### Woods honoured by Royal Society

he Herschel Medal for outstanding contributions to science was presented to the Vice-Chancellor, Dr David Woods, after the recent Annual General Meeting of the Royal Society of South Africa, making him the first microbiologist, as well as the first person from Rhodes, to receive this honour.

The medal was presented by the President of the Royal Society of South Africa, Prof. George Ellis at a ceremony before the annual Schonland Memorial lecture at Rhodes earlier this month. Prof Ellis is himself a previous winner of the Herschel Medal. One of the world's leading mathematicians and physicists, he has published some 200 scientific articles and is the author of several books on topics such as cosmology, general relativity, and low income housing policy.

Prof Ellis reminded the audience that "Dr Woods has become a world leader in several important areas in Microbiology and has been recognised as a scientist of the highest standing in many different ways not the least being his election as Chairman of the Bacteriology and Applied Microbiology Division of the International Union of Microbiological Societies in 1994, a post he will hold until 1999."

The Vice-Chancellor was described by President Mandela as a leader of great quality at his inauguration in

August this year. He has supervised 34 PhD students, published over 200 papers and has made wide-ranging contributions to the development of good research policies in South Africa — "an indication", says Ellis, "of the breadth of his skills."

The Herschel Medal, named after Sir John Herschel

who made a significant contribution to South African astronomy in the early 1800's, was first presented by the Royal Society of South Africa in 1984. It was particularly appropriate that its presentation preceded the memorial lecture named for Sir Basil Schonland, the University's first Vice-

Chancellor, from 1951 to 1962, whose father, Prof Selmar Schönland was instrumental in founding Rhodes and its first Professor of Botany. This year marks the 100th anniversary of the birth of Sir Basil Schonland.

### Rhodes Rowers in River Rout

he men and women from the Rhodes Rowing Club have yet again swept the waters of the Kowie River with their magnificent wins in the inter-University boat races held at Port Alfred at the end of last month.

The introduction this year of the Women's B eights event allowed Rhodes rowers to win the Mens' and Women's A and B eights races and thus all four of the prizes on offer.

The Men's A team beat Wits, who had been training without a break for this one regatta, by an immense ten lengths while the Women's A team did something similar finishing approximately eight lengths ahead of their opponents from Cape Town.

It came as no surprise that the Rowing Club walked away with the lion's share of the awards presented a week later at the Sports Council's annual dinner.

The University Travelling Fellowship has been awarded to Prof Christopher McQuaid and the W D Wilson Visiting Fellowship has been awarded to Mr Gavin Williams, who has been invited to Rhodes by the Departments of Sociology and Anthropology and the Institute of Social and Economic Research.

Prof McQuaid, who has won the Fellowship before, in 1991, hopes to go to St Andrew's University in Scotland. He will be away for about ten months, working at the Gatty Marine Laboratory on research related to mussel recruitment on the East and West coasts of Scotland.

Gavin Williams was born in South Africa and studied at the University of Stellenbosch (B.A. Law) before attending Trinity College as a Rhodes Scholar Here he gained a B Phil (Politics) degree in 1967.

He has visited South Africa on several occasions as a visiting Lecturer and a Research Fellow.



### 'Voodoo Jazz' man on our campus

young professional musician from Holland, Michael Baird, has visited Rhodes while travelling back to Zambia, where he was born, and was able to lecture on and demonstrate modern jazz drumming at the Department of Music and Musicology last week.

Michael, who at a tender age left Zambia with his parents to live overseas in 1964, is travelling on a research grant from the Dutch Ministry of Culture to study the music of Zambia and Zimbabwe. He came first, however, to the International Library of African Music, attracted by its collection of recordings and research material as well as by the international reputation of its Director, Dr Andrew Tracey.

Baird is a composer and instrumentalist and he says that he has developed his own style of music, once described by a German journalist as 'Voodoo Jazz', which he has been performing, with his

own group called *Sharp Wood*, for some ten years.

After three weeks at ILAM he will be spending the balance of his 3-month tour in Zambia and Zimbabwe.

He is looking forward to going there, believing as he does that his work is and will always be influenced by his "musical roots"; his early childhood years were infused with African song and rhythm — "It was the first live music I ever heard", he explains.

Michael has produced four compact disc albums of music and is also familiar to listeners in Holland through his contributions to many radio programmes. "Inevitably", he supposes, "my visit to Africa will influence future recordings and I shall certainly be making programmes on my experiences and the people and music I'll be encountering. Perhaps I'm in a position where I may be able to do some bridge-building between Western and African music!"

