1.44mb) stiffy drives have been available. As with floppies you can read 720kb disks in a high density drive and if you need to format 720kb stiffies in a high density
