



According to Dr Woods, "top names in the country get nominated and only one gets selected. If they are not elected, they might get upset". Commenting further on the

process Woods went on to say that "it consists of a confidential process and consultation."

After nominations are made, a smaller committee of about 15 members in which all the stakeholders

are represented proportionately, identify 3 people who they deem as potential appointees. According to Woods this part of the process ran exceptionally smoothly and the decision was practically unanimous. An Electoral College of about 35 members then met on Monday 1 February 1999 to rate the candidates. The results have been forwarded to a special meeting of counsel on 13 February. The Vice Chancellor is then responsible for contacting the nominee and making a

proposition. The nominee may still turn it down, in which case they still have two more candidates.

Woods could not disclose whether affirmative action had been employed in nominations due to the confidential nature of the matter. However, he did say that the process was fully democratic and representative and that the decision making was practically unanimous. Woods also wanted to stress how pleased he was that the student body had been involved in the process through representation by the SRC. Papi Mothibi, president of the SRC, agreed with Woods that the process was an exercise in transformation.

Although the Chancellor acts merely as a figurehead, Woods feels there is definitely still a role for him in the changing South Africa as he stands for the ideals and ceremonial aspects of Rhodes University. The Chancellor plays a role of a sounding board which can give advice from a distance. Said Woods, "he is a wise person from a distance as opposed to someone clouded with the nuts and bolts of the situation." The position is unpaid and not part of the administration of the university. He presides over all ceremonial and public occasions, in particular graduation.

A Matter of Fact

IN OUR final edition of 1998, Activate printed a story on alleged mismanagement in the 1997/98 SRC. One source was incorrectly quoted as being a member of the 95/96 SRC. He in fact was not a member of the student leadership at that time.

We were informed at the time that some members of the 97/98 SRC would face charges relating to failure to account for an extra 500 km on an SRC vehicle. It has since been established that the two students involved were not members of the SRC, but two students who had been authorized to drive the bus to a society conference.

We also reported that the SRC accounts showed an expenditure of R 10 000 on a trip to a conference in Cape Town, while Rhodes Admin.'s accounts showed only 9 000.

In fact, both records show that R 9 000 was withdrawn from the SRC's Regional And National Conference Account for the trip, with a "contingency fund" of a further R 1 000 being withdrawn from the Transformation Account during the trip.

While we apologize for the errors, we wish to point out that the information was the most accurate we could obtain at the time, and that no deliberate distortion took place. We also wish to state that the gist of the story remains true.

ALTHOUGH no one knows exactly when the next general election is to take place, the City Council of Grahamstown still encourages students to register. Currently only 11.08 per cent of the students living on campus have registered. This could be a result of the registration having taken place during the student vacation.

For the students who have already registered in their hometown, on re-registration the computer automatically cancels the previous registration. "Rhodes can be

considered to be the students' ordinary residence," said Charl Malan from the City Council of Grahamstown.

It was recently announced by the State President that the elections would commence between 18 and 27 May 1999

According to Pricilla Naidoo from the State President's office, the election has to take place before July. If there is a need, the City Council will consider setting up a registration booth in the main Kaif, with set times at which students living in residence may register. Students will be notified by

the use of posters on campus as well as advertising on RMR. Students living in digs or with their parents should register at the City Hall, Church Street, as they fall into a different voting district. It is important to remember that one has to vote where one has registered. Equally important to remember is that only barcoded ID books may be used to register.

Obituary

DR GAVIN RELLY chancellor of Rhodes University from 1991-1998, died in January. Relly was a man of caliber and stature. "Although his duties at Rhodes were mainly ceremonial, Dr Relly's wisdom and vast experience as a businessman and diplomat were invaluable to the University," says Dr Woods, Vice Chancellor of Rhodes University. Besides his business success, which consisted of a long career with Anglo American Corporation beginning in 1949 and culminating in 1983 with his being elected as the first non-family chairman of this leading mining house, followed seven years later by his retirement in 1990, Relly was admired for his directness of manner and transparent honesty. The cheerful manner with which he presided over Graduation and other events is remembered by many. Says Woods, "He had the right balance of formality and approachability on these occasions, which set at ease those around him." Relly capped, at an esti-



mate, 8000 graduates of this University - both here and in East London, during his term. "One of his finest qualities was his firm belief in this country and its peoples," said Woods. In 1985, Relly lead the first team of SA businessmen to an open dialogue in Zambia with the then banned ANC. Says Woods, "His wisdom and careful advice in this role was of immense value to Rhodes and is one of the factors that ensures that the University will be here to educate the sons and daughters of our present students."

G'town cops deny smoking rumours

RUMOURS about lenient legislation being passed protecting drug abusers and perhaps keeping them in a false Utopia have been circulating since... However when a rumour started circulating claiming that drug abusers could be charged for possession if traces were found in their bloodstream, it was time to find out the facts.

