De Beers House opened

Monday, April 11, 1988 was a day of celebration at Rhodes, when the newest residence at Kimberley Hall was opened by Dr Julian Ogilvie Thompson, Chairman of De Beers Consolidated Mines.

De Beers House, which houses about 80 male students, took a year to build at a cost of R1,74 million which was donated to the University by Anglo American and De Beers Chairman's Fund Educational Trust.

It was decided to name the new residence De Beers House to maintain the symbolic link between the University and the man after whom it was named, Cecil John Rhodes. Rhodes was not only a shrewd businessman. He was also a philanthropist, and the trust fund endowed in Rhodes' Will continued the work he had started, in helping to lay the foundations for the fledgling Rhodes University College in 1904.

Over the years, the De Beers commitment to Cecil John Rhodes' concern for society has continued, and Rhodes University has benefited from this commitment many times. In 1974 De Beers' Social Resonsibility Fund was combined with that of their sister company, Anglo American, to form the Anglo American and De Beers Chairman's Fund and subsequently, the Education Trust. It was through the Education Trust that De Beers was able to fund the building of the new residence. The donation of this money was just one of several special donations made to universities to mark the centenary of De Beers.

At the official opening of De Beers House, Dr Ogilvie Thompson said that the Chairman's Fund was particularly impressed with the pioneering work done by Rhodes to open its campus residence to students of all races.

"The availability of suitable accommodation conducive to private study is a basic requirement if any individual is to make the best of his or her study years," he said.

"Halls of residence offer much more than simply board and lodging. Hall life involves social inter-action and is specifically intended to create a special camaraderie among the inhabitants of individual halls. This meeting and mixing with fellow students should be of major assistance in integrating black students into university life," Dr Ogilvie Thompson stressed.

At a luncheon in the Kimberley Hall Dining Room to mark the opening of the new residence, the Vice-Principal, Dr Roux van der Merwe, explained how the residence system at Rhodes has had to grow, especially in the last 20 years, to keep pace with the growing number of students requiring accommodation.

Thanking everyone concerned with the planning, design and construction of De Beers house, Dr van der Merwe stressed that such expansion to provide bigger and better facilities for students at Rhodes would not be possible without the generous support of the mining industry and the world of business in general, especially in these times of subsidy cuts.

Dr van der Merwe called upon the residents of De Beers house to use the unique opportunity the new residence afforded them to build on the joint traditions of De Beers and Rhodes and, in so doing, to "create a special community in the future, on the basis of this illustrious past".

De Beers house is a model residence,

designed for both economy and comfort and is not marred by some of the drawbacks which have arisen with some other residences on campus. The design of the new residence was based upon that of the adjoining Goldfields House. The choice and pattern of the brickwork blend in with that used in the surrounding residences, but De Beers house has an identity all of its own.

ISEA Award

Dr Lawrence Wright, a Lecturer in the Department of English at Rhodes University, has been awarded the 1988 Alan Macintosh Travelling Fellowship, administered by the Institute for the Study of English in Africa (ISEA) at Rhodes.

The award will enable Dr Wright to undertake research into the place of Shakespeare in post-colonial Africa.

"My proposed research will have value in helping to determine the future of the literature curriculum in our rapidly changing society, and will also have specific application to the development of a series of Shakespeare texts tailored to the needs of the second language speaker in southern Africa", Dr Wright said.

His research will involve a trip to Britain to consult libraries and academic experts, as well as contact with educators and academics in different parts of post-colonial Africa.

Dr Wright, who previously won Rhodes and Commonwealth Scholarships, is project leader for the Shakespeare for Students in Southern Africa project, Executive Editor of Shakespeare in Southern Africa and a member of the National Executive of the Shakespeare Society of Southern Africa.

The Alan Macintosh Fellowship, endowed by Mrs Marjorie Macintosh in memory of her husband, was established with the intention of improving the standard of the teaching of English in South Africa in ways likely to prove most effective, and is offered by the ISEA in alternate years.

Shades of Adamastor

To mark the quincentenary of Bartolomeu Dias' rounding of the Cape, the Institute for the Study of English in Africa (ISEA), in association with the National English Literary Museum (NELM) published an anthology of poetry entitled *Shades of Adamastor*.

The anthology was compiled and introduced by Professor Malvern van Wyk Smith, Head of the Department of English at Rhodes.


