SA jazz pianist dies

vented by the Code Stone Servery CHRIS McGreggor, one of South Africa's foremost jazz pianists, died in France on Saturday morning without having fulfilled his wish of returning home.

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McGreggor died peacefully in

his sleep at his home.

In 1964 he left the country with his band, the Blue Notes, which consisted of himself. Dudu Pukwana, Louis Moholo, Nikele Moyake, Johnny Dyani, and Mongezi Feza.

They were on the road from 1959 to 1964 and had been playing in townships in defiance of the Group Areas Act and the Separate Amenities Act. He and his band eventually left the country.

Mr McGreggor returned to South Africa briefly in 1987 when he came to claim the Carling Circle of Jazz Festival

award and played with Winston Man Runku and Barney Rakulaine.

He also made a short visit in the 1970's when he played at festivals in Port Elizabeth and So-

weto.

In Europe, he and the band played at the Antibes Jazz Festival in the south of France and later started busking on the streets of Nice.

They were gradually offered more gigs in Europe and Britian and finally established themselves at Ronnie Scott's Club in London.

When three of the band's members died in exile -Moyake, Feza and Dyani - the Blue Notes disbanded.

Mr McGreggor performed solo for a few months before he formed a band called the Brotherhood of Breath. - SAPA
