Ms Clayton, Dr Malcom Venter, Olympiad and Foundation officials, sponsors, distinguished guests, the teachers and parents of prize winners and, above all, you the De Beers English Olympiad prize winners: good morning, molweni, goeie more.

- 3. We are the smallest university in South Africa, which confers many advantages on our students. We are currently some 7 500 students, of whom 30% are postgraduates, 59% are women and 23% are international students from 66 countries around the world
- 4. We emphasise acquiring a formative undergraduate education which means you have wide choice of courses you can major in English and Physics, Chemistry and Accountancy. The only restriction is what the timetable may not be able to accommodate
- 5. We have a proud reputation of excellence in teaching and learning and research, shown in the fact that we have the best undergraduate pass and graduation rates in South Africa, and among the best research output per academic staff member
- 6. We take pride in having a lovely environment with state of the art facilities – recent developments have seen a new R75 million library, 7 new residences and soon we will begin to build a new R130 million Life Sciences building and a new R31 million School of Languages building

I hope many of you will take up the scholarships that we offer and will join us at Rhodes next year. I can assure you that you will not regret such a choice.