"The mythical figure of Adamastor was chosen as the key image for the anthology because there is a large amount of material in which the encounter between the explorers and the brooding spirit of Africa is depicted. Luis de Camoes, the 16th century Portuguese poet, created the allegorical figure of Adamastor to express the hostile spirit of the Cape of Storms.

"Adamastor is an extremely powerful image, which runs through the work of a number of poets, from quite early writers to those of the present day. For Roy Campbell, Adamastor became the image for the whole of Africa in his valedictory poem written in the 1930's," Prof van Wyk Smit said.

Other poets include Guy Butler, David Wright, Roy McNabb, Anthony Delius and Sydney Clouts.

"Poets are grappling with the problem of how to amalgamate their European origins with their lives in Africa, and the Adamastor image appears in the works of even such recent poets as Stephen Watson, who uses this anthropomorphic image in *The Moun*tain (in *This City*, 1986).

"I have tried to cover as much ground as possible in the anthology. It is not just a celebration of the endeavours of the Portuguese explorers. We need to be aware of the fact that their feats are not welcomed by black poets — their work is a story of conquest. So the anthology sees those voyages from several angles — from heroic endeavour to black outrage," Prof van Wyk Smit said.


Paula Brown (Devine 1982) is working in Pietermaritzburg as a pharmacist.


Elaine Danckwerts (1937) has retired to Adelaide in the Cape after teaching in Johannesburg for 30 years.

Edwin Prince (1982) is now teaching at Mary Waters School in Grahamstown.



Dr Tom Baker (1923) in November, 1987.

James Taylor Davidson (1927), in November 1987. In 1934 he was appointed as senior lecturer in Physics at the University of Fort Hare. In 1965 he became that university's first Professor of Physics. He spent much of his spare time coaching cricket at Fort Hare and Alice and in 1945, in recognition of his services to sport, the new playing fields at the University of Fort Hare were named after him.

Edith Dovey (Ruddle 1915) in Uitenhage in June 1987, at the age of 91. She was one of the first women students at Oriel Hall. She later trained under Dame Elsie Fogarty at the Central School of Speech Training and Dramatic Art in London, where she was awarded two first-class certificates in dramatic examinations, and was runnerup for the Gold Medal in her final year. Edith was a founder member of the Uitenhage Amateur Dramatic and Music Society and started the Edith Dovey Play Festival in 1951. She was a founder member and president of the Uitenhage Branch of the National Council for Women. She is survived by her four sons, 14 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

William Rhodes Green (1934) in Pinetown, Natal, in November, 1987, at the age of 70. A former Town Clerk of Pinetown and a town councillor, he was also a member of the Pinetown Rotary Club and was writing the history of the club at the time of his death.

Neville Meyer Heyman (1968) in Sydney, Australia, in August, 1987, after a courageous fight for his life. He is survived by his wife. Jackie.

Reginald (Rex) Jubb (1924) in East London in October, 1987 after a long illness. His book, The Freshwater Fish of Southern Africa, first published in 1967, is still the standard reference work on the freshwater fish fauna of southern Africa. He was a prolific writer and his papers were always well-illustrated with his own photographs and by his wife, Hilda's beautiful colour paintings or tinted photographs. He was a meteorologist in the then Rhodesia and Nyasaland in the 1930's and his job provided him with ample opportunity to pursue his interest in natural history and he started to send fish specimens to Dr J L B Smith in Grahamstown in 1931. He retired from the Met service in 1957 and accepted a post in the Department of Ichthyology at Rhodes. He served on the Board of the Albany Museum for many years and was an Honorary Associate of both the Albany Museum and the JLB Smith Institute.

Henry Lazarus (1923) in Bulawayo, Zimbabwe in October 1987. At the time of his death he was the oldest lawyer in practice in Zimbabwe.

Wilfred MacRobert (1936) in Cape Town in October, 1987 after a long period of ill health. A founder member of the Liberal Party, he was actively involved in community projects and was the first chairman of the Kalk Bay and District Ratepayers' Association. He was a widower and is survived by three children and six grand-children.

