The New Eden Grove Complex

Rhodes University's multimillion rand Eden Grove complex was officially opened in April this year.

The massive futuristic external structure is like no other building on campus and as such, it links the University's old-style ivory towers to the new millennium as well as connecting the old campus with the new St Peter's campus. The main entrance is grand, with glass doors designed to allow more natural light in, one of the University's requirements. Inside, the fittings are impressive, with glass and spotlights adorning the structure, making it look like an upper-class shopping mall. Site manager Royston Bowles said if the building had wings "it would probably take off".

much natural light is allowed in, the building has a distinct feeling of space, creating a lovely atmosphere for what will become the hub of student activity on campus.

About 60 percent of the R21 million spent on the construction and servicing of Eden Grove has flowed into Grahamstown's economy. Rhodes Estates division director Les Reynolds said "There is a wonderful spin-off for Grahamstown. This was achieved through the use of local contractors CM Heunis and Johnny Bowles, the purchasing of materials like bricks and cement locally and through the workers spending their wages here". Co-ordinator for the building contractors, Neels Heunis, said only sub-contractors for the specialised services not available in Grahamstown were hired from out of town. A total workforce of



The Eden Grove complex is fully operational and has relieved pressure of lecturing space and has therefore vastly improved Rhodes' service to students. The complex houses a dining room and two carpeted auditoriums seating 450 and 150 students respectively, with state-of-the-art sound systems and comfortable, modern swivel seats. The top floor includes seminar space that can be divided into three halls through partitions. The theatres have hi-tech computers which make visual teaching a pleasure and eliminate the overhead system, which students sitting at the back find difficult to read. Both the Registrar's division and Cory Library have moved into the building.

The complex houses a 90-machine computer laboratory. This new lab will relieve pressure on the already congested computer labs on main campus.

While the building may be modern in comparison to some of the University's other assets, the roof was specifically designed to blend in with the surrounding architecture. Due to the fact that so about 100 people was employed, although at peak times about 200 people were working on the project.

The name Eden Grove was originally attached to a property on the south west side of Grahamstown adjoining the Botanical Gardens and the Military Headquarters, now the site of the main campus of Rhodes University. In April 1884 the Eden Grove property was purchased by Bishop Allan Beecher Webb, Bishop of Grahamstown, as the future home of the fledgling Community of the Resurrection of Our Lord.

A contemporary description reads: "Eden Grove stood in a pretty nook in the hills on the south west side of the city ... On the property were two cottages well back from the road (Somerset Street) and a lodge at the drive gates. The largest or 'long' cottage was a single storey building with a stoep covered with flowering creepers. It looked eastward over a garden with an orchard and flowerbeds.

Rhodes University Investec Business School

Professor Gavin Staude (1963), who has been head of the Department of Management at Rhodes University since 1982, was appointed Director of the newly established Rhodes University Investec Business School.


Since 1991 Professor Staude has also been Visiting Professor at Durham University in the United Kingdom, where he spends one to two months each year in their Business School, teaching a course on strategic marketing in the full-time MBA programme. He has also taught courses at the University of Cape Town and the University of the Witwatersrand Business Schools and has been a consultant on management development for companies in South Africa and the United Kingdom.

Professor Staude holds a Master of Business Administration degree from Cranfield Institute of Technology in the United Kingdom and a PhD degree in Business Administration from Rhodes University. He has completed further programmes of study at the Cranfield Institute and at Boston College in the USA. Professor Staude has been on the staff of Rhodes University since 1968. He has written and co-authored numerous articles and three books.

will thus be possible to build in project management electives which will be of particular interest and relevance for certain market sectors, particularly those with close links to Rhodes University. These would include pharmacy management, managing the arts, museums, financial services and Internet marketing and e-commerce, as well as the footwear industry. The School will capitalise on the International Chair of Entrepreneurship, a joint venture between Rhodes University, the Port Elizabeth Technikon and the University of Limerick in Ireland.

According to Professor Staude, the course will be differentiated, integrated and intuitively logical, which will facilitate marketing of the programme in a somewhat cluttered market. Students will be required to write a work-based dissertation on some aspect of "excellence", thus contributing to the body of knowledge in this area.

