Old Rhodian Reunions

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Gold Fields Biotechnology Centre established

A DONATION of R750 000 from Gold Fields has led to the establishment of a Biotechnology Centre at Rhodes.

The centre is involved in the practical and commercial exploitation of biological systems, mainly in the fields of Microbiology and Biochemistry. For example, research done in these laboratories on the fourth floor of the Zoology and Entomology building, has been applied to the treatments of effluents and waste waters. The Centre is also involved in the recovery and production of valuable chemicals and vaccines, the use of molecular biology for animal breeding, and antibiotic production.

Professor John Dunc, head of the Department Biochemistry and Microbiology, said Rhodes offered the country's first biotechnology postgraduate course in 1988. Gold Field's Chairman and Rhodes Governor, Dr Robin Plumbridge, said Gold Fields has a special interest in the establishment of this Centre with its potential for research into the field of mineral biotechnology. Great advances have already been made in 'bug leaching', which is the biological extraction of gold and other metals from refractory and low grade ores.

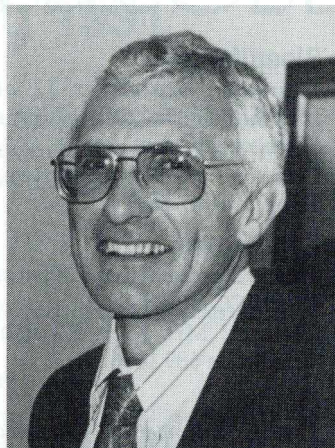
Dr Plumbridge opened the Centre on Thursday, April 11.

New Vice-Principal joins Rhodes family



DR Michael Smout, formerly Vice-Rector (Development) of the University of Durban-Westville, took up his post as Vice-Principal of Rhodes on May 1. Dr Smout was born in London during the Blitz. He was brought up in Natal and worked at the University of Zimbabwe from 1968 to 1976. He worked at the University of Durban-Westville from 1977 until his appointment as Vice-Principal at Rhodes. He obtained his MSc in Urban Geography from the University of Natal and his PhD in Urban Geography and Planning from the University of London.

In 1973 he was awarded a Commonwealth Academic Staff scholarship for post-doctoral study in the United Kingdom and completed his MA at the University of Newcastle in 1975.

Throughout his academic career, he has maintained close contact with the planning profession and has worked as an associate with both Zimbabwean and South African planning firms conducting research, preparing plans for submission and offering opinion in planning courts.

Dr Smout was appointed Vice-Rector (Development) at Durban-Westville in 1987 and has acted as Rector on four occasions since then. He has served on the Human Sciences Research Council main committee for Geography and Environmental Planning, the liaison committee of the Natal Parks Board and has also been a consultant to the Development and Services Board in Natal. Dr Smout is married to Anne and they have two sons.

MR Stewart Dorrington (1945), of King William's Town, who has served on the Rhodes University Council for eight years was recently elected chairman of Council.

Mr Dorrington replaces Mr LB Green who died in September last year. Mr Dorrington was born in Aliwal North in 1925. He was educated at Queen's College and became a radio operator/air gunner in 1944. He graduated

with a BSc and diploma in Leather Science from Rhodes in 1949. He joined the King Tanning Company in King William's Town in 1950 and retired from the company in December 1987 after 38 years of service, the last two spent as Senior Managing Director and Group Consultant. He is presently the chairman and managing director of Strategic Planning (Pty) Ltd in Bisho. Mr Dorrington is the Chairman of LIRI Technologies (formerly Leather Industries Research Institute) and of the Leather and Footwear Industries Association. He is also director of several companies and trustee of the All Saints College in Bisho. Mr Dorrington is also fluent in Xhosa. 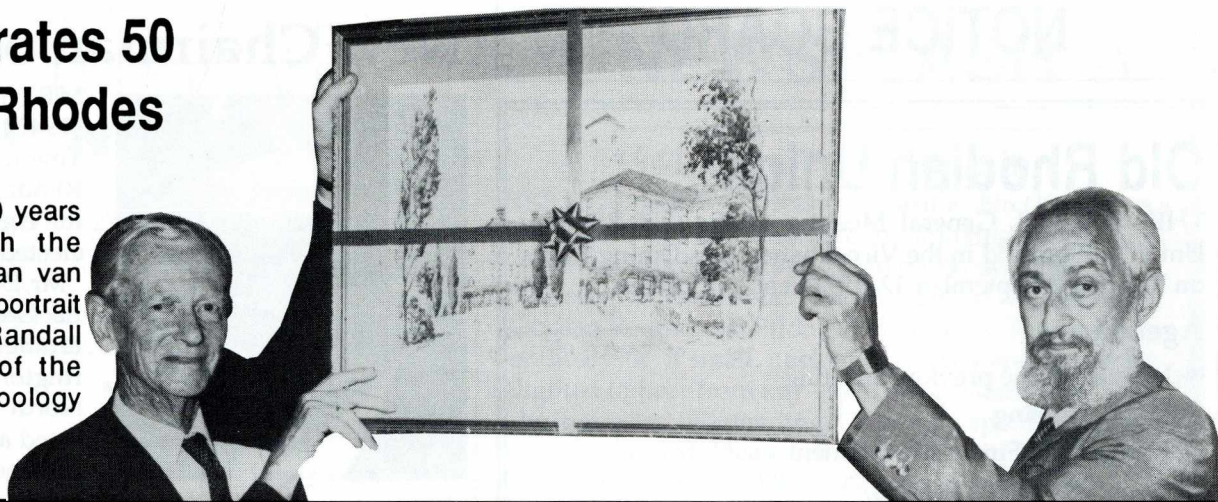