According to Captain Leon Claasen of the Narcotics bureau in Grahamstown, police have been able to do that for ages. However, they require a warrant or a reliable source to give them a tip off. Police are however skeptical about doing this as they would be "interfering with the private life and privacy" of the suspect, said Claasen. Claasen also said that in the case of them not finding anything, they could get into trouble. However, in the case of a raid on a club, they don't need a warrant as that would merely "waste time," said Claasen.

As for the rumour that one is legally allowed to carry a matchbox of Dagga: dream on. "There is no difference between carrying 5g and 500kg of Dagga," said Claasen. He sees no point in legalizing Dagga in half measures, "they will either legalize it or not."

Student Journalist Denies Charges

Activate Reporter

A JOURNALISM student at Peninsula Technikon (PenTech) says he is appealing a decision taken last year to expel him from the institution over a report written for the Mail and Guardian.

The student, Max Hamata, wrote a report alleging widespread prostitution on campus. In the story he interviewed a number of students claiming they accepted money in return for sex, and also contacted several Technikon officials for comment.

Some time later, Hamata was called before the Technikon Disciplinary Committee on charges of bringing the institution into disrepute. He was also alleged to have falsified some of his sources used in the report.

Hamata, a Namibian citizen who has worked part time for the Namibian Press Agency (Nampa), says he was not allowed legal representation of his choice at the hearing, and as such, the decision was unconstitution-

It is believed that an appeal is being lodged with the rector of the institution, and that a decision will be announced shortly.

The Mail and Guardian has stated that it stands by the story, and the Technikon's actions have been widely criticized by student movements, including the South African Student Press Union (Saspu) and the South African Students Congress (Sasco).

Both organizations expressed the fear that the decision, if not revoked, would harm the education of journalism students, as they would be limited in what they could write about by Technikon policy.

The rector of Pen Tech could not be reached for comment at the time of going to press.







Library gets electronic facelift

WELCOME to the Rhodes Library! We hope you will spend at least some of your time in the library over the next few years so we would like to introduce you to some of the available services.

Last year, the Rhodes Library home page was launched. Apart from basic information about the library, found on it - such as opening hours, facilities, etc. and access to the Rhodes library computer catalogue (OPAC) - we have an interactive section which we encourage you to explore. The Electronic resources page gives links to a large number of useful sites including dictionaries, and online databases such as Medline and SABINET (the SA Bibliographic network - where, amongst other things, you can find South African information on the Index to SA periodicals (ISAP)). You can also find subject resources relevant to topics taught at Rhodes, Internet search engines, tutorials and sites which help you evaluate information on the Internet and cite your Internet sources. Under Electronic journals you will find links to (in most cases) full-text journal and newspaper articles. Most of these are journals to which the library already has a print subscription, but this offers the alternative of sitting at your computer and reading the article you want. The S.A. Government Index gives access to Government documents and structures and various other relevant sites

Our new Information Literacy
Laboratory also came into operation last
year. It is equipped with 10 computers
that are available for use by the Rhodes
community. As well as using the lab to
type all those essays, you can access the
library's computerised catalogue and
CD-ROM indexes to periodical articles,
the Internet, e-mail facilities and the 1997
CD version of Encyclopaedia Britannica.
The lab is open during library hours
(except when courses or meetings are in
progress) and is situated on the top floor
of the library.

If you want to access up-to-date information on your subject then CD-ROM indexes are your answer! These may be used in the library where the physical discs are available for use at the Information Services Section, or via the Rhodes local area network (LAN) on computers in the various labs. On campus - click on the "Library CDs" icon and choose your subject. Remember these are only indexes and not full-text arti-


cles. They direct you to where to find periodical articles.

If you want help with finding information for essays or would just like a general introduction to the library and its resources, the staff in the Information Services Section are there to help you don't feel you are disturbing us. We are also happy to arrange group tours of the library.

For those of you who are night owls and find your res too noisy to work in, we have a 24-hour study area, which is open during term time and over the supple-

mentary examination period. It is accessible from the south side of the library (opposite the Psychology Dept.) when the main library is not open.

The library will be undergoing drastic refurbishment towards the end of this year. The Cory Library for Historical





Union: A student drinking spot next to the SRC offices. Probably the most debauched place on the campus.


Vac Jobs: In other words, being exploited by a bunch of cheap employers who know that by the end of term you will have no cash and will work for next to nothing.

Zim50C: A bunch of commerce faculty students who know a good party when they see one.







Will the first years find out what to do with their trays?



