## Tribute to jazz pianist Chris McGregor

A MUSICAL tribute to jazz pianist Chris McGregor, who died in self-exile in France almost a year ago, will be the first major fund raiser for newly launched Rosie's And All That Jazz Musicians Education Trust Fund.

Started by photo-journalists Rashid Lombard and John Rubython, who run Rosie's in the Victoria and Alfred Waterfront, the musicians education trust fund will finance young performers who wish to study music at tertiary level or at other formal institutions.

The fund was launched with an appeal by Mayor Gordon Oliver for public support to the project. The fund will be administered jointly by lawyer Essa Moosa and Music Action for People's Progress (MAPP), the fledgling, Athlonebased music school.

Lombard and Rubython believe individual fund-raising events will not "pull us out of the cultural doldrums".

They said in a statement: "Merely passing the

"South Africans have realised with a vigour that we need to save ourselves from the cultural devastation caused by people whose approach to art will be remembered for its singular lack of enduring talent."

In practice, part of the proceeds of concerts by established performers at Rosie's will be channeled into the trust fund and young musicians, who are supported by the fund or are candidates for scholarships, will be showcased.

On May 26, a year to the day since Chris McGregor's death, top jazz performers will line up for a concert, the entire proceeds of which will go to the education fund.

At future concerts musicians will decide how much of their payment they want to give to the fund.
