RHODES RECEIVES HALF A MILLION RAND DONATION

Rhodes has received its largest ever single donation – half a million rand from Gold Fields South Africa Ltd through the Gold Fields Foundation. The money is to be used to finance the construction of a new residence at the University.

Until such time as the Department of National Education grants the University permission to raise a loan, the Rhodes University Foundation will lend the University another R500 000 as bridging finance to meet the expected R1m cost of the residence.

Although this year academic criteria were used to limit the number of first year students accepted for study, the University still suffers an acute shortage of accommodation. The urgent need for additional facilities spurred the University's architects to complete planning, which would normally take four to five months to prepare, in the record time of seven weeks. Building is expected to start in July this year


Entrance Requirements Introduced

(extract from the Vice-Chancellor's address to Convocation, 16 May 1983:)

The most significant aspect of the year 1982 for our University was the large increase in student numbers. For the first time in history, our enrolment exceeded 3 000, and

on census day in June, there were 3 202 students, a $7^{1/2}\%$ increase over last year's figure. This was the highest percentage increase of any White university in South Africa. At the same time we faced a very high increase in the number of applications for 1983. While this was certainly a pleasant position in which to find ourselves, we needed to take a rational look at the situation before reacting to it. Clearly, Rhodes is a "small" university, and will remain so. As things stand at the moment, official university residential university accommodation is limited to approximately 1 830, and the small community of Grahamstown has reached saturation point as far as the provision of Oppidan digs is concerned. We were therefore left with the necessity of containing student numbers in the way most advantageous to an institution that strives after academic excellence. We achieved this by introducing an entrance achieved this by introducing an entrance qualification based on academic ability. In this way the "bottom" 10% of applicants, those with, on average, E aggregates, were screened out of our 1983 first year enrolment. At the same time, we have launched a fully fledged academic support programme. This programme, while operating mainly for students who come from academically disadvantaged from academically disadvantaged backgrounds, also offers courses in study skills to *all* our students. We hope that the combination of a higher basic standard of ability in our students coupled with better education in how to benefit from academic opportunity will together raise academic standards at Rhodes University in the years

to come.

occupation on 15 July 1984. It will be named after the donor, Gold Fields of South Africa Limited, and will be known as Gold Fields House.

Mr Robin Plumbridge, Chairman and Chief Executive of Gold Fields of South Africa Limited said "we are very much aware of future problems facing this country in the area of tertiary education. Without assistance from industry and the private sector, academic institutions will not be able to supply the demand for qualified people by the end of this century. Gold Fields has been very much involved in creating facilities for better technical education in the various Black states and homelands. However, we also recognise the needs within the sphere of academic education, and trust that this donation will make a lasting contribution to a University which is not only known for its high standard of teaching but also for the leaders it has given our country over many years". Mr Plumridge said that, in addition, Gold Fields has been involved with different community development projects in the Republic of South Africa. For many years his company's policy has been to plough profits back into the ground from where it draws its labour, to invest in the future and the common good of all South African people and to ultimately serve those who serve Gold Fields directly or indirectly.

Third Edition of Randell & Bax

David Sampson (1940), has revised and updated "The South African Attorney's Handbook", known throughout the legal profession as Randell and Bax. The book was first published in 1959 by Mr George Randell, former Rhodes graduate, and Mr K C Bax, both East London attorneys at the time. Increasing demand for the book within the legal profession resulted in a revised and updated second edition in 1968.

The book contains all the Acts of Parliament and statutory rules relating to the legal profession, as well as the leading Supreme Court decisions relating to the subject. The attorney's professional duties are discussed in the book, long recommended for study by candidate attorneys. In the foreword to the third edition the President of the Association of Law Societies in South Africa, Mr G E Knoll, said Mr Sampson's deep interest in the attorneys' profession and the outstanding role he has played in it, particularly in the field of legal education, are well known. "He is eminently fitted for the writing of this revision" he said.

Mr Sampson is the son of Professor Harold Sampson, a former head of the Department of Law at Rhodes University. Like his father, Mr David Sampson was a Rhodes Scholar, and studies at Oxford University.

Physical Education is an overdiversified field which risks losing its character as it becomes increasingly less 'physical'. This was the thrust of the inaugural lecture delivered by Professor Jack Charteris (1965), Head of the Department of Physical Education. Professor Charteris' lecture was entitled "Physical Education and human movement studies — Professional and Academic Directions".

Professor Charteris said a problem faced by the physical educator in an academic environment was to find a focus in human movements rather than in one of the parent disciplines such as physiology or psychology. He pointed out that it was the study of 'human movement' that makes the field of physical education unique.


Professor Charteris noted that the science of human movement could make meaningful contributions to other areas such as pediatrics, gerontology and orthopaedics. He used examples to illustrate his points, drawn from his 23 years in physical education, 15 of which were spent in Canada, where until last year he held the post of Associate Professor at the University of Guelph.

Cheryl Smart (1976) is Personnel Manager at Ready-mix Concrete in Cape Town.


D P D Smart (1964) emigrated to Australia three years ago. He lives in Westleigh, Sydney.

