## Education under construction

The increasing demand for continuing educational services in the broader community is being met by Rhodes University with the establishment of a centre which will provide an umbrella venue for short courses in a variety of fields.

Brainchild of a combination of Rhodes staff, including the Vice-Principal, Dr Michael Smout, the Director of LIRI, Professor Peter Rose, the Director of Finance, Mr Tony Long and architect, Ms Ronwyn Coulson, the venue, known as the Centre for Continuing Education, offers residential, course and conference facilities for delegates visiting the campus.

"The CEC is ideally positioned to explore the increasing demand for courses which has been identified in the outside community," said Vice Principal of Rhodes, Dr Michael Smout. "Local institutes such as the Leather Industries Research Institute, LIRI, the Rhodes University Mathematics Education Project, RUMEP, and the Department of Ichthyology and Fisheries Science, DIFS, to name but three, are already presenting regular residential courses," he explained, "and these will be perfectly complemented by the new complex. The Centre will also be available to organisations wishing to use it for their own courses, executive thinktanks and to individuals attending the National Arts Festival."

Outside organisations can benefit from the CEC by using it as a conference venue and through a system of "joint ownership". This tax deductible option entails the sharing of operating costs but participants will also enjoy preferential and rebated use in respect of their staff members who attend any courses presented there. Where profit accrues through the use of the Centre by other, 'non-member' bodies, this will be distributed to the joint owners, probably in the form of rebates.

According to Prof Rose, there has already been extensive interest shown in the proposal by outside organisations, especially those in the footwear and leather industries, and this has led him to predict a 70% occupancy rate in its first year of operation.

His belief in the viability of the concept is shared by potential participants, who agree that it represents an ideal way to save on conference costs well into the future. Prof Rose also pointed out that the presence of residential facilities at the Centre will help overcome the problem of distance learning which is often encountered in continuing education. This, added to the ability to 'peg'


the rising costs of residential accommodation at courses and conferences, is a great attraction.

Whilst Rhodes University will initially fund the development, LIRI Technologies already has plans for assuming the role of prime 'shareholder' in the project and is seeking the right to interest itself, over a period of time, in up to two-thirds of the complex. Although the campus has played host to regular courses in the past, the delegates who attend them have often been housed in different residences, a situation not conducive to team-building, threatening the all-important aspect of networking. The Centre for Continuing Education will go a long way towards mitigating this problem, and will promote instead, a feeling of "collegiality and congeniality" said Dr Smout.

#### Horse's mouth

Set on a particularly quiet part of the campus, overlooking the Hamilton Dam, the Centre is relatively protected from interruptions, and consists of an initial 24 rooms (which may be extended to 40) each equipped with a single bed, wardrobe, writing or work surface, shower, toilet and basin. The conference area is equipped with video facilities and other lecture aids and will also be able to serve as an after hours relaxation area with a bar and servery. A wooden deck along two sides of the conference room offers a lovely view over the dam.

In order to get it straight from the horse's mouth, so to speak, we had a chat to Old Rhodian, Natasha Stretton (1986) who attended a course offered by our Department of Education during the weekend of 8 and 9 March. Together with eight other delegates from all over South Africa, she was housed at the CEC. She described the accommodation as "clean, comfortable and compact" and was impressed by the quiet atmosphere, having expected to be assaulted by student noise! She was very pleased to have her own room and shower and enjoyed residence food in the Kimberley Hall

## Study addict on course for his degree

Meet 87-year-old Christoffel Botha arguably Rhodes' oldest student. At the end of last year Chris Botha wrote Geography I which will become his 5th credit course towards his degree which he hopes to receive from Rhodes.

He was born in Adelaide in 1910, grew up in Somerset East and matriculated from Gill College in 1930.

You may correctly assume that he is a study

addict. When he left school he commenced a nearly 40 year career with the then South African Railways and Harbours. During its course he studied for and passed every examination for which he was eligible; these included goods and passenger qualifications, Road Motor Services, elevator accounting and telegraphy. During the same period he attended technical college and completed several part-time courses, including bookkeeping. He studied, as well, through the Alliance Français "to get extra training and to

learn the French language", which he reads and writes fluently. "I don't speak it too well", he smiles, "because I have never managed to swallow half the words, as the French do!"

While working for a period in Cape Town, he also enrolled as a medical student at UCT, attending full-time while working night shift for the SAR&H! This period of study came to an end when he was transferred to Touws River - his late wife was then matron at the Touws River hospital.

