

DIGS BURGLARIES Change Venue

Mad Hatters

THE holiday period once again produced its share of digs robberies, with empty houses an easy target for thieves.

One digs was broken into six times over December and January and was left with only desks, chairs and a sofa.

Richard Gardner, one of the occupants, said that clothes, bedding, a fridge, a cooker and smaller items like calculators were taken.

"The last time they came back they also took the mattresses. There are signs that they slept in the place, because beer bottles were everywhere and they urinated on the floors and smashed plates and things."

The landlady is in Port Alfred and was notified after the first break-in, but she went away before she could put in burglar bars and an alarm system. Temporary burglar bars were put in but the burglars just broke

"A friend of mine was in Grahamstown and checked on the house, but they still broke

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Quartz watches in," said Gardener.

Another student whose digs got broken into lost about five thousand rands worth of clothes and linen.

Steven Hitchcox returned at the end of January to find all of his winter clothes gone, along with his duvet, sheets and several other smaller things.

"They broke a window and bent the burglar bars to get in. It must have been a child who got in, because an adult would not have got in through such a small opening."

Everything that could go through the window was stolen, so luckily my computer was too big to be taken."

He said his landlord lived right behind his digs, but did not report the robbery.

"He had the window fixed but didn't bother checking the room. There was a padlock on my door, but the police could have opened that if he had called them."

"I don't expect anything to be recovered, because I could only report it now and they must have broken in at the beginning of the year," he said.

The police do not have statistics specific to student digs, but report that over December and January more than 100 break-in's were reported in Grahamstown.

Fortunately, this is not significantly more than in previous years, and a decrease in the number of robberies is also beginning to show, said Captain Christo Bosch of the Grahamstown Police.

He said that where they usually deal with

about twenty cases over a weekend, they only had five recently.

"In February and March things quieten down a little bit, but then it picks up again at the end of the year when people leave their houses unattended," he said.

He suggested several ways in which students can safeguard their houses during the long vac:

Notify the police of the dates when your house will be empty, so that they can check

Leave a contact numbers where the police can reach you in an emergency.

If you are renting a place, try to get the landlord/lady to put in an alarm system, security gates and burglar bars.

Try to take as much as possible with you when you leave, since it is usually smaller items such as video machines and hi-fi's that

Joy Allcock, the Oppie Secretary, said that students in digs must make sure that their possessions are insured.

"Make sure that your burglar bars are secure, because robbers frequently get into a house by breaking a window and bending or removing the burglar bars," she said.

She also suggested that you don't encourage street children to beg at your digs, as some children are used to break into houses.

"Although it is really sad to see these children beg, rather buy them milk and bread from OK or somewhere in town don't give them food from your house."

"I haven't done my costing yet," said Gyles,"but when it is done, the prices should drop a bit".

The move puts Hatters on street level with space outside for tables, increasing the size of the cafe. "I'm a lot more accessible now," says Gyles.

Having run the old Mad Hatters for two years, Gyles is confidant he's found a niche; "We've seen places coming and going in Grahamstown, I think that I've got the formula right."

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
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Increase in Rhodes Academic Staff

RHODES' academic staff has been increased by 35 new members.

Two professors, 24 lecturers, one research assistant and six teaching assistants have been appointed, as well as a director of Goldfields Environmental Education and a director of the New Media Laboratory in the Journalism Department.

The appointments have been made purely on merit, as Rhodes does not have an affirmative action policy in place.

The Director of Personnel, Bruce Smith, said: "I think that the University's selection committees would like to attract women and blacks to fill the positions but a lot depends on who applies. If all who are applying are white and male, that is who you will end up with. In terms of academic staff Rhodes has find jobs in Grahamstown.

employed six foreigners. We try to recruit the best people internationally." He added that the nonacademic staff was almost entirely South African.

Smith said the number of new appointments was stable and that it was not a significant growth from last year's.

He said, however, that Rhodes East London had definitely grown since the Social Work Department moved from Grahamstown last year.

His deputy, Dan Davel, said that Rhodes would never experience substantial growth in either staff or students because there are a limited number of students that can be accomodated in the town. He added that potential staff members are often discouraged from applying for posts at the University, because spouses in other employment sectors are unlikely to also

NEW House has become the second res in two years to change into a women's residence.

