Sixty not out!



CONGRATULATIONS to Professor John Rennie and his wife, Bea, who recently celebrated their diamond wedding anniversary. Professor Rennie was Vice-Principal of Rhodes from 1961 to 1970. Their anniversary almost co-incides with the publication later this month of Professor Rennie's book The Scottish Settler Party of 1820.

Professor Rennie and his wife met at the University of Cape Town, where he was studying geology and she botany. They were married six months into his first permanent job, which was as a lecturer in Geology in 1931, at what was then Rhodes University College. Five years later he was made head of the newly-established Geography Department.

Mrs Rennie taught at St Andrews College, as well as being a demonstrator in the Botany Department at Rhodes. Her career took second place though, when their children Janet, Margaret and John were born.

But, by 1941, she had been persuaded onto the committee of the Child Welfare Organization. She was elected to the City Council in 1957, and became Mayor in 1967. Professor Rennie was a member of the Joint Council until it dissolved during the apartheid years.

Both Professor and Mrs Rennie served on the Fingo Village Action Committee and became actively involved in historical matters. Professor Rennie was appointed to the Historical Monuments Commission which became the National Monuments Council (NMC). He was awarded the NMC gold medal in 1980. They were also founder members of the Grahamstown Historical Society, of which Professor Rennie served as both chairman and president

Professor Rennie was a member of the Albany Museum Board for 40 years, of which 20 were as chairman.

Their fine contribution to Rhodes, as well as the Grahamstown community is an example worth emulating.

New award inaugurated



A NEW award, to be known as the Vice-Chancellor's Award, has been introduced at Rhodes. The award is the administrative counter-part of the Alty Award which is made to those who complete higher degrees.

Vice-Chancellor's Awards will be made to members of staff who have obtained a recognized professional qualification.

Like the Alty Awards, the member of staff must have been appointed to a permanent post and have been employed by the University for at least one year.

The award will take the form of an ex gratia gratuity and is not taxable. Miss Mary Burnett (above), Press Officer in the Public Relations Division, was the first person to receive the award from the Vice-Chancellor, Dr Henderson. Miss Burnett successfully completed the Accredited Public Relations Practitioners (APR) examination through the Public Relations Council of South Africa.

Members of staff who obtain professional qualifications should notify the Director of Personnel of their achievement as soon as possible. Details of the curriculum, together with a copy of the certificate or award should be forwarded to the Personnel Division for consideration by the Administrative sub-committee of Council.

Joint award for Hendersons

THE PRESIDENT of the South African Teachers' Association (SATA), Mr Peter Moore, Headmaster of Sterling High School in East London, recently presented the 1991 SATA Centennial Award to Dr Derek and Mrs Thelma Henderson. This is the first time that the award has been bestowed on a couple.

The award was instituted in 1987 to acknowledge outstanding con-

tributions to education in South Africa.

A distinguished Rhodes scholar, Dr Derek Henderson has been Vice-Chancellor of Rhodes University for almost sixteen years, making him the longest serving Vice-Chancellor in the country at present. "His Rhodes administration model is one which is recognized by all universities for its excellence," said Mr Moore.

New Director for East London

MR STEPHEN Fourie has been appointed to the East London division of the University.

Prior to his appointment, Mr Fourie was Superintendent Minister of the Kempton Park Circuit of the church and also a part-time lecturer in Systematic Theology at the University of South Africa (Unisa), where he is completing his studies towards a doctorate in Systematic Theology. He obtained a BTh degree at Rhodes University in 1977.

Mr Fourie has been a member of the board of the Rhodes East London Division for the past three years. He was also a founder member of the Border Life Line Branch, and served on the Regional Executive of the Border Branch of the South African Institute of Race Relations, of which he was Regional Chairman for two years.

From May 1987 to August 1989, Mr Fourie was seconded by the Methodist Church to the Institute for a Democratic Alternative for South Africa (IDASA). He was first Regional Director of the Border Region and then of the Transvaal Region. He organized the IDASA conference on Education which was held in Grahamstown in 1988.

Mr Fourie took up the reins at Rhodes East London on June 10.

Terry rules, OKaif!

THE RHODES Union and Club has been under new management since the beginning of the year, and numerous changes have taken place. The person responsible is Mr Terry Jackson, who took over from Mr Peter Wright as Manager on February 1.

New developments include the use of the Outpost as a daily lunch venue, live music in the Club, a "panic" bar, and the introduction of the Rhodes University Snooker and Pool Association (RUSPA), which already boasts a considerable following.

The Outpost provides inexpensive meals for staff and students. Lunch times are reserved for staff pub-lunches and the evenings for students. The menu consists of hamburger-type meals, but if this venture proves successful, more substantial meals could be introduced. Although Mr Jackson admits that service is not the best, he feels that the Outpost is doing well under the circumstances.

For a while he had to manage without a caterer or Assistant Manager (one has now been appointed), and only one staff member could be allocated to the Outpost.

Live music in the Union has been a great success. Most bands are local, but occasionally he manages to lure a band from Port Elizabeth. He says the Union is better supported when a band is playing, even though he has to impose a cover charge (much to the dismay of students) to cover the costs. Excess money taken at the door is donated to the Street Children's Fund.

Because the bar closes at 10.00pm (on the dot) every night, he has introduced a "panic" bar for students who don't manage to buy drinks in time. If he feels that there is a pleasant atmosphere in the Club, he keeps it open for as long as he thinks necessary, when the "panic" bar serves its purpose best.