Dr Iain McDonald (1938) in Harare, Zimbabwe, in January, after a short illness. Dr McDonald was the director of the Tobacco Research Board in Zimbabwe, a post which he held for 27 years. Dr McDonald obtained a BSc in Chemistry and Zoology at Rhodes, after which he was commissioned into the Royal Corps of Signals and served in the United Kingdom, Sicily and Italy. In 1946 he returned to the Chemistry Department at Rhodes to take up a post graduate scholarship. He was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship and continued his academic career at Oxford where he obtained his BA and MA and was made an Associate of the Royal Institute of Chemistry. In 1948 he returned to Zimbabwe and joined the Chemistry Department of the Ministry of Agriculture. From 1955-1957 Dr McDonald studied at North Carolina State University where he obtained his Doctorate with a thesis on nitrogen nutrition of tobacco. He was appointed Director of Kutsaga Tobacco Research Station in 1960. In 1975 he was nominated by the International Tobacco magazine as one of their "Tobacco Men of the Year" acknowledging him as an incontestable authority on tobacco agronomy. His interests were not confined to tobacco and he played a prominent role in other fields of agriculture in Zimbabwe as well as serving on numerous boards. For his service to agriculture, Dr McDonald was awarded the Order of the Legion of Merit in 1977. He leaves his wife, Gwen, and two children.

Dr Brian Nunn (1969) in Durham, North Carolina in September, 1987 at the age of 35. At the time of his death, Dr Nunn was an assistant professor or physiology at Duke University and was well known for his outstanding contributions to the field of physiology. He read for his PhD at the Imperial College, London. His colleagues at Duke University described his death "not only as an enormous loss to his family, but also to the family of physiologists, and a tremendous loss to science".

Jenny Oertel (1980) in East London in February after contracting malaria while on holiday in Malawi.

Dr Alan Paton (DLitt, Hon Grad 1972) at his home in Natal in April. A tribute to Dr Paton in the May, 1988 issue of *Rhodeo* read: "The recent death of South African author, Alan Paton, has left a void in white liberal circles which will surely remain unfilled for some time. The literature and ideals of one of South Africa's most respected political commentators were hightly regarded by people throughout the political spectrum in South Africa and the world.

"In the 1950's, Paton played an integral part in anti-apartheid organizations through his involvement in the non-racial Liberal Party

"After the collapse of the Liberal Party in 1968, Paton dedicated his life to literature and chose to become a political observer and commentator rather than a direct participant. Among the many books he wrote were *Too Late the Phalarope, Cry the Beloved Country*, and more recently, *Ah, But Your Land is Beautiful*".

J S Peake (1925) in August, 1987.

Dirk Pienaar (1940) in Pretoria in October, 1987. At the time of his retirement in 1985, he was director of chemical technology at the South African Bureau of Standards.

Prof Walter Schaffer (1923) in Haifa, Israel, in April 1987. Prof Schaffer's career at Rhodes was protracted due to difficult financial circumstances and he had to interrupt his studies for long periods and work as a motor mechanic and salesman to finance them. At the time of his retirement to Israel in 1972, Prof Schaffer was assistant principal for academic affairs at the University of Cape Town.

Rev Ian Scott (1966) in August 1987. He had been seconded as a Minister of Methodist Church to become a regional chaplin for the Department of Prisons. He held the rank of Colonel at the time of his death.

Dr Edith Verschoor (1972) in East London in January. Her teaching career spanned 40 years and her greatest interest was in black education. Apart from being a devoted teacher, she instilled a love of the English language in her pupils.

Bishop Alphaeus Hamilton Zulu (DD, Hon Grad, 1977) in February. From an early age, Bishop Zulu was seen to be dedicated to the establishment of fellowship in the field of race relations and the spirit of reconciliation which became a driving force in his life. He qualified as a teacher and at the age of 19 he was appointed Principal of the Umlazi Primary School near Durban.

He enrolled at the University of Fort Hare at the age of 30 and successfully completed a BA degree. In 1939 he entered St Peter's Anglican Theological College in Johannesburg where he studied for two years and obtained his Licentiate in Theology and Diploma in the Faculty of Divinity.

His strong adherence to the Anglican faith remained a powerful influence in his life and he was ordained to the Ministry as a Deacon in December, 1940 and appointed assistant curate at St Faith's Mission in Durban, where he remained for 20 years. In 1942 he was ordained Priest and his services to the Diocese of Natal were recognized in 1957 when he was made an honorary Canon of St Saviour's Cathedral of the Diocese of Natal.

He was elected Bishop of Zululand in 1968 — a post he held until his retirement on his 70th birthday in June 1975.