In line with the Business Excellence model, all applicants will be required to write the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT) and there will be an appropriate minimum score for acceptance. The School will also offer certificate programmes for middle managers in general management, marketing and financial management.

The Rhodes University Investec Business School plans to introduce a Masters in Business Administration (MBA) degree based on the South African Business Excellence model, which is based on accredited quality models in the USA and Europe. This will be the flagship activity of the School, off which all other initiatives will hang.

The Excellence model is applicable to all organisations, whether manufacturing or service, profit or non-profit, private sector or government. It

Another activity will be "Impact Research", which involves the establishment of a Case-Writing Unit for publication as well as a teaching resource, and structured research along the lines of *Fortune* magazine's "Most Admired South African Companies". Strategic alliances with various business organisations will be forged and the establishment of a Leadership Development and Research Unit will be explored. Various management development programmes are also



Quite near one end of it, but facing southward, was the 'Orange and Green House', a double storey cottage with a balcony covered with a potato-flower creeper. At one end was a clump of sweet-scented lemon trees, under which one passed to reach the dairy at the back."

Another contemporary says: "We were struck with the beauty of the spot, a bowery dell in which orchards of fruit trees appeared to be surmounted with woods of incense-bearing pine and eucalyptus, which gave back their fragrance to the South African sun, a sort of little Garden of Eden about which troops of angels might be imagined to revel."

The Sisters of the Community retained the name Eden Grove for the land on which St Peter's Home, their mother house, and other buildings (including the Grahamstown Training College) were later constructed. When Rhodes University acquired the property from the Sisters in 1975, it too retained the name of Eden Grove.

planned, which might include, for example, a twoto three-week residential programme for the motor industry and a programme for the financial services.

Other initiatives include an annual conference on "Strategies for Excellence" alternating between East London and Port Elizabeth; alliances with organisations such as the Institute of Marketing Management in mounting subject-specific courses in the Eastern Cape; and alliances with universities such as the Durham University Business School in mounting courses in which they have developed core competencies.

Short courses on 'Burning Issues' are also planned. These would cover topics such as Internet marketing and e-commerce, developing emotional intelligence amongst employees and change management. Professor Staude has planned various outreach programmes for schools in the Eastern Cape in order to develop an interest in, and passion for, business.

He believes that there is likely to be immediate support for the School from the founding members of the SA Excellence Foundation. The Eastern Cape happens to be the driving force behind the SA Excellence Foundation, with about 40% of its members based here.

Old Rhodian State Herald flagged for Award from the President

Professor Roddy Fox, head of the Geography department recently had a conversation with Mr Fred Brownell (1959), our State Herald. Rhodes Research Unit backs SAPS

MTN-sponsored unit establishes memorial fund to help crack crimes

The MTN Centre for Crime Prevention Studies, based in the Rhodes University Psychology Department, is a new high-tech crime busting initiative aimed at catching serial killers and other habitual offenders. The Centre was launched in September 1999 and is a collaborative project developed by Rhodes' investigative psychologist Dr Mark Welman (1993) and other academics, along with South Africa's top serial killer expert, Micky Pistorius. Rhodes University is proud to be associated with this important initiative. This venture, which has drawn sponsorship from cellular giant MTN to the tune of R1.5 million, is designed to identify and track serial killers while cutting down on police work.

Dr Welman said that crime was the most serious problem facing South Africa, which ranked as the second most dangerous country in the world behind Columbia. He said the national murder rate was nine times the international average, rape figures were the highest in the world and crime was costing the country R80 million a day.

brother's residence as points of operation, and the match was so precise that the profile was admitted as evidence in his trial.

In a big boost for the war on crime, the Centre recently received one of the most advanced computer software programmes in the world, worth about R20 million, from the Office of the Attorney-General in Washington State. The Seattle-developed programme, known as HITS (Homicide Investigation and Tracking System) can process millions of database records and hundreds of variables in minutes and, once up and running, it will provide SAPS detectives and police nation-wide with a valuable tool to combat crime by providing instant access to information on known criminals.