St Peter's to be restored

THE Rhodes University Council has passed plans for the restoration and renovation of St Peter's Home, which will house several of the University's English language-centred activities.

St Peter's Home, which was built to house the Sisters of the Anglican Order of the Community of the Resurrection, became part of Rhodes in 1974, when the Grahamstown Training College closed and the University acquired the grounds and buildings.

The Home was designed by William White-Cooper who contributed much to Grahamstown's present appearance. It was erected in stages between 1887 and 1892 to provide a home for the Sisters and to accommodate an orphanage and St Peter's School.

Only one wing of the building has been used since Rhodes acquired it because of the unsuitable internal configuration for teaching or research.

Over the years numerous plans for its renovation have been considered but all proved too expensive. When

the former Vice-Principal, Dr Roux van der Merwe, arrived at Rhodes in October 1986, he took an interest in the building because of its splendid facade and its focal point on the campus.

He was looking for ways to use the building without major internal reconstruction when the Director of the Institute for the Study of English in Africa (ISEA), Dr Laurence Wright, suggested that it house the University's English-centred activities.

The plans were passed and part funding was obtained from the Gold Fields Foundation, the Claude Harris Leon Foundation and the Johannesburg Consolidated Investment Company.

The building will house the ISEA, the national headquarters and training centre of the Molteno Project for literacy in English in black primary schools, and the Dictionary of South African English. It will also include a small extension to the Rhodes Museum, whose curator, Mr Ken Robinson, has maintained an on-going interest in the building and was a prime mover in assuring its restoration. It is hoped the work will be completed next year in time to celebrate the centenary of St Peter's Home.

OLD RHODIAN NEWS

1930s

Ken Dimbleby (1936) had been married to **Alice (Carter 1936)** for 50 years when she passed away in June last year. In Alice's obituary in the November edition of this Newsletter we mentioned that she had written the 'Aunt Betty' column for the Weekend Post's Post Junior Club. The Dimblebys have had four generations successfully involved in the newspaper business. Ken worked on the newspaper in Port Elizabeth for 31 years when he retired as Deputy Editor of the Evening Post in 1979. His son, **Keith (1958)**, works for the Evening Post. Ken's father and grandfather were both with the Argus Newspaper. Ken served on the Rhodes University Council for 37 years from 1950 to 1986.

Jack Rennie (Staff 1931) and **Bea** celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary in Grahamstown this month.

Robert Story (1931) featured in the Queen's Birthday Honours list in August 1989 when he was awarded the medal of the Order of Australia for service to conservation and national parks.

1940s

Harry Birrell (1946) and his wife, **Sylvia**, have retired from St Andrew's College and the Diocesan School for Girls in Grahamstown respectively, where they

While at Rhodes Barbara was captain of the women's swimming team and a member of her house committee. She later became a Natal squash player and received awards for her contribution to synchronized swimming.

Janice Farquharson (1946) has joined the Sunday Times as a columnist.

Jean Kathleen McCauley (1948) was widowed in 1983 and is now retired with three children and three grandchildren.