### Student Support services under review

It is important that universities from time to time look at all aspects of student support so that they can provide better services for their students, said the Vice-Chancellor, Dr David Woods, in a statement to staff recently.

He believes, in the light of the report of the National Commission on Higher Eduction, which suggests that student support services at universities should be re-examined, and his own relatively recent appointment, that Rhodes should take the opportunity to do just that.

"Given the extensive nature of what can be defined as student support services, this process will take a while", he added. He advised that all sectors involved will be consulted and will be able to make input.

Dr Woods has constituted a Convening Committee to initiate the review and to make recommendations as to how the investigation should proceed. Because of the broad range of activities which comprise student services, it is likely that the Convening Committee will set up a number of groups to examine each specific area. He has emphasised that this important process will take time and that it will be business as usual until decisions have been reached and widely communicated.

The Convening Committee will be chaired by the Vice-Chancellor and will further comprise the Registrar, the Dean of Students, the Registrar (Finance), 2 Hall Wardens, 2 Hall senior students, 2 Deans and 2 Oppidan representatives.

### \$25 000 prize money on offer

The first lecture course in Neuroscience in South Africa, sponsored by the International Brain Research Organisation, was held at Rhodes University last month.

Organised by Professor Santy Daya of the Department of Biochemistry and Microbiology, the course included presentations by 11 neuroscientists from South Africa, America and the United Kingdom.

It was attended by 58 postgraduate students and staff from several South African Universities, with students attending the course becoming eligible for a prize of \$ 25 000 which will enable the winner to work in the



laboratory of one of the course instructors in America.

The winner of this prize will be announced in December 1996.


### Discovering new astrophysical phenomena

Tustin Jonas, of the Department of Physics and Electronics, has recently visited Baltimore, in America, where he attended the International Astronomy Union (IAU) Symposium 179 New Horizons from Multiwavelength Sky Surveys. The conference was hosted by the Space Telescope Science Institute (the headquarters of the Hubble Space Telescope), and NASA Goddard Space Flight Centre (GSFC).

His trip was made possible by the Hartebeesthoek Radio Astronomy Observatory (HartRAO, an FRD facility), Rhodes and a travel grant which he was awarded by the IAU.

"There were 200 participants and I was one of a few from the Southern Hemisphere. I presented a poster entitled Radio continuum surveys above 2 GHz, which was well received and will be

published in the refereed proceedings", Jonas says. "The main aim of the conference was to review existing and



proposed astronomical surveys which are designed to discover new astrophysical phenomena and obtain information about the structure and evolution of the universe.

"The conference underlined the paucity of radio continuum survey data such as ours and I had many enquiries from other participants who wanted access to our data to assist their studies of the Milky Way and cosmology."

As a result of his interest in the surveys, Jonas was invited to the National Radio Astronomy Observatory (NRAO) in Charlottesville, Virginia, to present a seminar on this work and to visit the technical laboratories of the NRAO. This visit has spawned a future collaborative project between Rhodes, NRAO and researchers in Australia.

"Besides attending the conference and visiting NRAO I had the opportunity to visit two very impressive public expositions of science: the Maryland Science Centre and the Science Museum of Western Virginia. Both of these facilities have extensive 'hands on' exhibits, and are very popular with the public", Jonas recalls.

### 'Ambassadorial' appointment

Photojournalism lecturer, Monty Cooper, has been honoured by the World Council of Professional Photographers in Cologne, Germany through being appointed an Ambassador (Education).

He has also been given the task of producing the World Council Web pages to link photographic associations from around the world, and to disseminate photographs, student projects and curricula to each member association.

#### New photo award

While in Germany,
Cooper secured a "world
coup" in the form of a new
photojournalistic enterprise,
the All-Africa Documentary
Photographic Award. It will draw
entries from professionals and
tertiary students. The winners
will receive the All-Africa
Documentary award of
R 20 000 each to assist them
in completing an agreed-upon
project.

### 'Different but similar' stories — at home and abroad

Prof Jan Coetzee, Head of the Department of Sociology and Industrial Sociology, has recently returned from three months abroad, during which he visited the Czech Republic, Sweden, Holland and Russia.

He presented papers at an experts' meeting in Amsterdam and at a conference in Göteborg and was able to spend time in Moscow and Prague. He is currently working on a joint research project investigating the "different but similar" stories which come to light during comparison of the life histories of former political prisoners in South Africa, the Czech Republic and the Russian Federation.