Further transfers saw him posted to Worcester and Windhoek before returning to East London in 1954.


studied Xhosa through UNISA. He is literate and fluent in this language.



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## BRIONY STRUGGLING FOR PARTIAL RECOVERY AFTER SERIOUS ACCIDENT


Briony Chisholm (1993) is a lovely, fresh faced, intelligent young woman twenty two. She spent her birthday, on 2 February, in the Spinal Ward of Libertas Hospital in Cape Town where she has been diagnosed as quadriplegic. Briony completed her finals in Pharmacy at Rhodes last year and was on her way home to

in which she was travelling as a passenger was involved in an accident near Cradock. She sustained an exceptionally severe neck injury with a fracture dislocation of the fifth and sixth cervical vertebras. This means the spinal cord was almost severed in the lower neck. Her body and back are totally paralysed, though there is a tiny bit of movement in her arms.

Because of the severity and permanence of Briony's condition, she will need numerous nursing and mobility aids as well as ongoing care and attention. Even with the help of the excellent medical aid to which the Chisholm family belongs, these aids, which include two different types of wheelchairs, a hydraulic hoist for getting in and out of a bath or bed, and a modified vehicle for going to and from physiotherapy, are extremely costly.

Friends and sympathisers on the Western Deep Levels mine have taken Briony's predicament to heart and have started a fund to raise cash for all this equipment and care. By the end of February the response

had been excellent, with R15 000, nearly enough for a motorised wheelchair, having been raised. But this, of course, is nowhere near enough to cover all the expenses, so the organisers of Briony's Fund, as it is known, are hoping that others will join in trying to help this plucky young woman regain a future.

This can still happen - despite various setbacks, some of them serious, there has been some improvement in Briony's condition. She is able to raise her right arm a little and there is a possibility of movement in the wrist. If she can gain enough movement to be able to use a computer, it means that Briony will be able to take up the offer of a position in the hospital pharmacy. And an application has been sent for a Service dog, trained by the Guide Dogs Association, to keep Briony company and fetch and carry odds and ends.

#### HISTORY OF THE GRAHAMSTOWN GOLF CLUB: 1891-1996

This paperback of 91 pages, written by Hugh Eales and Rob Cross, tells the story of the Club and many of its personalities since its foundation in June, 1891. Amongst the many incidents recalled are the building of four successive courses, a murder in 1907 with the victim's body being hidden beneath the Clubhouse floor, exhibition matches by famous visitors and entertaining and sometimes hilarious comments culled from more than 3000 pages of minutes and miscellaneous Club papers. Early Presidents of the Club include Sir Leander Starr Jameson notorious raid precipitated the Boer War, the Hon Arthur Douglas, land surveyor turned ostrich farmer, who rose to become Prime Minister and Sir Thomas Graham, Judge-President of the Eastern Cape, SA tennis doubles champion and captain of WP cricket. The book includes six pages of photographs and five pages of entertaining incidents which form part of the lore of the Club. All profits from sales of this book will go to a fund established to rehabilitate the course, which was devastated by a hailstorm of unprecedented fury in December 1993. Apart from the damage to the greens and Clubhouse, the full extent of the disaster became apparent only in the following three years, when all but 40 out of nearly 4000 pine trees on the course died from a fungus attack, directly resulting from the hail damage. A once heavily wooded course now demands continuous removal of fallen and decaying trees. The Grahamstown Golf Club would be most grateful for the support of Old Rhodian golfers who must have enjoyed many happy hours on the course in years past and who would surely wish to see it restored. ### **OBITUARIES**

#### Marjory Helen Hill (1922)

(Obituary from Daily Dispatch)

A former principal of Clarendon Girls' High School, Miss Marjorie Hill died in December 1996, at the age of 91. Miss Hill was educated at Riebeeck College in Uitenhage and after graduating from Rhodes, qualified as a high school teacher. At the outbreak of World War 2 in 1939, she joined up and as a captain and officer-in-charge in the artillery, she was based on Robben Island and took part in the training of artillery recruits. At the end of the war she went to East London and took up the position of headmistress of the East London Girls' High School, now known as Clarendon. In 1956 she retired and joined her family on the farm "Lidney", returning frequently to teaching at various schools in the Eastern Cape. With her unfailing and active interest in people, animals, gardening and nature, and with her practical concern for the needs of others, Miss Hill was kept busy in all but the last few years of her retirement in East London. She has left the memory of a rare and lovely personality to her great nieces and nephews and many friends and colleagues to whom she was dear.