Students to be booted from Res

STUDENTS who have not submitted their mininum initial payment (MIP) before they return to res face being sent home before reg-

Students with problems have been advised to contact the Dean of Students Moosa Motara, Registrar Stephen Fourie or Tony Long, Registrar of Finance, so each case can be assessed individually.

In the past, a residence deposit of R265 paid the previous year, was enough to ensure accommodation in res, even if the MIP was late.

Rhodes' Student Representative Council has objected to Admin's

The SRC's General Secretary, Unathi Malunga, said they were shocked by Admin's decision.

This will inconvenience both the returning students and the first years who may not be aware of this new policy, she said.

Malunga said Admin told the SRC that students who failed to pay their MIP before they arrived to move into res, would be accommodated in the San for one night after which they would be sent home. Students whose MIP's have been received and students with full bursaries would be accepted into residences.

The SRC has resolved to request clarification on this new policy.

The regulations concerning the payment of fees are clearly spelt out in the University calendar of 1997. The new regulation however, is not included in the calendar.

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University faces subsidy cuts

Lincoln Mali, a spokesperson for so far 300 applicants have been the Department of Education, said granted assistance, with 270 the figures released, which he students allocated the Council loan. could not disclose, were Mali said institutions should find preliminary.

discussions between the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Finance to see if the education budget could not be increased.

He said the education budget should be looked at within the context of government spending and within the constraints the national government was facing.

Mali emphasised that there was no reason tertiary institutions should see education as more important than other social services, like housing, providing jobs or health services.

He said institutions were given the what the University was going to figures in order to guide them in their budget planning with a clear indication that those were provisional figures and were supposed to be confidential.

Responding to the media releases by rectors of different universities who complained about the cuts, Mali said that all those vicechancellors who gave subsidy cut information to the media acted irresponsibly, as they were informed these were confidential preliminary figures.

Mali could not say when the final figures will be released due to the "highly sensitive discussions that are still going on".

Rhodes finance registrar Tony Long said they were not told the figures were confidential and the University could not "keep quiet about it".

He said the University was expecting a subsidy of R75m from the government, but was told they would get R8.9m less and the decision was only made known to the University late last year.

Long said student fees would not be affected by the cuts as they would remain at the eight percent increment agreed upon by management and the SRC last year. According to Rhodes Dean of Students, Moosa Motara, who sits on the Tertiary Education Fund of South Africa (TEFSA) board, the government has allocated R250m to TEFSA, instead of the requested amount of R450m.

In light of this cut, the University, with the knowledge of the SRC, has decided to convert the Dean of Students bursary into a Council loan, at an interest rate similar to that offered by TEFSA.

Both Motara and Long said they anticipated that with conversion of the bursary into a loan the

Mboneni Mulaudzi University would be able to help more students this year.

SIX candidates will receive Honourary Doctoral degrees at Rhodes' graduation ceremony in

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
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MONSTER MUSIC

Last year, I had the honour of an invitation to the Oriel Hall formal dinner at Rhodes University.

Being somewhat anxious whether a red blouse would be suitable apparel at such an auspicious occasion, I had mentioned to my host exactly what I would be wearing ans she had informed her house subwarden who had granted her full approval.

Sex: Most common and enjoyable pastime next to drugs and drinking. Figure out the details for yourself. See CONDOM.





The Christian legend established Valentine's Day as the festival of St. Valentine who was beheaded on the 14th of February by order of the Roman Emperor Claudius II.

One version of the legend claims that when the Roman Empire Wars broke out, Claudius ordered that no marriages should be celebrated and that all engagements must be broken off. Apparently he thought he could form a larger army if men remained single, because they would be less likely to hold back from going to war if they had no families.

Valentine began marrying people in secret. He was arrested and beheaded, but became known as the patron saint of lovers.

On the eve of the 14th of February young women put their names into a bowl and each young man drew a name. The couple continued to be partners at all the festivities of the rest of the year and they often fell in love.

The tradition of Lupercus continued well into the 5th century despite the Church's efforts to abolish pagan holidays.

The Church eventually revised its tactics by moving the date up one day and changing the name of Lupercalia to Valentine's Day. With the advent of the 20th century the mystery surrounding Valentine's Day is still here.