Earlier this year the Centre announced the establishment of the Brenda and Kia Fairhead Memorial Fund, which will lend immediate and long-term support to the cause of effective policing.

The establishment of the fund came in the wake of the brutal abduction and murders of Mrs Brenda point. Following discussions with various police units, Dr Welman approached the Fairhead family and asked if they would be willing to allow the establishment of a fund, intended primarily to boost police readiness, in memory of Brenda and Kia. Mr Nigel Fairhead indicated that the family felt this would be a fitting way in which to honour their memories as well as keeping in focus the threat that South Africans of all walks of life face on a daily basis.

The primary purpose of the fund, which will be administered by the MTN Centre for Crime Prevention Studies at Rhodes University, is to enhance police readiness and capabilities in situations where lives are or may be at risk. The key focus will be on ensuring that in life-threatening cases the police are able to operate at maximum efficiency.

Speaking on behalf of the Fairhead family, Judge **Jos Jones** (1959) said that the family valued the efforts put in by police units during the operation and welcomed the establishment of the fund. He

Dr Welman joined forces with Micky Pistorius to develop this strategy, based on FBI and Scotland Yard principles, to combat crime. The Centre has started a national database of offenders that identifies perpetrators by their behaviour. This information is backed by an "informed offender profiling system" – a computer software package that "reads" information about specific crimes taken down by detectives at the scene. A profile of the offender is generated and any matches with offenders logged on the database are shown.

The Centre's trump card is a highly advanced computer system, dubbed the Dragnet, which interprets crime data to provide an indication of the location where an offender lives or from where he operates. Dragnet has been used successfully in several British investigations, and led to the arrest of the Mardi Gras bomber. The self-named Mardi Gras bomber was recently convicted for terrorising Londoners with home-made pipebomb attacks on Sainsbury's stores and Barclays Bank branches in the city. A generated Dragnet profile cracked the case after identifying the suspect's home and

Fairhead and her 11-year old daughter, Kia, at the Fish River Bridge, just outside Port Alfred. The Centre lent investigative support to SAPS units during the two-day operation.

Dr Welman said that the case had highlighted an urgent need for such a fund. He praised the dedicated police officers involved in the operation but noted that the operation had revealed a lack of technology and equipment, which had hampered the search mission. On the first day, private funding had to be procured for the use of a helicopter in the search for Mrs Fairhead and her daughter, and it later emerged that even the winch used by the search and rescue team to recover the bodies of the victims had to be sponsored. The sophisticated system which was used by the MTN Centre to assist in directing the search for the victims and the suspects was also sponsored by the private sector.

In investigations such as this, police units simply do not have the time to go through the usual channels in applying for assistance or sponsorship from the private sector. Equipment or support which is needed, is required immediately, not at a future "... THE FAMILY

said that Mr Nigel Fairhead was very moved by the gesture and saw it as an appropriate memorial for his slain wife and daughter. Dr David Woods (1959), Vice-Chancellor of Rhodes University, said that the University supported the establishment of the fund very strongly and appealed to the private sector to contribute to it. "It is an unfortunate reality of South African society that any person, irrespective of position or background, can find themselves in a position where their life depends upon the police having to act immediately or effectively. The commitment of police officers on the ground was yet again demonstrated in the Fairhead case and this fund is our way of expressing a commitment to support these officers in the performance of their duties," he said.



"First years' lights had to be out at 10pm or 10.30pm. If you had an evening out, you signed the book and crossed off your name when you came in that night. I think we were allowed one eleven o'clock evening a quarter. One came to Rhodes to study and it was a terrible disgrace if a first year failed.

1938 was the last Rag before the war in 1939. The students were divided up to decorate floats; ours was a pirate ship. George had obtained a very long bamboo stick to act as a mast. The procession went as usual until the return trip along Beaufort Street – the bamboo proved too long and took the telephone wires down. I don't know, but guess that Old Bolly (Major EB Walker) got us out of the scrape. Bolly was the University Registrar and forever rescuing and bailing people out of trouble. The students loved him. He always had a bulldog called Binks. In my day it was Binks VI. It followed him to his office and slept under his desk."