The Snooker and Pool Association was started after a group of students approached him to start a Club. They had found four pool tables beneath Kaif - within days a club had been formed. This club has, in a short time, achieved much. They have cleaned and painted their premises, restored damaged equipment, found a financial sponsor, attained financial independence from the University, amassed a substantial bank account through fund-raising, formed a committee, printed membership cards and held a competition which proved to be a great success. Unfortunately, the club may have to close, as the pool room (originally granted to RUSPA on a two-term trial basis) is to be taken over by the SRC, who need the room to store periodicals and audiovisual equip-

Glenvaal Motor Excess amended

SINCE July 1, 1991, Glenvaal Insurance Brokers have amended the basic Motor Excess to a minimum of R500.

Drivers under 25 years of age will be subject to an additional excess of R200 and those under 21 to an additional R300. Drivers who have had a licence for less than two years will be liable for an additional R100 over and above whichever of the aforementioned excesses might apply.

He added: "It is mainly for his contribution to non-racial education that Dr Henderson was honoured, though. He has stood firm on academic standards, and has successfully converted Rhodes University into a fully integrated university."

His wife, Mrs Thelma Henderson, has been widely recognized for her contribution to education. She is the founder and Director of the Centre for Social Development at Rhodes.

"Her organization has raised R6m for black education, much of which provides bursaries. She was also responsible for establishing many pre-school and day-care centres in Grahamstown. In acknowledgement of her service, she received the State President's award for Community Service and was invited to be one of the very few signatories of the Grahamstown Municipality's Distinguished Citizen Book," said Mr Moore.

Gledhill Fellowship for scientists instituted

IN memory of Professor Jack Gledhill, Professor of Physics at Rhodes from 1954 to 1988, his widow, Dr Eily Gledhill, has instituted the Jack Gledhill Fellowship.

The Fellowship will be awarded annually to enable senior scientists to devote themselves to post-doctoral work in any of the following science departments at Rhodes: Biochemistry and Microbiology, Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science, Geography, Geology, Ichthyology and Fisheries Science, Mathematical Statistics, Mathematics (Pure and Applied), Pharmaceutical Sciences, Physics and Electronics, Psychology, Zoology

and Entomology, the Leather Industries Research Institute, the Institute for Water Research, the JL B Smith Institute of Ichthyology, the Tick Research Unit, The Plant Nutrition Research Unit, and the Biopharmaceutics Research Unit.

The value of the Fellowship, with support from the Foundation for Research and Development, is R2 000 a month plus the cost of a return tourist class air fare or first class rail fare from the Fellow's home. Preference will be given to candidates who are willing to accept appointment for at least six months.

Further information and application forms can be obtained from the Registrar, to whom completed applications should be submitted by July 31, 1991.

Obituaries —

Mr Alfred Shields

MR ALFRED (Ted) Shields MBE, Registrar at Rhodes from 1948 to 1959, died at the age of 75 in Hove, East Sussex on June 9 this year.

Mr Shields completed a BA with first class honours in Mathematics at Cambridge in 1937, before joining the Indian Civil Service, where he held several posts before joining the staff of the University.

When he left Rhodes, Mr Shields became Academic Registrar at the University of Adelaide, Australia, a position he held until his retirement, when he and his family returned to settle in England.

Prof Arthur Clark

Professor Edwin Arthur George Clark, Associate Professor in the Department of Education, died on Thursday, July 4.

Professor Clark was born in Somerset, England in 1926. He attained a BA (Honours) in 1947, a Doctorate in 1957, a Master's degree in the history of education in 1967, all from the University of London, and a Teacher's Certificate from the University of Exeter in 1950.

Professor Clark received extensive teaching experience before joining the staff at Rhodes. This included a short period as Sergeant

Instructor with the Royal Army Education Corps.

Whilst at Rhodes, he was responsible for Geography method courses at primary and secondary levels. He also contributed extensively to the theory of education courses, and developed a Master's degree in education. He was the lecturer's representative on Senate, and served as chairman of the Rhodes University Staff Association for several years. He has many publications to his credit, including two books

He leaves his wife, Barbara, and two children.

Notice to all staff Library books

FROM the beginning of September 1991, the circulation system at the Main Library Desk will be computerized as part of the process of implementing the URICA System. Computerization will have a number of advantages for borrowers and you will be informed about these and about how routines will be altered over the next few months.

There is, however, an immediate change, the purpose of which might not be immediately obvious. Since May 30, all staff loans have been stamped as terminating on August 30. This will continue until August 1 when the due date will become September 30.

The effect of this will be that after May 30, the normal three month loan period will decrease gradually until it reaches one month. It will at no stage become shorter than one month. The purpose of the change is to end all loans under the old manual system as rapidly as possible and to transfer them to the computerized system.

It must be emphasized that staff are not being asked to terminate their loans after an increasingly brief loan period but merely to bring books into the Library for re-issue under the new system. Your co-operation in this will be greatly appreciated by the Library Staff.

All loans from the Main Desk from August 30 onwards will be computerized and will revert to the normal three month loan period, except, of course, for those classes of Library material normally issued for shorter periods.

If you have any problems or uncertainties in connection with this transition period please speak to me or to the Circulation Librarian, Kate Skinner.
