Mackenzie lays down the baton

Pr lan Mackenzie, the Chancellor of Rhodes University for the past 14 years, officiated at his last graduation ceremony at the University's satellite campus in East London on Saturday May 12

The conduct of a university chancellor is usually confined to conferring degrees at graduation - no mean feat even at a smallish institution such as Rhodes. As Chancellor, Dr Ian Mackenzie assumed another task for the graduation festivities - conducting the orchestra at the traditional garden party. His short gig with the baton - leading the orchestra through his favourite, *Teddy Bears' Picnic* - became almost as much a part of graduation as the formal part of the proceedings.

Dr Mackenzie (or 'Mr Ian' as he is affectionately known by members of his staff) received an honorary doctorate in Iaw from Rhodes in 1975.

He was educated at King Edward VII School, Johannesburg; Trinity College, Scotland; and Pembroke College, Oxford, where he obtained an MA degree. He served with the Royal Scots Fusiliers in the Second World War, rising to the rank of lieutentant-

colonel. He was also awarded the DSO in 1944. A retired accountant, he was chairman of the Standard Bank Group from 1973 to 1985, and also serves as chairman of a number of other companies.

He has been a member of the University's Board of Governors since 1970 and is also president of the 1820 Foundation Council. Since 1973, he has been Honorary Colonel of the Transvaal Scottish First Battalion. Dr Henderson, the Vice-Chancellor, said that during the past 14 years, Dr Mackenzie had "devoted himself untiringly to the welfare of the University, never withholding encouragement and advice".


Dr Mackenzie said he had enjoyed the graduation functions because they reminded him of his years as a university student. "I have always felt at home with the younger generation", he said.

Oriel's 75th Anniversary

O riel Hall recently celebrated its 75th anniversary in grand style and held a dinner dance complete with booking cards!

Mrs Bess Allen, the present Hall Warden, compiled a brief history of Oriel. We would like to share some of the memories. Hannetjie Steyn, grand-daughter of President Steyn, was the first woman student to drive about Grahamstown in her own car in 1935. Women students going to town had to be properly attired. That meant a dress or skirt, not slacks, and either one's academic gown or else a hat and gloves. Permission was required to visit a cafe. If students became engaged they knew they would have to leave the residences. Men and

women who wished to attend a film together had to arrange a party, invite a chaperone, pay for her ticket, escort her to the cinema, perhaps buy her a box of chocolates, and then bid her a formal goodnight - with a handshake at the end of the evening. On Sunday afternoons, the entire population of Rhodes used to turn out for a walk to Stone's Hill. Rules were very strict in 1939 and first years had to sign the book, even if just going across the road to Kaif for a quick cuppa between 9.00 and 9.30pm. Kaif is remembered as having the most wonderful sandwiches, a favourite being hard-boiled egg on fresh brown bread which was ordered and delivered to the residence at night!

Olympic Consultant visits Human Movement Studies

Dr Robert Nideffer, the US Olympic Consultant Psychologist, and his wife, Ros Fairbanks, were guest lecturers in the Department of Human Movement Studies at Rhodes in April and May.

Dr Nideffer lectured in the Department, delivered a public lecture on April 25, and ran a national workshop from May 2 to 5. He also worked with a squad of elite South African Junior Tennis players, as well as with the Eastern Province tennis team.

Ros Fairbanks, who is 17th in the world tennis rankings, lectured and coached undergraduate Human Movement Studies students, and ran several tennis coaching clinics for local schools. Dr Nideffer is an expert in the field of sport psychology, concentration and performance. He has been a sport psychologist to both the 1984 and 1988 US Olympic track and field teams. He consults with professional and amateur athletes in a variety of sports, and has written over ten books and a large number of articles in both professional and lay publications.

Rhodes Council goes Green!

r Lewis Barnett Green has been founder member of the Foundation's council. University Council. He replaces Mr Joe Levy, of Uitenhage, who has retired after 37 years on the Council, nine of them as Chairman.

Mr Green was born in Grahamstown in 1914 and spent his schooldays at Kingswood College. After matriculating, he attended Rhodes University, where he read Law.

He has practised as an attorney in Grahamstown for the last 53 years, and is now a Consultant in a local firm of attorneys. After completing his articles, Mr Green began practice on his own. During World War II, he was declared medically unfit for service and joined a local legal practice. Some years later he returned to practise on his own, and was joined by two partners.

In 1981, his firm amalgamated with another Grahamstown legal firm. In 1986 Mr Green retired as a partner, but remained with the firm as a Consultant.

He has been a member of the Council of Rhodes University for 11 years and was Vice-Chairman of Council before his election to the Chairmanship. He was Chairman of the University's Finance and General Purposes Committee.