Da Thrilla in Manila

IT WAS AT a chill-down session after a few trial debating runs in Jo'burg that Estelle Dehon, illustrious member of the S.A. debating elite, flashed me a confident grin and said, "See you in the Philippines. I can't believe I can actually say that and mean it!" And in countless moments hence, cavorting across Manila in a coat and tie, raising endless glasses with the finest intellects of five continents - I know exactly what she meant.

The final days of 1998 saw Rhodes Debating's second full-scale assault on the World Universities Debating Championships. The championships remain the largest non-athletic student event in the world and a gathering ground for argumentative bastards from over 40 countries. This year really threw debaters into the thick of current human consciousness. The bombing of Iraq, genetic engineering, the Russian economic crash - just about everything found in high-class newsmagazines and discussed in coffee shops the world over found its way onto the debate floor. 
In the end World's debating is much

South African urban culture went global when RAGE magazine went on the worldwide web at the end of November last year. Features and news focusing on Kwaito, Hip-Hop, R&B and other elements of South African street culture make up the majority of the site's contents.

The site is put together by Johannesburg-based Black Rage Productions. The company is made up of journalists Kutloanao Skosana (23), Addiel Dzinoreva (26) and Maria McCloy (22), all ex-Rhodes students.

What distinguishes RAGE from everything else is that most South African music sites either concentrate on rock or the more old-school music of established SA legends, whilst ignoring music like Kwaito and Hip-Hop. Funky Southern African writers and graphic artists who are totally into South African urban culture make the contributions.

RAGE is aimed at urban young South Africans, because no such magazine previously existed on the net, but at the same time, the site aims to expose the South African street culture to the world.

Although the main focus is Kwaito, Hip-Hop and R&B, the site is not limited to these and will also cover other music forms like Rock, Jungle and Jazz. In RAGE you can read features, profiles, news, gig-guide, a gossip/diss column called "What's Up With That?", reviews

and new album releases.

RAGE is updated every month whilst the news and gig-guide change as soon as information is made available.

The first edition covers the theme of "Can Kwaito Go Global?" We check out what South African record labels plan in terms of taking Kwaito overseas, and travel England, America, Germany and France, and check out what is happening Kwaito-wise in these countries.

There is also a profile of South African R&B star E'Smile. RAGE is not only about music, though it also takes a look at the reasons why it is so difficult to find black authors in SA bookshops.

ALANIS MORRISETTE – SUPPOSED FORMER INFATUATION JUNKIE

ALANIS is back (unfortunately). The singer-songwriter of Jagged Little Pill fame has mysteriously reappeared, with *gasp* a new album. From the first time I laid eyes on the new cover, I decided. Al needs a new set of teeth man. Like badly. With an off pink close up of Miss Morissette's dentures, Supposed Former Infatuation Junkie very nearly manages to do sonically what the cover does visually.... It puts you off your dinner.

Alanis has always been proud of her lyrics, which in places are poignant and even... listenable. The problem comes with the volume of such lyrics evident on the album under scrutiny. A listen from beginning to end leaves you feeling as though you've just been brainwashed, and sadly, throughout this illicit download of information, absolutely nothing valuable or useful is retrieved. Kind of like the Internet, really.

With the exception of the delightful Thank U, this album is a hazy misdirected stab at a serious album, after Jagged Little Pill which despite having attitude, was really just a Spice effort, riding on an unique voice and some tight session musician backing.

Did Al really think she was doing something original when she started fiddling with Indianesque influences, lo-fi drum loops and strange distorted guitars? While exhibiting some talent and potential, a voice as distinctive as Alanis's coupled with a formulaic dark mush of noise is as about accommodating as Sepultura Unplugged. Ah, I hear you all say- it's intentional - she's just trying to take you out of your comfortzone. Then why does she have nothing



better to say than "Dear Matthew I like you a lot"?

For an album that is supposed to be filled with dark orgasmic sonic wizardry, Track 12's title "Would not come" pretty much sums it up for me.

THE CARDIGANS - GRAN TURISMO

When we refer to the Cardigans, we are not referring to those fuzzy granny-knitted jerseys with cute bunny rabbit buttons up the front, although this album's title does [somehow] reinforce that mental image. The Cardigans are quickly rising from the mire of late nineties music as a well-crafted and talented outfit,



capable of an apparently vast range of good music. We have all had 'Lovefool' shoved down our throats so frequently, that the average person on hearing the name The Cardigans yields the same response as a second year being offered Punch or Sambuca: we go green around the gills.

But the new album appears like the wonderful Hunters Dry- a satisfyingly drier follow-up to a successful but sickly sweet debut.

The best track on the CD, must be 'Favorite Game' with a moody muted guitar and organ intro that bursts with traditional Cardigan flair into a tasty lick leaving an aftertaste of annoyance and refreshingly un-angsty fun.