He is working closely with Dr Otakar Hulec, of the Academy of Sciences of the Czech Republic and Dr Mara Ustinova, of the Russian Academy of Sciences, both of whom visited him in South Africa during June and August of last year.

Between them the trio will have collected 20 in-depth life stories when their work is complete, in their efforts to capture and record the experiences of political activists who stood trial and were imprisoned between 1960 and 1989 for their opposition to authoritarian rule.

Prof Coetzee hopes
"... that this study will not
only result in a testimonial of
past injustices, but shed new
light on the nature of
opposition to authoritarian
rule and the repressive
measures employed by the
respective states. The
interviews will help

reconstruct aspects of their political involvement prior to being tried, their experiences of their trials, their first impressions and experiences of incarceration, the 'normalising technologies' applied by the state, resistance and activism in general and their retrospective assessment of what they have been through", he adds.

Prof Coetzee, who is a council member of the International Sociological Association's Research Committee: Biography and Society, believes that this current research will be able to make a direct contribution to contemporary debates on truth, reconciliation and retribution, both at home and abroad.

While in Sweden, Prof Coetzee delivered a paper to

the IXth International Oral History Conference, entitled A montage of resistance: experiences of long-term incarceration on Robben Island in the Apartheid era. It was the second time that he has attended this conference which is presented by the International Oral History Association. "An important gathering of social scientists employing oral testimonies and narrative accounts", he believes. He then continued with his sabbatical to Holland where he addressed a workshop presented by the Belle van Zuylen Institute at the University of Amsterdam. The theme of this workshop was Life Story Approaches and Biographical Methods in Social Sciences and History and Prof Coetzee addressed the subject of The Fragmentary Method in Life History Research.

### Towards the electronic library — Felix Ubogu

The US Government has decided to stop printing and do business electronically, reports the Rhodes Librarian, recently returned from the United States of America.

Rhodes Librarian Felix Ubogu recently visited libraries in the USA to study the use of information technologies in libraries and information centres and to obtain information that would assist in planning for library services at our University.

In the light of a very important development; the Paperwork Elimination Act of 1995 enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, this visit was particularly appropriate, he believes. "The act basically makes it mandatory for Federal Agencies to substitute paper with electronic media. It has generated a lot of discussion among librarians and archivists and is causing a

lot of disquiet. To many, 'paper is meant to be forever'. The implementation of this Act has begun and most agencies have ceased the production of printed materials.



Mr Ubogu says that libraries are developing new prototypes for acquiring, storing, and accessing information, and are slowly becoming electronic libraries. "While extensive collections of books, journals, theses, microforms, audio and visual materials, manuscripts and archives are still maintained, the amount of full-text

information available to users both locally and remotely is on the increase", he found. "The trends are towards the provision of electronic reference centres for access to reference tools, access to electronic journals, electronic reference services, and on-line reference tools such as the Encyclopedia Britannica and the Oxford English Dictionary."

At American universities, many reference transactions now take place over campus networks. User-initiated services are beginning to take place, such as self- circulation, and computer renewals. The World Wide Web is being exploited in the delivery of information. Resource specific home pages and newsletters have been developed to connect users with resources. services and information on the campuses and from around the world, in the form of the virtual reference desk. "The libraries also serve as additional campus computer

laboratories which are themselves situated across the campus," he adds.

Provisions in libraries now include group study areas, instructional services laboratory, communication skills laboratory, digital imaging area, computer and multimedia laboratory, multimedia library information kiosks, information retrieval research laboratory, on-line search rooms, telephone facility. A dictionary stand with a dictionary is often available on each floor.

Outside the library, Mr
Ubogu found that the
electronic submission of
theses and dissertations is now
a requirement in many
institutions. He came home
satisfied that "most libraries
are serving the needs of their
institutions with enthusiasm
and creativity. The American
dream appears to live in each
American!"

### There's a price tag on challenge

uring her address as guest speaker at this year's annual Sports
Council Awards Dinner,
Cathy O'Dowd, the first
African woman to climb Mt
Everest said that there are two things which unite all people committed to their sports.
"The first", she believes, "is determination and the second is risk-taking."

"Sometimes the greatest challenges require the highest prices", said Cathy, who gave those involved in sport at Rhodes an insight into the challenge of climbing the world's highest peak.

She had earlier presented awards to the Administrator of the year — Barry Banks of the Rhodes Rowing Club, the Most Improved Club of the Year which went to the Rhodes Tennis Club, and the Club of the Year which went to the Rowing Club — fitting recognition which came close on the Rhodes success at the University Boat Races in Port Alfred.