John Nelson (1944) recalls certain friends from his first year at Rhodes in Botha House. These are **Mark Dovey (1944)**, **Tips Muller (1944)** and **Keith Nicol (1939)**. During John's first year he joined the South African Artillery, was flown to Italy and finished the war there. He returned to Rhodes in 1946

and graduated in 1947. He then worked his passage to England as an assistant chemist on the Empire Victory. He taught at Clifton College for a year after which he worked in the chemical and fertiliser industry in England, Holland and Rhodesia for five years before returning to teaching in 1953. John taught in what was then Umtali and Lusaka for the following sixteen years. In 1971 he emigrated to Australia and for the last eight years has been director of studies at Scotch College, a private school of over 1000 pupils. He recently saw **Jolyn Rymer (1944)**, a radiologist, in London and was visited by **Mike de Wet (1949)** a couple of years ago. John Rex (1946) was a lecturer in Sociology at Leeds and Birmingham Universities from 1949 - 1964; the first professor of Sociology at the University of Durham from 1964 - 1970; professor of Sociology at the University of Warwick from 1970 - 1979; and director and research professor in Ethnic Relations at Warwick University from 1979 until his retirement in September 1990. Trevor's interests are bird and game watching and trout fishing with his wife, son and two daughters. He also runs and cycles and has participated in a number of marathons and the Argus Cycle Tour.

Andre Jaquet (1963) has written to let us know that the past three years have been hectic for him. Early in 1988, he became Head of the Namibia and Angola Directorate at Foreign Affairs, and was involved in meetings with an Angolan envoy to examine ways of ending the war in southern Angola. He was also involved in formal negotiations between South African, Angolan and Cuban delegations under the watchful eye of American and Soviet observers. During this time he travelled extensively.

Mr Ronald Guy Winn (1950) in Zimbabwe on July 15, 1990.

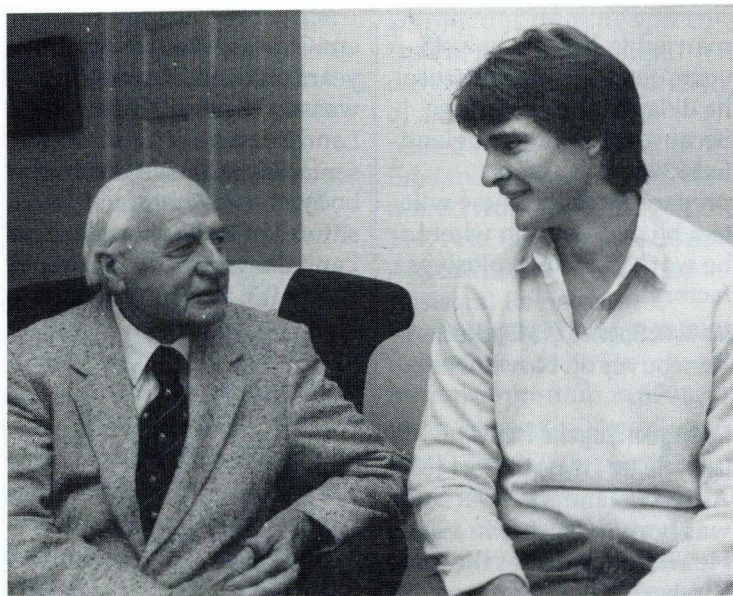
Prof Rennie completes 20 years of 1820 Settler research

A former vice-principal, Professor JVL Rennie, recently completed 20 years of painstaking research into one of the most famous 1820 Settler parties, the Pringle party, and a four-volume work is presently being printed by the University's printing unit. Professor Rennie retired from Rhodes in 1970 after a distinguished career. He was appointed professor of Geography in 1937. Professor Rennie is himself a descendant of members of the Pringle party, the widow, Elizabeth Rennie, who came out with five children, and Robert Pringle, father of Thomas. There were 24 altogether in the party - 12 men, six women and six children. One of the widow's sons, John Rennie, was Professor Rennie's great-grandfather. He is the great-great-grandson of Robert Pringle.

The Rennie family settled at Baviaans River in the Bedford District on the farm, Eildon. One of the anecdotes in the work is a hunting trip in which John Rennie found himself confronted by a lion which lacerated his back before being frightened away by the crowd of hunters. The lion's skull was later sent to Sir Walter Scott in Scotland.

The Director of the National English Literary Museum (NELM), Professor Andre de Villiers, said Professor Rennie's work was important because it laid out in great detail the social composition of the Pringle party as well as the vicissitudes that the party had to undergo in preparing for the trip to South Africa. It also dealt with the problems encountered after their settle-


ment in the Eastern Cape, and follows up with the fortunes of most of the original Settlers in the party. Professor de Villiers said that the work will be published in the first half of 1991 and 150 sets of the volumes would be on sale at R60 plus packing and postage.