Robert Crass (1939) retired as head of the scientific section of Natal Parks Board. At 78 he is looking forward to enjoying the amenities of Amberglen, Howick with his wife. He says it is a pleasant community, with a dam to fish in and offers a good lifestyle. One of his other hobbies is writing letters to the *Natal Witness*.

Obituaries

Iris Lovell Carter (Graham)(1918)

(Obituary by her daughter, Lovell Stark)

Iris Carter, believed to be the oldest living Old Rhodian, died on 30 October 1999, just two months short of her 100th birthday. She was fit and very mentally alert until she suffered a stroke in 1999, which resulted in her death. She still read avidly, played bridge and walked every day.

Iris was born on 4 January 1900 and brought up in Grahamstown. She attended DSG before going to Rhodes. She played first team tennis for her school and for Rhodes and obtained a first class pass in her MA degree.

Her father was Francis Graham and her uncle was Sir Thomas Graham, Judge President of the Eastern Province. Her ancestor Colonel John Graham founded Grahamstown.

She married the late Clifford Carter and they farmed at Westminster in the Free State before retiring to Port Alfred 18 years ago. They bought a cottage at the Damant Lodge old age home and she lived there on her own until her death. She leaves her only surviving daughter, Mrs Lovell Stark who moved from London to Port Alfred 14 years ago.

Jacob H Spilkin (1925)

(Obituary from the EP Herald)

Former Port Elizabeth attorney Jacob Spilkin, described by a colleague as "a doyen of the legal profession in the Eastern Cape" died at the age of 94. He was one of the Province's most colourful and most respected legal practitioners. A leading senior counsel described Mr Spilkin's passing as the "end of an era", while another commented that he was a man of the courts and not one for sitting behind a desk

Mr Spilkin's career spanned over half a century, ending with his retirement in 1988 as one of the oldest practising attorneys in the Cape.

In 1921, he won a Port Elizabeth municipal gold medal for coming first in the Eastern Cape matric exams. He received a scholarship to study at Rhodes University where he majored in Classical studies and achieved first class honours in Latin and Greek. Legendary Rhodes University professor Grant McKerron described Mr Spilkin at the time as a "man of acute intelligence and of exceptional ability."

Said Mr Spilkin's son Sidney: "After getting his degree with distinction, he was awarded a scholarship to Oxford University but his father could not afford the boat fare, so they had no option but to enter him into the legal profession where he started a practice in Port Elizabeth in 1929."

Prominent figures who articled at the firm Spilkin & Miltz include Truth Commission member **Dr Wycliffe Tsotsi (Honorary Graduate 1999)** and former Deputy Safety and Security Minister Joe Matthews.

Rev Dr Gordon Pitts Wiles (1927)

(Obituary from The Daily Telegraph)

The Rev Dr Gordon Pitts Wiles, Professor Emeritus of religion at Connecticut College, and accomplished painter and a linguist, died aged 89. He spoke seven languages and was the author of many books, including *Paul's Intercessory Prayers*. He had an outstanding record in World War II. During the battle of Sidi Rezegh in North Africa, he carried the wounded and dead from the battlefield, without rest, for two days and a night, under enemy fire before he too, was wounded and captured. During his time as a prisoner of war in Italy, he learnt to paint from other prisoners and his work has been widely exhibited. He was awarded the MBE for helping hundreds of fellow PoWs to escape, also eventually escaping himself.

Rev Wiles was born on 10 December 1909 in Kimberley, the son of Marion Gilbert and Clement Wiles who had emigrated from England. He attended Kimberly Boy's School and Rhodes University, where he received BA and MA degrees in Classics. He earned his theological degree at Westminster College in Cambridge, England and then an MA degree from Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge. He earned his PhD in religious studies in 1965 from Yale University.

He first served as a minister in a church in Cambridge then returned to South Africa where he was a travelling secretary for the Student Christian Association. He then returned to parish work in Alice. He spoke against the government's racist policies at the time and later moved to the United

States because he felt South Africa was not the type of place where he wanted to raise his children.

He married Margaret Jones of Indianapolis in 1937. Mrs Wiles was a teacher and a noted concert violinist. In addition to his wife, the Rev Wiles is survived by two sons, Dr John C Wiles, a New London physician, and Peter Wiles of Portland.