Obituaries

Kathleen Margaret (Kay) Abbott (née Putterill M Sc 1933) died in Pretoria in November 1982 after a long illness. After leaving Rhodes she taught for a while. She then worked as a micologist in the Fungus Herbarium of the division of Plant Industry (Dept of Agriculture) in Pretoria until her marriage to Reg Abbott. Further teaching experience followed. Then her scientific training and a lifelong interest in the English language led to her work in editing. From 1960 until her retirement in 1973 she worked as an editor in the Information Division of the CSIR. She leaves a husband and three

Dr Ronald Fairbridge Currey, M C, who was headmaster of St Andrew's College in Grahamstown, South Africa, from 1939 to 1955 and was known for his liberal views on race relations, died in South Africa on May 13 at the

Currey was born on October 23, 1894, and was proud to recall that both his parents and three of his grandparents were born, lived their lives, and died in South Africa. After being at school for a short time at Diocesan College in Cape Town he went to St Andrew's College, Grahamstown, where his contemporaries included Bevil Rudd and Basil Schonland. Rudd became an Olympic athlete and Schonland in time director of the Atomic Energy Research Establishment at Harwell in Britain.

Currey spent three years at Rhodes University, Grahamstown, and then as a Rhodes Scholar

went to Oxford early in 1913.

When war intervened Currey enlisted and was commissioned into The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders attached to The Black Watch from December, 1914, until he was wounded near Ypres in October, 1917. He was awarded the Military Cross and bar. Thereafter he spent two years at Trinity College, Oxford, reading 'greats"

He then began his long career as a schoolmaster. He was an assistant Master at Rugby for a year and was then at St Andrew's College, Grahamstown from 1922 to 1926. After three years as joint headmaster of the Ridge Preparatory School in Johannesburg he became Headmaster (Rector) of Michael House College in Natal. He held that post until 1938, when he was pressed into taking the headmastership of his old school St Andrew's, where he remained for 17 years.

After that, to the surprise of many, he accepted the post of headmaster of Ruzawi Preparatory School in Rhodesia, and held it from 1956 to

He retired in 1961 to live in Grahamstown where he acquired a charming old "Settler" house. There he and his wife Dorothy whom he married in 1924 created a civilized and active home in which they gave a warm welcome to many friends from South Africa and overseas. Though by now 67 years old he became, and remained until 1965, a lecturer in classics of Rhodes University, of which he was made an Hon. LL D.

His history of the first 66 years of that University was published in 1970. That book and his history of the first 100 years of St Andrew's College published in 1955 bear the impress of his affection for both places and his lively style. Currey was a deeply religious Anglican but not a conventional man. When moved by principle or whim he often enlivened, and sometimes shocked, those about him. His liberal views were exemplified by the fact that as early as the 1930's

Grahamstown at the end of last year at the age of 89. Miss Fowler was warden of Oriel Hall from 1946 to 1952 and again from 1958 to 1959 but her association with the University began in 1931 when she took her UED while lecturing at the Grahamstown Training College. Miss Fowler was lady warden at the height of the exservicemen's influx and had to deal with such pranks as the overnight bricking up of her residence's front door. It was she who ordered barbed wire on the residence drain pipes as a protection for her girls against young men who had only recently encountered it on the battlefields of North Africa and Italy. It was generally acknowledged that she could cope with any eventuality.

Dr Victor Norton (D Litt honoris causa 1973), for 27 years editor of the Cape Times until his retirement in 1971, died in Cape Town in May at the age of 76 after a long illness. Mr Norton joined the Cape Times in 1931, after going through the newspaper mill in Johannesburg. One of his most memorable assignments as a reporter was interviewing George Bernard Shaw on top of Table Mountain in 1932. When he received an honorary degree from Rhodes, the citation read that this honour was being accorded "to one whose career has not only been considered a paradym of journalistic skill, but who has shown a continuing concern for the quality of the human community as well". Dr Norton leaves his wife and two daughters.

Miss M G Richardson died on 1st June this year. Miss M G Richardson entered Rhodes University College in 1930 and completed the B A degree in 1932, the Higher Ed Diploma in 1933, and the M A in English in 1934. While at Rhodes, she was noted for her play

worked for the Red Cross and served in the hospital Voluntary Aid Detachment every weekend. At the end of the war, she served on the committee formed to aid returning soldiers. In July 1950 she returned to Victoria Girls' High School as principal and as Superintendent of the largest girls' hostel in the country. She retired as principal in December 1975. Under her guidance the school made a name for itself both academically and at sport.

When the late Ronald Currey retired from St Andrew's and left Grahamstown, she was elected to represent Eastern Province Schools on the Rhodes University Council in 1953. She served on the Rhodes Council without a break until she resigned, owing to physical incapacity, in 1981 a total period of 28 years. For the greater part of that time she served on the Finance and General Purposes Committee, and on innumerable other committees.

In 1959, and again in 1967, she was President of the South African Teachers' Association and served on the General Committee of the Association from 1955 until 1970.

She served also on the Training College Advisory Committee, and on the Albany School Board after her retirement. Her generous support of the Old Rhodian Union over many years is also well remembered.

Walter Schnell (1926) was a senior viceprincipal of Dale College in King William's Town for 14 years ending a 44-year teaching career at Dale. After matricualting at Dale in 1921 he came to Rhodes where he earned his rugby colours and was selected for the E P team which won the E P Grand Challenge Cup. Mr Schnell, who died in Vereeniging leaves his wife Nita and four daughters.