It is clear that the band has been somewhat influenced by Garbage, and have employed similar electronically altered guitars and intricate rhythm tracks and yet they still manage to create their own unique sonic landscape. One notable absence is the distinct lack of cute songs. I think perhaps Nina got tired of being the pop-idol of every under 18 year old on the planet.

The use of darker textures and a more technical approach in this album may or may not be to the taste of all Cardigans fans, but in my opinion, the use of muffled Wurlitzers, submerged pianos and Barbie-doll battery operated guitars, with clever underlying vocals backing Nina's killer voice, make for a great listen. This is the kind of album that you keep in your CD player and continue enjoying long after you have had a ceremonial burial for Savage Garden, and come down off the high achieved by sniffing the charred remains of Big Hits 99. And it has cool wobbly bits too.

BIG HITS '99 - VARIOUS

The CD is *thankfully* void of the plague of the Backstreet Boys and gangrene of The Spice Girls, while still having enough dodgy popcorn quality tunes to attract a wide range of flies...erm... I mean customers.

Highlights include the brilliant new track from Placebo, Pure Morning, which confirms the fundamental axiomatic truth that we always knew: a friend with weed is better. Massive Attack I'm sure would be more than a little surprised to find their traditionally underground brand of music placed smack bang in the middle of Commercial Marcy Playground and the mournful and perpetually doped Verve. Still, a noteworthy track with a hooky vocal line that sticks in your head like all those equations that you learnt -didn't.

The Cardigans make a creditable appearance with My Favorite Game, (see

Fastball also appear with the love or hate song The Way which has a Spanishy feel without being too overtly 'Antonio Banderas'.


The last I will mention is the great track by Faithless, where they claim, against






Three for World Student Hockey Tournament

RHODES University Hockey has again made its presence felt in the national arena, with three of its players being selected to compete in the first World Student Hockey Tournament.

Warren Potts, the current dual Rhodes University and Eastern Cape Hockey Captain, Unathi Nkyi, a Rhodes women's first team player, and Winston Kriel, a SA under 21 and Border player, formerly of Rhodes East London, were all three selected to represent South Africa after trials held in Pretoria in November last year.

The Tournament, which runs from the 8th to the 12th of February, in Perth, Australia, will see student teams from across the globe competing for the title of top student hockey team. The South African team however can expect strong opposition, especially from the home favorites, Australia. Amongst the other teams competing will be sides from New Zealand, Great Britain, India, Malaysia and Germany.

It is, however, unfortunate that the student team representing South African at such a prestigious event, will not be the strongest team this country can field. Several top S.A. students had to rule themselves out of contention for selection, owing to financial difficulties, and this may well affect the team's overall chances in the tournament. Nevertheless, both for Rhodes, and for South Africa it is yet another accolade on the wall for Student Hockey.

On the hockey field in general though, 1999 looks set to be a cracking good year for Rhodes Hockey. According to the Head of Sports Administration at Rhodes, Pete Andrew, the new astro-turf pitch has attracted "a flurry of interest" from hockey players interested in coming to the University". This coupled with the usual expected influx of talented new blood and the fact that only two members of both the men's and women's first team squads from last year will not be returning, means that Rhodes Hockey supporters can look forward to a really good season this year. The season itself starts almost immediately, with the beginning of the Intercity league, which sees the top four men's and women's teams from both the Eastern and Western Cape competing for top spot.

Hosted by RAU, and running from the 29th of November to the 3rd of December, the competition saw the participation of 18 university sides divided into sections "A", "B" and "C". Once again, Rhodes was placed in the "A" section, where it has competed successfully on a regular basis over the years.

Unfortunately for all cricket lovers and participants, the week was dogged by bad weather, with a whole day being lost as a result of rain. The bad weather also affected the outcome of a number of matches.

Rhodes lost its first match against the University of the Orange Free State, owing to a batting collapse. One down, Rhodes then went on to redeem

themselves in their next game by trouncing the University of Natal, thanks largely to some great bowling by Brighton Watambwa, who walked off at close of play with five wickets in the bag. Watambwa was later to be selected to play for the South African Universities team against the South African Technikons side in a day night game at the Wanderers, a game the Universities side won. Rhodes' next two games of the tournament, against UCT and UPE were both washed out, which left them with only Stellenbosch to play on the Friday. Rhodes won this game placing itself third in the "A" section at the end of the tournament. Positions in the "A" section were as follows 1st - UCT, 2nd OFS, 3rd Rhodes, 4th Stellenbosch, 5th UNP, 6th UPE.

Other cricket news is that Avinash Govindjee was selected to play for the Eastern Province County Districts team at the South African County Districts week, and that Wayne Wibblin, voted Border's most valued player last year, smashed a ton against Gauteng to help Border to victory.