Mavis Louise Pratt (Wearn)(1931)

(Letter from her son, Derek Pratt (1994))

My mother, Mavis Pratt died at the Carlisle Lodge old age home in Fish Hoek, aged 84. She was joyful when I registered at Rhodes for a BTh (Hons) and told me that her four years at Rhodes were some of the happiest times she had spent. As her eyesight failed we often would go through the Old Rhodian Newsletter, reading mainly the obituary columns and she remembered many of the students from the early thirties. She died on 17 August 1999.

Dr Edgar Theophile Verdier (1931)

(Obituary by his daughter, Nadine Hooten and Prof Doug Rivett)

Edgar Verdier died in July 1999 at Montpellier in France. The son of French Protestant missionaries in Lesotho, Edgar went to school in Aliwal North and proceeded to Rhodes University, where he obtained BSc and MSc degrees with distinction. In 1937 he went to work at Prague University with Professor J Heyrovsky, the inventor of polarographic analysis and Nobel Laureat. He was in Paris when World War II began and remained there at the University of the Sorbonne (where he obtained his Docteur es Sciences degree) for the duration of the German occupation. During this time he married his childhood sweetheart Liliane in 1939 and joined the French Resistance. He became an expert in the manufacture of Molotov cocktails, which were used at great risk against German tanks. Ed returned to Rhodes in 1946 as Lecturer in Inorganic Chemistry. Eleven years later he became Professor of Inorganic Chemistry at the University of Natal in Pietermaritzburg but remained there for a mere 18 months before being appointed Secretary of the recently established Scientific Council for Africa South of the Sahara in the Belgian Congo. He did so mainly in order to bring up his four children in a non-apartheid environment.

When South Africa was asked to leave the Commission, he had to return to France, at the same time as three million other people were returning from Algeria. In spite of his qualifications and experience, at the age of 50, he had to start from scratch. First he carried out his research on his own in an unoccupied room in someone else's laboratory. Little by little he built up his team, and ten years later the CNRS, the French equivalent of the CSIR, asked him to lead a large research group, which he did until his retirement in 1982, becoming one of the world's specialists in polarography.

After his retirement he was a visiting professor in Pietermaritzburg and was a plenary lecturer at the first convention of the SA Chemical Institute to be held in Grahamstown in 1971. Edgar was a likeable, friendly, good-natured man with a teasing disposition and one on whose judgement you could rely. He was a proud Old Rhodian and is remembered by former students as a conscientious teacher, who related easily to young people and was always available to help and advise. He is survived by his wife Liliane, daughters Nadine, Marylla and Lucille, a son Patrick and ten grandchildren.

Dr Robert Story (1931)

(letter from his wife, Sybil Story)

Dr Robert Story died in Canberra, Australia on 19 February 1999. He was a science student at Rhodes in the 1930s. He is survived by his wife Sybil and two daughters in Canberra.

Myra Mary Mansvelt (Beadle)(1934)

(Obituary by Angela Church)

Myra Mary Mansvelt died on 27 January 1999 in East London at the age of 81. She was well known at Rhodes and in Grahamstown during the 1930s and 1940s. She married Bill Church in 1941 and they had five children. Their married life started in Grahamstown which was Myra's home town and where she had attended DSG. Her father, Harry Archibald Beadle, owned Knights Shoe Shop and was a mayor of Grahamstown. Myra and Bill bought the Bonza Bay Hotel just outside East London in 1956 and built up a successful family hotel which was eventually sold in 1996. Myra

married Dr Peter Mansvelt in 1988 after Bill's death in 1979. She leaves her five children, Derrick, Jon, Mary Lou, Chris and Glynne and 12 grandchildren. Jon Church (1966), Mary Lou Jones (Church)(1966) and Glynne Gibson (Church)(1976) are all Old Rhodians.