#### George Colville Clarke (1927)

George was a student at Rhodes from 1927 -1931 where he gained his BA degree and HED. He played in the Rhodes tennis team in 1928 and 1929 and was the Secretary of the Students' House Committee in 1930. Upon qualifying he taught at St Andrew's School in Bloemfontein, Afrikaans Boys High in Pretoria and Jeppe Boys High in Johannesburg before the Second World War broke out. He qualified as a cypher officer and was sent to Kenya and Abyssinia, reaching the rank of Major before he was demobilised and discharged because of ill-health. Upon his return to civilian life he was appointed an Inspector of Education, stationed in Lydenburg for some years and then in Pretoria. Upon retirement he farmed citrus in Rustenburg and then at De Wilder where he lived until his death at the age of 89 on 24 April 1996. George leaves his wife, Alice, a daughter and grandchildren.

#### Cyril Monro Hone (1932)

Cyril Hone's son wrote with the sad news that his father passed away on 10 Septemebr 1996. Mr Hone was a Rhodes Scholar in 1935, a regular member of the Rhodes 1st XI hockey team and the South African Universities flyweight boxing champion in 1934.

#### Michael Lloyd (1935)

(Obituary from Daily News)

The death of former Daily News and Sunday Tribune assistant editor, Michael Broomfield Lloyd, aged 79, in October 1996 was mourned by the journalism profession. Mr Lloyd, who also edited The Diamond Fields Advertiser in Kimberley, was born in Lesotho in 1917 and schooled at Michaelhouse before graduating from Rhodes University. He served with the 4th Brigade of the 2nd SA Division in north Africa during the Second World War. Captured at Tobruk, he later produced a daily news-sheet, The Ripley News, which informed fellow POWs on the Polish border of the impending Russian invasion before the German guards knew. After Mr Lloyd retired in 1977, he was ordained as a priest in the Anglican Church, a calling he followed until he retired again in 1985. Mr Lloyd leaves two sons, Rob and Anthony, and his second wife, Claudia. His first wife of 32 years, Helen, died in 1980.

#### Michael Roberts (Staff: 1935)

(Obituary from Grocott's Mail)

Professor Michael Roberts, who died in Grahamstown on New Year's eve at the age of 88, was an internationally renowned historian, his entry in the International Who's Who being twice as long as those for Bill Clinton and John Major. Born in Lancashire, he was educated at Brighton College and Worcester College, Oxford. In 1935, at the age of 27, he was appointed Professor of History at Rhodes University, a position he held with distinction until 1953, when he moved to Queen's University of Belfast. In 1941 he married Ann Morton. During his 18 years at Rhodes there was an exceptional inflow of talented students and among Roberts's own students were some who came to be well-known local figures, such as Guy Butler and the late Bill Burnett, as well as five historians who went on to fill chairs at universities - Leonard Thompson, Rodney Davenport, Jeffrey Horton, Basil le Cordeur and Andrew Duminy. On his retirement from Queen's University in 1974, Prof Roberts and his wife moved back to Grahamstown, where he continued his writing in his office at the Institute of Social and Economic Research. His immense knowledge earned him awe and respect from colleagues and students alike and many honours were bestowed upon him during his illustrious career. He received two honorary doctorates, from the Universities of Stockholm and Rhodes. In 1960 he was elected Fellow of the British Academy. Michael Roberts must have been one of the most distinguished, most renowned scholars ever to have worked at Rhodes. He leaves a daughter, Jane, who lives in Australia.

#### George Pearson (1940)

(Obituary from Eastern Province Herald)

Former Victoria Park High School Principal and university sports star, George Pearson died in December 1996, aged 74. One of Port Elizabeth's champion dahlia growers, Mr Pearson was Principal of the school from 1965 to 1982. He was instrumental in forming the school's first Parent Teachers' Association and developing the playing fields. Born and raised in Sterkstroom near Queenstown, he enrolled at Rhodes in 1940 but broke off his studies to fight in the Second World War. After resuming his studies and graduating with a degree in education, he taught at Selborne College in East London and Queen's College in Queenstown. He was Principal of Berlin Secondary School before taking up his position at Victoria Park. While at University he earned colours in both tennis and rugby and he coached both sports while teaching. Mr Pearson leaves his retired music teacher wife, Pixie, a daughter, four sons and six grandchildren.

