Wage dispute: meeting this week.

In the wage dispute between the University and the Service Staff, represented by the Transport and General Workers' Union, the parties will now meet again on August 14 and 15.

Rhodes has replied to the Union's formal declaration of a dispute, and wished to progress the matter as quickly as possible. However, August 14 was the earliest date that the Trade Union official, who is assisting in the negotiations, could be available.

In terms of the formal dispute procedure, the parties must now meet on August 14, and the following day, if necessary, in a bid to settle the deadlock. If no settlement can be reached, the next step is for the parties to consider mediation to help to resolve the still outstanding issues.

The University hopes that further delays can be avoided, so that employees may receive their annual increments.

Prof to get Academy medal

A Rhodes University linguistics professor and a CSIR scientist have been named as this year's recipients of the English Academy Medal.

The English Academy of Southern Africa announced that Dr Eric Halliday, a retired scientist of the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), and Professor Len Lanham of the Institute for the Study of English in Africa (ISEA) would receive the medal for conspicuous service to English over a number of years.


Prof Lanham began his career as a lecturer in African languages, and moved on to make a significant contribution to the teaching of English to speakers of other languages in Southern Africa.

As a professor of applied linguistics at both the University of the Witwatersrand and at Rhodes, he pioneered new methods of teaching English in black schools, known as the Molteno Project, and produced a definitive study of varieties of South African English.

In 1973 he was responsible for the establishment of the English Language Teaching Information Centre of the academy.

He is, at present, honorary president of the South African Applied Linguistics Association.

The English Academy Medal will be presented at a ceremony in Johannesburg on September 28.

UDUSA CONGRESS

by Sue Middleton and John Eller Nineteen universities, represented by 56 delegates, gathered at Stellenbosch University for UDUSA's third national congress. The agenda was designed to assess UDUSA's activities and campaigns over the past year and to confront and debate the challenges and direction for the

President's Report

forthcoming year.

The President, Professor Mala Singh, set the tone by outlining some of the challenges, responsibilities and dangers confronting an organization like UDUSA in what she described as one of the most exciting and dramatic periods in South Africa's political history.

Her detailed and wide-ranging address will be circulated to RUSA members.

General Secretary's Report

This covered the activities of the Head Office Secretariat. New branches were set up at Turfloop and Vista, and structures at Venda were re-constituted. UDUSA is still not represented at the University of the Orange Free State, UPE and Unizulu. Furthermore, apart from the Transvaal, regional activities have been disappointing and attention will need to be paid to this. An office administrator has been employed and communication with branches has improved. Procedures have been developed to enable smooth transition as the Head Office moves with the new office bearers. It was pointed out that branches were not making full use of the 10% KLM discount scheme for overseas travel.

A National Co-ordinator, Dr Jon Lewis, has been employed for six months. His priorities are to set up the inter-university internal academic exchange programme and to launch a newsletter.

International contact has been made with the Association of University Teachers (AUT) and UDUSA has been invited to send two delegates to the international meeting in Edinburgh this month. The new President, Mr Ike van der Rheede (UWC), will accompany the outgoing President, Professor Mala Singh.

A number of campaigns were started during the year. These include a booklet on rationalization, the setting up of the internal academic exchange programme, and projects investigating admissions criteria, and race and gender as determinants of employment in South African Universities.

The concept of Selective Support has now been accepted both in South Africa and abroad.

UDUSA has been asked to recommend candidates for LOZAF bursaries (Dutch antiapartheid funding from various Dutch universities) and is also involved in nominating candidates for a proposed fellowship scheme for South African scholars to visit Princeton University.

The congress unanimously acclaimed the work done and the progress made by the outgoing President and General Secretary.

Where To Now, Udusa?

The future direction of UDUSA was discussed. Some areas that excited attention were:

Udusa's Image on Campus

It was recognized that UDUSA had a largely political image on the campuses and that this perception could affect its ability to attract membership. It was stressed that UDUSA was not a political organization and had no party political affiliation, nor did it concern itself solely with political issues (as witnessed by its concern with issues such as salaries, conditions of service, etc). Nevertheless, it was also recognized that UDUSA could not, and should not, divorce itself from the political arena as education in South Africa - the sphere in which UDUSA operates - is a political issue. In so far as significant changes have begun to take place in South Africa, so too would UDUSA need to adapt to reflect these

It was noted that further political developments could result in the gradual reduction of international isolation of South Africa, thus lessening the activities concerned with selective support.