Elaine Ursula Slee (Peter)(1934)

(Obituary by Ruth White)

Elaine attended Rhodes University from 1934 to 1938, her major subjects being Mathematics and English. She taught at Healdtown, near Fort Beaufort, where she met and married Alan Slee in 1940. After the war Alan was appointed lecturer in the Economics Department at Rhodes. In 1960 they left Grahamstown with their three sons for Tanganyika and later Uganda, where Alan lectured and Elaine taught in secondary schools. After seven years they retired to England, where Alan bought Goosander in Appledore, North Devon. Elaine died there after a short illness on 10 May 1999.

Reneira van Reenen (1935)

(Obituary by Gordon Guthrie in the magazine of St Luke's Sanctuary of Good Hope)

It is with great sadness that we have to report the death of Miss Reneira van Reenen, principal of the Annandale Trust for the rescue of and caring for unwanted horses. She had, from the earliest years been a great lover of horses. She had a degree in philosophy from Rhodes University, and was actuated by a warm spiritual insight. She had a close association with the sanctuary over many years. She passed away on Christmas morning 25 December 1999 and will be sorely missed by many. At her request no funeral service was held, as she knew that, although she would have shed her earthly body, she would be more alive than ever. Accordingly I conducted a short scattering of the ashes ceremony at the Glorea Mundi on Annandale farm, on 16 January, which was attended by many

Judge Donald DV Kannemeyer (1941)

(Obituary from the EP Herald)

Former Eastern Cape Judge President Donald Kannemeyer who died in August 1999, aged 77, was a firm believer that South Africa's future law-makers should never again be able to enact the kind of oppressive legislation which existed under apartheid. The well-respected judge, who died in hospital after undergoing surgery, was described yesterday by the Province's recently retired Judge President, Neville Zietsman, as "a thorough gentleman – a man I frequently looked to for

Born in Somerset West in 1922, he was educated at St Andrew's College, Rhodes University and Oxford University, where he was a Rhodes scholar at Wadham College in 1947. He served on the St Andrew's College council for 30 years – from 1952 to 1982 – more than half of that time as chairman. He also served on the Council of the SA Library for the Blind for more than 40 years and was its chairman from 1965 to 1992.

Judge Kannemeyer took silk in 1962 and received a permanent appointment to the Bench in 1967. He was appointed East Cape Judge President in 1988 and retired in 1992.

Catapulted into the international spotlight when it became his sole responsibility to inquire into and report on events surrounding the Langa massacre of 1985, Judge Kannemeyer was insistent that justice could not be achieved through juries or 'people's courts'. To this end, the courts had to be properly representative of the nation's varied population groups, he said in 1990, at a time when people's courts were emerging everywhere – a fact he noted with grave concern. He also held firm views on how vital the impartiality of the Bar was.

At a Rhodes University graduation ceremony six years ago – exactly a year before South Africa's first democratic elections – Judge Kannemeyer spoke of the importance of having a declaration of human rights enshrined and entrenched in the future constitution.

"He was a brilliant lawyer and an exceptionally kind-hearted person," Judge Zietsman said. "He helped a lot of people throughout his life, while not making any fuss about it. He was always happy to help me whenever I asked for his advice."

Dr R (Bob) Prosser (1946)

Obituaries

(Obituary from the EP Herald)

Grey-educated Dr Bob Prosser, who began his medical career at the Livingstone Hospital, died in Wales in December 1999.

A past president of the Welsh Royal Paediatric Society, he was a graduate of Rhodes, the University of Cape Town and Cambridge and Edinburgh universities.

Dr Prosser who was 71, was the youngest son of well-known Port Elizabethans Walter and Stella Prosser. He is survived by his widow, Natal-born internationally recognised artist, Helga van der Riet, a son, Michael and a daughter, Dr Ingrid Wrench.

His brother is the former Eastern Province squash champion Paul Prosser, who lives in Cape Town.

Christopher Fredrick Cresswell (1951)

(Obituary by OAM Lewis, published in The Royal Society Proceedings)

Christopher Cresswell, noted botanical researcher, academic, Dean of Science at Wits and Principal of the University of Natal, died at the age of 65. He was born in Johannesburg in 1933 and attended school at CBC in Cape Town and Kimberley. He came to Rhodes, an institution to which he always remained intensely loyal, and completed a BSc, majoring in Chemistry and Botany, the latter under the tutelage of Professor Twyman.

