Finally, the Rhodes Student Representative Council also celebrates its 101st anniversary this year.

The University's first SRC convened in 1910 and the current SRC will be inviting all previous SRC members to celebrate 101 years of the SRC. There will also be a number of activities incorporating the current student body. These will take place between 12 - 14 May. Planned activities include a Time Tent, a colloquium, the launch and burial of a Time Capsule, the planting of 101 trees and a Ball. A SRC Centenary fund is to be also established.

To return to this morning's recent, my thanks to Prof. Peires and the Cory library staff for their efforts in convening this commemoration.

We look forward to the proceedings, and I hope that some of the proceedings will be communicated to the general public through the Dispatch, Herald and other media as part of our responsibility to advance critical public education and intellectual development.