#### Dr Neville Robertson (1945)

(Obituary by H B Birrell) Dr Neville Robertson died on 2 October 1995, after a long illness. He grew up in Southern Rhodesia where he was head prefect and top academic at Milton High School, Bulawayo. He came to Rhodes in 1945 and made his mark at the University in a wide range of activities. He majored in mathematics and psychology for his BA and wrote Honours in psychology in 1948. He lectured in 1949 and completed a UED in 1950. Neville was on the SRC and was a member of The Founders Hall House Committee. As a sportsman Neville was one of Rhodes' best sprinters and also represented the University at rugby and cricket. In 1953 he married Barbara Eddy (1945) and they both taught in Bulawayo for a decade. In 1965 he accepted a United States Embassy Scholarship for qualified teachers to study for a Masters degree at Indiana University. The Robertsons returned to South Africa in 1974 but emigrated to the USA in 1981 where they both obtained doctorates at Indiana University; Barbara in history and Neville in education. He was also Trustee and Secretary of the Rhodes Charitable Trust. Neville had a remarkable intellect, fantastic memory and a lifelong interest in Southern Africa and its sport. He will be remembered for his reliability and consistent love for his family and friends.

#### Rev Peter Hinchliff (1946)

(Obituary from The Times)

The death of Peter Hinchliff on 17 October 1995 deprived the Church of the Province of South Africa of its leading historian, and Oxford of a professor of ecclesiastical history whose wide range and balanced judgement made him an invaluable colleague beyond the bounds of his disciplinary specialism. Hinchliff was born in South Africa, where his father, an English priest, had worked since 1914. After graduating at Rhodes University he studied theology at Oxford, returning home for ordination at Grahamstown to a curacy to Uitenhage. There he met and married Bunty Whitehead, whose gentle warmth sustained him over forty years in a devoted family. As the squash and hockey-playing subwarden of St Paul's Theological College, at Grahamstown, and from 1960 Professor of Ecclesiastical History at Rhodes, Hinchliff influenced many future clergy of different denominations, and through his preaching as Canon and Chancellor of Grahamstown Cathedral, he played a notable part in the rising opposition within the Church to apartheid. This combination of preaching and academic work was the strong thread running through a public life. He spent 15 years as chaplain at Bailliol College, Oxford, and then took up the long-vacant chair of Ecclesiastical History at the College. Peter Hinchliff was a good man whose memory will be treasured by those who knew him. He is survived by his wife, Bunty, three sons and a daughter.

#### Jimmy Newson (1951)

(Obituary from George Herald)

Jimmy Newson, well known in the motoring industry in Southern Cape and the "Grand Old Man" of George's fishing fraternity, died in July 1996, at the age of 82. At the age of 17 he entered the motoring industry, which he served for 16 years. At the age of 37 he accepted an offer to study leather research at Rhodes University, after which he was appointed manager of the Modern Shoes shoe factory in George. He worked there for 16 years before retiring in 1963. He was, however, soon persuaded to re-enter the motoring industry and worked as manager of the panel beating section of the CP Nel group in George for a further 16 years. Mr Newson was known for his high standard and quality of work. He had a strong interest in angling and was one of the founder members of the George Angling Club in 1945. He served on the committee for 27 years; as chairman for 21 years. He leaves a son, Robert, a daughter, Leonissa, and two sisters.

#### William Leslie Hazlewood Shuter (1954)

Professor Shuter, aged 59, died unexpectedly on 19 March 1995. Bill obtained BSc (1956) and MSc (1958) degrees from Rhodes University and a PhD from the University of Manchester in 1963. He returned to Rhodes to lecture in the Department of Physics and Electronics from 1963 to 1965 and then moved to the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, to start a research program in radio astronomy and astrophysics. He was professor in the Department of Physics from 1965 to 1995.

Bill was a source of numerous interesting scientific ideas and gave great service to the astronomical community. He was a well prepared teacher who found greatest enjoyment in the undergraduate engineering project labs. Bill is survived by his wife, Beverley and by two sons, William and Edward. He is missed by all of his family and his many friends and colleagues.

#### Ian Duncan-Brown (1956)

(Obituary from Daily Dispatch)

A prominent business man and property developer, Ian Duncan-Brown died in October 1996, aged 58. Born in East London, he founded the Dimbaza Foundries in 1975 and stayed with the company until he retired in 1990. He also owned industrial and commercial property. Ian went to school at St Andrew's College in Grahamstown and studied at Rhodes and UCT before he was selected as a Rhodes scholar and obtained an MA in chemical engineering at Oxford. He spent many years as managing director of engineering and manufacturing companies both in the United Kingdom and Johannesburg before moving back to East London. Mrs Trish Duncan-Brown described her husband as a keen nature conservationist who loved the Chalumna area where he spent his last