Christopher completed his PhD at the University of Bristol, lectured for two years at King's College, London before returning to South Africa to take up a lectureship in Botany at Wits University, which was then going through troubled times. Within a remarkably short period, this young man, through his superb teaching abilities and dynamic organisational skill, had totally converted the physiological section of the department to arguably the foremost plant biochemical teaching and research unit in the country. He rapidly progressed to the status of Professor and Head of Department. During these years he retained that jovial heartiness which did so much to keep morale in the department high. He treated his staff and senior students rather as an extended family and reinforced those familial bonds with parties and celebrations usually held in his own home. He received numerous distinctions and awards during his career at Wits and also did much to change the official policy of the time regarding the employment of black scientists in government institutions. Chris's career at Wits culminated with his appointment as Dean of Science for six years.

In 1988 he felt the time was right to move on and he accepted the Deputy Vice-Chancellorship of the University of Natal, acting as principal of its Durban Campus until his retirement. He was able to transfer his CSIR unit to Durban and continued with his scientific research in spite of his administrative duties. He was honoured by both Wits and Natal Universities with honorary doctorates of science.

He next took on the arduous post of Acting Principal of the ML Sultan Technical College, where he was able to re-establish an efficient administration. After his final retirement he was able to indulge in his favourite pastime of travel, including a sea expedition to Antarctica. Shortly after his return his three-year remission from cancer came abruptly to an end and he passed away in June 1998.

Gill Moorcroft (Williams)(1961)

(Obituary by the Somerset Budget)

A large crowd of family and friends attended the funeral of this much loved and respected member of the Winterberg farming community, who passed away in October 1999. Gill Moorcroft was the wife of the well-known politician and Member of Parliament, Mr Errol Moorcroft. The service, which was conducted by Rev Kevin Sparrow, took place under a spreading maple tree on the lawn next to Errol and Gill's home. Rev Sparrow pointed out that this was particularly appropriate as Gill had a special love for nature and the beauty of God's creation. She was laid to rest under a beautiful old oak tree in the Moorcroft family cemetery on their farm Clifton.

Professor Ian MacDonald (1958) of Rhodes University, in paying tribute to Gill, spoke of her birth in the Far East during the Second World War, her early days in Australia and the UK and

eventually in the former Umtali, southern Zimbabwe. She obtained a Fine Arts degree at Rhodes University where she was a Rag Queen and where she met Errol. He spoke of her sterling qualities as a wife, mother and homemaker, her keen interest in architecture and her talent when working with colours. During the seventies when Errol had entered politics she was always at his side and had been an indefatigable worker in the Grahamstown campaign office.

Gill's gracious and vivacious personality will be sorely missed by her family and wide circle of friends both in the Eastern Cape in Cape Town.

Dr Anthony Hutton (1974)

(Obituary from the Zululand Observer)

Popular Richard's Bay general practitioner Dr Anthony Hutton died on 1 July 1999 in a car accident. Ironically, Dr Hutton was taken to the Kuruman Hospital, where he was born on 13 September 1955.

After attending primary school in Kuruman, he matriculated at Kimberley Boys High and studied pharmacy at Rhodes University for two years before qualifying as a doctor at Cape Town University. He arrived to practise in Richard's Bay in 1985.

His death has especially shocked the medical fraternity who described him as 'warm, caring and always wanting to learn more about his profession'. "He was well loved by everyone. In all the years I have known him, he never had a bad word to say about anyone and was always calm and polite, so easy to get on with," said a colleague.

Dr Hutton was a shareholder of the Bay Hospital at its opening in 1992. Besides being very active in medical circles, he was also a keen golfer, environmentalist and hunter and had been extremely active with Richard's Bay Round Table for at least 12 years.

Dr Hutton is survived by his wife Cheryl, daughter Nicola (13) and sons Trevor (16) and Craig (10).

Anthony (Tony) Gerard Reynders (1978)

(Obituary from the SA Water Bulletin)

Tony Reynders, the Water Research Commission's research manager responsible for groundwater projects, died suddenly on 5 July 1998 after a yearlong struggle with cancer.