He was a member of the first committee that established the 1820 Foundation and the 1820 Settlers National Monument in Grahamstown, and is a

Mr Green was a member of the Council of Kingswood College and for many years was Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Council. He was also a Trustee of the Kingswood

Foundation Trust.

He has been a Trustee of the Josie Wood Trust of the South African Library for the Blind since its inception and is the present Chairman.

Among other business interests, Mr Green is a Director of Historic Grahamstown (Pty) Ltd, a property investment company which concerns it self with preserving and restoring buildings of historic value.

He has been a rugby enthusiast all his life and was President of the Albany Rugby Football Club for many years until 1960.

He and his wife, Ann, are both enthusiastic about the theatre and have been actively involved in a number of productions of Omnitheatre, an amateur group which they resuscitated, and of which Mr Green is President. He was also a member of the Board of the Cape Performing Arts Board until the format of the organization was changed.

In September last year, the Grahamstown Rotary Club presented him with their prestigious Merit Award for "his contributions to the Grahamstown community and selfless approach to the needs of others."

Mr Green has always been interested in the educational and sporting activities of young people and sees his election as Chairman of the University Council as an opportunity to extend this interest. "I would like to make a real contribution to the University by being involved closely in its affairs. Because I live in Grahamstown, this will be possible", he said. He has considerable experience in the financial affairs of educational institutions, and intends to use this experience to the benefit of the University community.

Aquaculture in South Africa

Professor Tom Hecht, Head of the Department of Ichthyology and Fisheries Science (DIFS) at Rhodes, and Mr Peter Britz, a Lecturer in the Department, have published Aquaculture in South Africa: History, Status and Prospects, a book which documents the rapid growth of aquaculture in South Africa during the past decade.

The book is based on a survey, funded by the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research's (CSIR) Foundation for Research Development (FRD). "The book provides a comprehensive overview of industry, which includes production statistics and development prospects for both existing and potential aquaculture species" Professor Hecht said. "It gives the details by which the progress of aquaculture in South Africa can be measured, thus making it easier for those associated with the emerging industry to make informed decisions and investments", he said.

The book also marks the establishment of the Aquaculture Association of South Africa, a unified body which was formed to promote the interests of aquaculture in South Africa. Professor Hecht has fourteen years of experience in aquaculture research and development and consultancy, and has published widely in this field. He is a member of the Fisheries Advisory Committee and the Executive Committee of the Catfish Growers Association of Southern Africa. Peter Britz has six years of experience in aquaculture research and development and is involved in research to develop techniques for farming abalone.

Thank you donors!

The declining economy is very noticeable. Our last Appeal for Bursary Funds had a very much poorer response than the previous year, in spite of our being able to offer some prizes. Seventy-eight Old Rhodians contributed R9 414 compared to 126 donors and a total of R11 000 the previous year. The contributions varied in sums from R5 to R500, with one large donation of the princely sum of R1 000. On average, the contributions per donor were significantly larger than the previous year. On behalf of the committee I would like to express our sincere gratitude for your efforts.

This year, the Committee increased the three Jubilee Bursaries to R1 400 each which were awarded to A A Bryce, H J Doherty and D C Roux. The Doc and Mama Gruber bursary of R700 was awarded to L R van Niekerk. a Master's student and member of the Chamber Choir. Eight awards of R700 and twelve awards of R450 were also made. The total value of bursaries awarded was R17 050, a significant increase on last year's R12 200. This compares to a total award of R2 200 in 1984. Statistically, our appeal has brought a response from 0,4% of all known Old Rhodians and represents an annual donation of less than 50c per Old Rhodian, equivalent to less than half a beer!


Graham Mosdell (1984) and Gail Thomas (1983) are engaged and plan to marry towards the end of this year. They both live and work in Johannesburg.

Obituaries

Mr Howard Russell Andrew (1944) after a long illness in Port Alfred on December 26, 1988. He obtained a BCom and a UED and taught all his life -mostly at St George's Preparatory School in Port Elizabeth where he was headmaster from 1957 - 61. He captained the Rhodes First Tennis Team and played for Eastern Province. He married Miss Jean McGillivray (1942).

Miss M Bond (1926) on July 6,1989. Mrs N M Brown (Booty) in 1989.

Dr B P Boden (Staff 1983) on October 6, 1989.

Dr John H O Day (1928) in Knysna in April 1989. He was regarded by ecologists as an international authority on marine biology in general and on the ecology of estuaries in particular, while to taxonomic zoologists he was a leading expert on polychaete worms. In addition to his main research fields, he made signal contributions to our understanding of the ecology of coastal waters, and to the rate of speciation in the sea. His research brought him wide recognition and many awards, including the Gold Medal of the Zoological Society of Southern Africa, an Oppenheimer Memorial Fellowship, Fellowship of the University of Cape Town and of the Royal Society of South Africa, and honorary doctorates from Rhodes and the University of the Witwatersrand. He is survived by his wife, Jenny and five children, the eldest of whom, Dr Robert Day, is a marine biologist of note in Australia.