#### Crystal Edmunds (Copeling) (1956)

(Obituary by Mary Scott (1959))

Crystal Edmunds died on 1 May 1996 after a long and painful illness, cheerfully borne. She is survived by her husband Paul Edmunds (1958) and three daughters. She started her Rhodes career as an inkette in Phelps House, majoring in English and Latin. Crystal was a kind and generous friend, and also admired as a colleague for her dedication and creative achievements as a teacher, researcher and writer of children's fiction. She made a significant contribution to the teaching of English in South Africa. Having completed a Masters degree in Education at the University of Stellenbosch, she went on to become a senior lecturer in English at Barkley House and then at the Cape Town College of Education, with which Barkley House merged. As a teacher Crystal was continually seeking new and stimulating content

and styles of pedagogy, and was held in high regard and affection by her students. Aware of the importance of critical reflection on one's own work and the value of sharing ideas with colleagues, wherever they may be, Crystal contributed to a number of international conferences, especially the annual International Association for the Teaching of English as a Foreign Language Conference, where she drew the attention of her audience to the complexities of teaching English as a "second" language in South Africa. Her last research paper was given at the Domains of Literacy Conference in September 1994, where her presentation showed that the very recent and debilitating treatment of her illness had not affected her intellectual powers. The achievement of which Crystal was most proud was two series of stories in English for children Snap and Ginger and Pegasus. These stories were based around incidents from the warm family life she shared with her husband Paul, whom she met at Rhodes, and her three daughters. Crystal was always a welcome visitor in London and academics from there, on visits to South Africa, were always assured of generous hospitality with plenty of good conversation - and South African wine - at Wedge Corner, the home she and Paul created so lovingly at Ida's Valley. A loyal friend, Crystal kept in touch with many of her Old Rhodian contemporaries overseas and is sorely missed.

#### Roy Collocott (1967)

(Obituary from Freight & Trade)

Roy Collocott, founder of Cape Town recruitment consultancy Roy Collocott Agencies, died in Cape Town in September last year, after a long illness Born in East London in 1947, he grew up in Rhodesia where he completed his schooling at Umtali High. He completed a BCom degree at Rhodes in 1971 and later joined Safmarine where he spent nine years, finally as container export manager. Roy then joined a recruitment agency and left in 1984 to establish his own. Described by his colleagues as vital and energetic, a great sportsman and a people's person with a wicked wit and a big heart, Roy is survived by his wife, Jeanette, two sons and a daughter.

#### John Sinclair (1967)

(Obituary from Saturday Star)

The advertising and marketing industries were shocked by the sudden death of John Sinclair, aged 47, in May last year. John was the chairman of the Association of Advertising Agencies (AAA) and CEO of Lindsay Smithers FCB. John gave years of inspiring service and leadership to the advertising industry, a champion for freedom of commercial speech, self-regulation, education, affirmative action and a closer liaison with government. He joined the FCB group in 1978 and Lindsay Smithers, South Africa's oldest agency, founded in 1926, grew under his leadership. John was described by his colleagues as a man of strong opinions, prone to action and totally dedicated to the success of his clients. He was a great motivator with an uncanny ability to help his colleagues achieve their highest potential. John will be also remembered for his outstanding human attributes of generosity, loyalty and friendship. He is survived by his wife, June, and children, Tammy, Kevin and

#### Geoffrey Hutchings (1975)

(Obituary from Natal Witness)

Professor Geoff Hutchings died tragically in a motor car accident in November 1996, aged 59. His daughter, Sarah Schafer of Cape Town and his grandson, Timothy, aged 3, were also killed in the accident. Geoff was born in Bulawayo and attended the King Edward VII school in Johannesburg. He obtained his PhD from Rhodes in 1985. He was the Dean of the Faculty of Arts at the University of Zululand, where he had also been head of the English department for the past nine years. His wife, Anne, is a renowned botanist. Geoff was widely admired, both as an academic and as a person, and he will be greatly missed in the academic community.

#### E A (Tommy) Thomson (Staff: 1976)

(Obituary from Effective Farming)

Tommy Thomson died suddenly in July 1996 after an operation. He was the Eastern Cape editorial advisor of Effective Farming and a "hands on" farm economist who earned the respect of his fellow farmers, clients and colleagues by attacking real problems with a unique mixture of courage, humour, intellect and sheer force of personality. After matriculating, Tommy put in a stint of practical farming before spending two years at Cedara Agricultural College and completing a degree in agriculture at the University of Natal.