Born in Queenstown in July 1959, Tony completed his schooling at Queen's College and graduated with a BSc degree in geology and geography from Rhodes University in 1980. He was awarded a BSc (Hons) in hydrogeography first class in 1981 and a MSc in hydrogeology in 1984. At the time of his death he was registered for a PhD at the University of the Free State. He was generally recognised as one of South Africa's leading geohydrologists and an outstanding research manager.

He is survived by his wife Judy and their three-year old son Jonathan.

Paying tribute to Tony shortly after his death, Dr Mark Dent, Managing Director of the Computing Centre for Water Research in Pietermaritzburg said Tony was so special to many because he was so genuinely interested in others and so kind to so many.

"I saw the light of the Christian faith shining through Tony in everything he did – his enormous courage, his wisdom, his humility, his patience, his humour, his tireless hard work, his listening ability, his balance, his firmness and strength when needed, his width and breadth of vision, his dignity and his warmth as a colleague and dear friend."

Friends and colleagues have all been greatly saddened at Tony's death. May his memory remain an inspiration to all.

Neville Sing (1983)

Neville Sing, executive producer at Prime Media Pictures, and an architect of South Africa's film legislation, passed away unexpectedly at the end of 1999. Prime Media Pictures MD Jeremy Nathan described Sing as a 'key strategic thinker' and his passing as 'a devastating loss of one of the most alive people I know.'

Before joining Prime Media, Sing spent two intensive years at the Department of Arts, Culture, Science and Technology. With Chief Director Themba Wakashe, he drafted the White Paper on Film, laying cornerstones for the legislation, coproduction treaties and Film Foundation, which have galvanised the transformation of the South African film industry.

Raised in Durban, educated at Rhodes, and having lectured in Cape Town, Sing had a beautifully inclusive perspective on South Africa by the time he took up his Pretoria post. Outspoken, passionate and fiercely opposed to nepotism, he helped move the Film & Video Foundation from policy to implementation. Motivated by a vision and desire to uplift and fast track young people, Sing's vitality will be missed by friends and colleagues in South Africa and abroad. We all learned to love and respect his uncompromising pursuit of the things he believed in.

Rev Zolile Patrick August (1987)

Zolile August registered at Rhodes in 1987 and obtained a Diploma in Theology. He passed away peacefully on 15 January 2000 at the East London private hospital and was laid to rest on 27 January. He is sadly missed by his wife and his three lovely daughters.

Friends don't pitch for 9/9/99 reunion

At 9pm on 9/9/99 Old Rhodian Marco Granelli (1986) waited in vain outside the rundown Cathcart Arms Hotel for his five best varsity friends to arrive for a promised reunion.

In 8/8/88 at 8pm Granelli and his five "best mates" at Rhodes University met at the Cathcart Arms for a dinner party and made a solemn pledge during the jovial, beer-filled evening that they would all return on 9/9/99 at 9pm.

Granelli said that the Cathcart Arms hotel was then the "larniest" place to have dinner in Grahamstown. "We promised that no matter what happened, no matter where we were, we'd catch up again at the Cathcart. It's something I've never, ever forgotten."

The six friends all lived together at Jan Smuts House and graduated from Rhodes in 1988. "I remember thinking then that in 10 years we'd probably be married and have children," he said.

Granelli is now married and works as the political correspondent for the *Pretoria News*. He said, "At the time we never thought we'd ever lose touch because we were the best friends in the world."

Granelli has since lost touch with all five friends. He said the last time he saw two of them was at a bachelor party in Rivonia in the early 1990s. He heard a rumour that one friend is now living in New York and has no idea where the other two live.

"I nearly didn't come because it sounds like a stupid idea we had when we were young and we've all grown up now and everything is different. But I'd never have forgiven myself if I didn't come down because it was tonight or never."

Granelli spent R2 500 to fly down to Grahamstown for the reunion. He booked himself into the Settlers Inn motel because the Cathcart Arms closed down three years ago. "It's weird to be back in this town because I don't know anyone here anymore," he said.

Granelli waited in his car outside the seedy Cathcart Arms hotel at the appointed hour but none of his friends arrived. " I hope they squirmed when they saw the date on the calendar," he said.