Mr Anthony Delius (1937) in England in September, 1989. He was a well-known political correspondent, columnist and author who in 1976 won the CNA literary award for his novel *Border*. He broke a 20 year association with the *Cape Times* in 1977. In a farewell editorial at that time, he was praised for his "major contribution to South African journalism" as a reporter and political commentator.

Mr L R Duirs (1930) in December 1989 in England.

Miss Norma Foster (1978) in a car accident in July 1989.

Mr Gerrit Fourie (1966) in Pretoria on February 6, 1990, aged 42. After obtaining his BA Hons (Afr/Ned) from Rhodes, where his versatile leadership in student affairs culminated in his election to the SRC with the highest number of votes in 1971, he lectured for two years at the University of Fort Hare. Subsequently, he qualified for Full Membership of both the South African Institute of Translators and Interpreters (SAITINT) and the Public Relations Institute of South Africa (PRISA) and was employed in related capacities with the National Road Safety Council and the CSIR prior to being appointed Chief Language Practitioner at the State Language Services (Department of National Education) in 1986. His exceptional skill as a Simultaneous Interpreter was endorsed by the demand for his freelance services at both national and international symposia, congresses and conferences in various

centres since his student days. A prolific writer in his spare time, his publications include Bokas en Ondertoon, a volume of poetry published by Perskor in 1976. Commissioned by Struik Publishers to serve as senior translator of the Pictorial Atlas of the World, the pioneering Geïllustreerde Wêreldatlas was produced in 1987. A collection of short stories in Afrikaans was being prepared for publication at the time of his death. He is survived by his wife, Ann and two young daughters.

Mr Michael Gardiner (1967) in a hang gliding accident on December 30, 1989 in Gweru, Zimbabwe.

Mr Bruce Gordon (1923) in Cape Town on May 19, 1990.

Mrs Mary (Mollie) Gush (1921) in East London just five days before her 87th birthday. In 1933 she was appointed to the then East London Girls' High School and later served as vice-principal under three headmistresses for more than 12 years before her retirement in 1957. During the first few years of her retirement she taught in a temporary capacity at schools in the Border area. She worked for the Red Cross and was a member of the local committee and also helped raise funds for the Cripple Care Society.

Revd Gerald Hawkes (Staff 1975), who recently retired from the staff of the Faculty of Divinity died after a long illness on Tuesday, April 10. He leaves his wife, Gillian, and three children. He was born in Britain in 1929 and moved to South Africa in 1935. He entered the University of the Witwatersrand at the age of 16, to read for the Bachelor of Science degree, and obtained first class passes in every subject in every year. Just before his 19th birthday, Gerald was awarded the William Cullen Medal for the most distinguished graduand in the Faculty of Science. He was partway towards completing a PhD when he experienced a call to the full time ministry in the Congregational Church of South Africa.

The Church sent him to London for theological training where he met Gillian, who was to become his wife. He obtained the BD at the University of London. After spending seven years in parish ministry at Bryanston and Athol Congregational churches in Johannesburg and at the North End Congregational Church in Port Elizabeth, he undertook studies at Andover Newton Theological School, Boston, USA. He then read for the

Masters degree in Systematic Theology. To begin developing in the field of pastoral theology, Gerald enrolled in the Clinical Pastoral Education programme where he emerged as a supervisor.

On returning to South Africa, he joined the staff of the Federal Seminary, where one of his responsibilities was to develop field practice. Aware that his training in London had been exclusively academic, he went to Edinburgh to integrate his theoretical skills with those dealing with people. At the University of Edinburgh he obtained the Masters degree in Pastoral Theology.

In 1975 Gerald Hawkes was appointed by Rhodes to head the Pastoral Theology department in the Faculty of Divinity. This department was in its pioneering stage. He began this task with some assistance from Dr Donald Cragg and Dr David Bandey. With all his academic acumen and skill, Gerald Hawkes developed the pastoral theology department until it became the most highly thought of pastoral theology department among the English speaking universities in South Africa. So much so, that a few years ago the Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas, accepted the Rhodes PT Internship programme as comparable to their Masters Internship and permitted one of their students to complete his Internship with Rhodes.

He was much involved in the work of the hospice movement and in the training of counsellors for marriage guidance and for hospice work.

Mrs Nancy Henry (1924) in Queenstown on 13 April 1990. She was in Oriel House from 1924 - 1927 and played first team hockey and tennis. After graduating she taught in Queenstown until her marriage to a dentist. They moved to Grahamstown where she taught for one year. She was then employed as a laboratory demonstrator in the Botany Department. She moved to the Library where she was employed as an assistant librarian. She was warden of Phelps from 1948 - 1974.

Mr P K Loveday (1948) in Johannesburg in March 1990.
